'Namma Palli Father' is Back...



Yes. Indeed! When the news about his transfer was first received, Namma Palli Father vaapas bartha iddare' (our Palli Father is coming back) was the initial reaction of people who had known him and his service for the less privileged, for a long time.

Fr. Vargese Pallipuram SDB, fondly known as 'Palli Father', is a Salesian of Don Bosco, belonging to the Salesian province of Bangalore. His first spell in BOSCO Bengaluru was from 1990-1999. He still continued to be part of BOSCO (at Don Bosco Yuvakaragrama, Ajjanahalli, Magadi) from 1999-2009. He has two books,



'Street Presence' and 'Glow in the Horizon' to his credit. After a gap of twenty years, he has returned to BOSCO, Bengaluru. At this juncture, he bares his heart about changing social scenario, the plight of children and the challenges ahead, in an exclusive interview with E-Street Voice.

Are there apparent connections between the irresponsible use of new media/social media and increasing instances of elopement of minors?

The issue needs to be explored further. A research could be undertaken about the impact of media and increasing number of cases of elopement of minors.



You cared To touch!


