Foster Care Training Programme



Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru, conducted training programmes for the staff of Child Care Institutions (CCIs) of Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Telangana and Karnataka at the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), Bengaluru, on March 3 and 10, 2020. The purpose of the training was to create awareness about foster care and to identify potential children in need of foster care and eligible foster parents. Mr. Shivamallu, Coordinator, Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru, started the session with

the introduction of BOSCO, its activities, centers, CHILDLINE toll free number 1098, child rights, etc. Ms. Nandini, Asst. Coordinator, Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru, spoke about the foster care concept, types of foster care, eligibility criteria of children and parents, procedures involved in fostering a child, awareness and strategies used for foster care, roles and responsibilities of parents and children, time frame for placements, legal procedures involved in becoming foster parents, follow-up of children placed in foster care and follow up with Child Welfare Committee (CWC). Foster Care Promo Video was screened during the training.

Health Camps and Awareness Programmes



BOSCO Health Care Department organized COVID -19 Awareness programmes for the children and youth at BOSCO Rainbow Home, Vatsalya Bhavan, Mane, Vikas, Sumanahalli, Yuvakendra and Yuvodaya from March to May 2020 at the respective centres. The awareness was given by Dr. Abraham and team, St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru. Dr. Abraham, explained in detail about COVID -19, its symptoms, causes and prevention through a power point presentation. He stressed on the need to maintain personal hygiene, washing of hands, use of hand sanitizers, maintaining of social distance, etc. Hundred and fifty eight children and youth from the centres attended the awareness programmes.

Health camps for the children and youth from BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan, Mane, Vikas, Sumanahalli, Yuvakendra, Yuvodaya, and Rainbow Home at the respective centres from May 22 to 30, 2020. The camps offered services like eye check-up, dental check -up, skin, thyroid, and general health check-up. Health issues of children like tonsils, cough, congestion, mouth ulcers, neck nodes, obesity, lice problem and other related problems were also attended to by the doctor.

Dr Abraham and team, St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru conducted the camp. Hundred and fifty nine children and youth availed the services.

Distribution of Food Kits



The communities in the city of Bengaluru where BOSCO is working are economically poor. Most of the community members are daily wagers, rag pickers and others who do odd jobs to earn a livelihood. They find it difficult to manage their family with their income even during ordinary days. As the lockdown due to COVID-19 was in force, most of them lost their jobs and income.

In order to support the needy, BOSCO Bengaluru with the support of Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives (APPI) organised distribution of three thousand Food Kits in five communities namely Bhangi Colony, Anandhapuram, Bakshi Garden, Mackan Compound, and Magadi Road from April 27, 2020 to May 2, 2020. Communities in KR Market and Shivajinagar areas were identified as most deserving for supporting through our previous experience of working with vulnerable children from these communities.

Adhering to the precautionary measures for COVID -19 and getting prior permissions from the concerned Police Stations, door to door distribution of food kits were made. During the distribution, area leaders took initiative in organizing the programmes. Community youth and elders supported in carrying and orderly distributing the food kits and also helped in maintaining discipline. Some volunteers too joined the staff. Community members were thankful for the support rendered at a difficult time in their lives. Efforts of BOSCO in taking initiatives even during lockdown to help the needy was appreciated by community members, area leaders, Police, BBMP Officials and other Government Officials. They were happy to receive good quality materials. Three thousand families with 18,006 members in five slum communities benefited from the distribution of provision kits. The migrant families from North Karnataka/ Tamilnadu/Andhra Pradesh who are stranded in these areas were identified during the survey. After the lock down was announced, they were lacking necessities of life. They acknowledged that they were getting two meals per day from the BBMP and some provision kits once a while. But these were not sufficient for

mal life.

Based on the request of the residents, the team decided to provide hygiene and sanitary kits. A single hygiene kit contained two washing soaps, two bathing soaps, one bottle of oil and sham-



poo sachets. A Sanitary kit contained two packets of sanitary napkins.

Two hundred and sixty-six hygiene kits and 158 sanitary kits were provided considering the number of beneficiaries in the families. In addition to these, the team provided provision kits to twenty migrant families and rag picking families at Kadabagere, Dasanpur and Machohalli, Bengaluru.

Activities at CCIs **During Lockdown**

BOSCO Yuvakendra, continued with the routine activities in the centre, and ensured that safety of children during the lockdown period. Project work was assigned to the children based on the theme "PREVENTION IS BETTER THEN CURE". General medical camp and awareness was conducted by Dr. Abhram and team from St. Martha's Hospital, at the centre on May 28, 2020. Every day, children were engaged in spoken English classes for an hour or two. Fr. CV George, Director, SJPU and ARSP programmes, BOSCO Bengaluru and Br. Pavan took initiative and helped children in overcoming the fear of happiness, overcoming fear and anxiety, importance speaking English.

Art and craft classes included quelling, drawing, painting, mask making, greetings card, artificial flowers making, paper bags, pen stand, flower bouquet, ear rings, necklace, leg chains, bangles, paper craft, door mats, woolen wall hangings, clay modeling, basic stitching, and knitting. Awareness programme on COVID - 19 and preventive measures, was held on every Monday.

Life skill sessions on team work, leadership, punctuality, and personal hygiene were conducted. Value education was taught through motivational videos, stories and documentary films. Sr. Leena, Home Management Coordinator, Sr. Suganya, Home Manager, Ms. Shruthi, Documentation In-charge and Ms. Suma, House Mother were the resource persons. Fifty -two children were a part of these activities.



There were online life skill classes from May 18 to 23, 2020 by Ms. Pooja, and Mr. Nagaraj, on the topics of education and Coping up with emotions. Thirteen youth participated in the activities.

Activities at CCIs During Lockdown

BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan

The inmates of **BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan** were given opportunities to learn new things in order to increase their knowledge about the world and surroundings through various activities like- Study of Continents and Countries (Flags, Currency, varies cultures and customs, interesting facts about the countries, important crops, Rivers, Parks), General Knowledge (Biology, Geography, History, Computer fundamentals, famous personalities of India, seven Wonders of the World and Miscellaneous), Study of various Awards (National / International), Sports Events, types of sports and sports personalities, In-depth knowledge about human



rights, the importance of first aid; natural home remedies; study of medicinal herbs; ill effects of drugs, junk food, excess use of cosmetics; benefits of Yoga and Games, knowing Cancer and Tuberculosis (causes, symptoms, prevention, medication), awareness on general and Menstrual hygiene, nutritional value of fruits and vegetables (vitamins, proteins, sugar, calories, minerals), good food habits like sufficient water intake, maintaining good hemoglobin levels, including balanced diet, etc.

Sessions on Phobias and managing them, best out of waste (Making door mats), drawing and painting, quiz competition, cooking experience, awareness dance on COVID-19 organized by BREADS, ethnic days and health check-up cum awareness on COVID-19 by Dr. Abraham and his team from St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru, were organized. Thirty-three girls participated in these activities.

Along with the regular activities of the centre, **BOSCO Sumanahalli** in coordination with the BOSCO Health Care Department organized an awareness programme on COVID-19 and general health camp for the inmates of the centre on May 25, 2020. The programme was conducted by St. Martha's Hospital team headed by Dr. Abraham.

Youth gained information about how Corona virus spreads, prevention methods, maintaining personal hygiene and social distance, covering mouth and nose with a mask and washing hands frequently to stay away from the infection. Eighteen youth availed the services of the health camp. Apart from the routine activities **BOSCO Mane** and **BOSCO Vikas** conducted regular health awareness programmes for the children during the lockdown period. Medical students from Victoria Hospital, Bengaluru gave awareness on maintaining personal health and hygiene and its importance.

Dr. Abraham and team, St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru, explained about COVID-19 through a power point presentation. Through demonstrations he showed the use of mask and hand sanitizer. He stressed on the importance of maintaining social distance and washing hands frequently to avoid the infection. Twenty-five boys benefitted from these awareness programmes.

In Conversation With a Winner!



BOSCO Bengaluru organized the national level annual essay competition for college students, spanning from October to December 2019. Around 150 colleges/universities from across India were given information regarding the competition. Students from the Under-graduate, Graduate and Postgraduate levels of different disciplines like Management, Social Work, Sociology, Mass Media, Economics, Engineering, Law, Commerce, Psychology and Life Sciences, participated in the competition.

Diksha Garg emerged as the first prize winner of the essay competition. She is a 3rd year student of LLB at St. Joseph's College of Law, Bengaluru. Diksha shares her thoughts and perspectives in an exclusive interview with Sheena John.



Q: What was the topic of your essay?

A: The topic chosen was, 'Scope of alternative care for children without families.' Actually, the initial thought for the essay came from the time I spent in BOSCO as an intern. While being in the organization, I had the opportunity to interact with children and students who were abandoned or neglected by their parents.

Q: How would you articulate the situation of vulnerable children in the current scenario?

A: We see a lot of child slavery, beggary and exploitation of children on the streets, but there are only few hands working towards solutions.

Q: About catering to the children in need of care and protection?

A: Well, there are shelter homes run by governmental and non-governmental organizations. However, foster care is a preferable, alternative form of care where children can receive love, attention and family-based care.

Q: About your penning the prize-winning essay?

A: The primary data and inspiration came from my experience in BOSCO as an intern. In addition to that I have referred literature reviews and studies on the subject from India and abroad.

Q: The role of law?

A: As a student of law, I firmly believe that vulnerable children need the protection of law more than anyone else. They are subjected to various forms exploitation and suffering.

Q: So, what's the takeaway?

A: Now I have a better understanding of the plight of vulnerable children. Most importantly, I have a different paradigm.
