Training programme on First Aid and Emergency Medical Care was organized by BOSCO Health Care Department for the staff of the organization at St. Martha's College of Nursing, Bengaluru, on March 23, 2022. Ms Deena, and the team, Faculties, St. Martha's College of Nursing, facilitated the session. Defining First Aid, the faculty said that it is an immediate treatment that is given to a person on an emergency basis.

They explained about the various health problems like nasal bleeding, foreign bodies in the eyes, ears and nose, epilepsy, fractures, injuries, dog bite, snake bites, fever, common cold, fire burns, etc., and the immediate treatment that could be given. Twentyseven staff from different centres, areas and projects of BOSCO attended the training.

Mr Ramaswamy, Coordinator, Gandhi Nagar Area Project facilitated a session on child rights, child protection mechanisms, childrelated issues, child-related laws, and the role of BOSCO in protecting and rehabilitating the children at risk. Fr Johnson, Director, BOSCO ARSP Project was present on the occasion. Forty stakeholders were part of the program.

#### Health Awareness



**B**OSO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli in collaboration with the Health Care Department, BOSCO Bengaluru conducted an awareness session on Cancer for the mothers of the children attending tuition classes in Devaraj Urs community on March 17, 2022.

Ms. Uma Rai spoke in detail highlighting the symptoms and manifestations of cancer that can affect a person. Thirty-four women attended the session. Fr. Joshy Puttur, SDB, Director, BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, Sr. Suzan, Coordinator, BOSCO Health Care Department, and two interns from Christ University were present in the session.

#### General Health Check-up

Shivamallu, State Coordinator, BOSCO Foster Care Project explained in detail about the foster care programme and requested the religious leaders to pass the information to the others in the community so that more and more parents would come forward for fostering children and it would also help in identifying children who require family care and support. After the programme, one parent came forward for fostering a child. Fifteen religious leaders attended the programme.

#### Face Exams Fearlessly



As school annual exams are fast approaching, a session was organized at the center for children in contact with BOSCO Nivas to prepare them to face exams without fear, on March 21, 2022. Orienting the children, staff from BOSCO Nivas spoke about preparing for the exam through regular reading, registering, and revising. They spoke about the necessity to have the right attitude, confidence, courage, and hope to face the exams and thus overcome exam fear.

Priya Malini, Coordinator, BOSCO Nivas, gave tips on study timings, preparing a study schedule, balancing study and play, giving enough rest to the mind, being relaxed, having food from time to time, and drinking sufficient water. Around forty-five students participated in the session.

#### **Certificates Awarded**



**B**OSCO Computer Training Project, BOSCO Mane, Bengaluru organized a Certificate Distribution programme for the students who had completed the three-month Basic and Tally computer training course from the centre on March 26, 2022.

Addressing the trainees, Fr. Prasad SDB, Director, BOSCO Mane Computer Training Programme explained the importance of receiving the certificate after having completed the course and requested the trainees to refer their friends and neighbours so that a large number of youths could avail themselves of the benefits of the course.

He also shared about starting life skills and Spoken English classes for the computer trainees during the coming months. Thirty trainees received the course completion certificates.



For many of us journey of life is rather good and comfortable, but for many it's a cup of tears and pain, loneliness and rejection. And for Manjunath S, a trainee at BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, life was a shattered one. Manjunath a softspoken, committed, and hardworking boy moved about with a heavy heart, thinking that he has no one on this earth to call his own. But at times had a ray of hope that in some corner of the world his brother is alive. With this faint hope, he continued his training as a two-wheeler mechanic.



As a child, Manjunath S was rescued by CHILD-LINE in 2011 from a hotel at Jayanagar, Bengaluru. He was produced before the Child Welfare Committee and was referred to Government Boys Home for about three months. He was later referred to BOSCO and thereafter placed in a foster family, from where he completed his 6th grade. While in 7th grade he went away with another boy. Later, Manjunath was traced and was transferred from Tumkur CWC to Bengaluru Urban, which further referred him to **BOSCO** Yuvakendra. He remained in Yuvakendra for nearly six months and thereafter he was placed in BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre at Sumanahalli as he expressed his desire for skill training in August 2019. Currently, Manjunath has completed his training in the Two-wheeler Mechanic course and is ready to take up a job.

It was during this period that Manjunath expressed his desire to search for his family roots. So, Fr. Joshy Puthur SDB, Director, BOSCO Sumanahalli took



initiative and suggested a staff of BOSCO Sumanahalli accompany Manjunath to Bannerghatta as he faintly remembered his brother staying there. But, his brother or his family was not found in Bannerghatta. However, one of Manjunath's mother's friend-Rathna offered to help and said that he is a native of Raichur and belongs to a Lambani Thanda. His mother had died of tuberculosis when Manjunath was very young and his father- Shivappa had also expired due to illness. One of his uncles was staying in Raichur. Ratna's son informed that Tulasi Thanda, to which Manjunath belonged, was close to Koppal.

Based on the information, one of the staff of BOSCO along with Manjunath headed towards Koppal in March 2022. They visited a few Thandas in and around Koppal and with the help of some of the elders of the community traced the whereabouts of Manjunath's uncle. Once the team reached his uncle's house, they were surprised to see that both his father and brother were alive and even the family members were pleasantly surprised to find that Manjunath who had left home as a child was still alive. This was to end Manjunath's 13-year long separation from his family and relatives.

As a symbol of acceptance to the Lambani Family, Manjunath's family, relatives and friends are organizing a ceremony during the local festival which will be held in the first week of April 2022. Its noteworthy that the entire family circle of his hometown is celebrating this event.

BOSCO also celebrates the reunion of Manjunath with his father and brother after thirteen long years. Gone are the days in the life of Manjunath when he used to think that he has no one to call his own. Manjunath says, "BOSCO always gave me life and hope. The training gave me assurance that I can secure a job and become independent in life." He is ever grateful to BOSCO and all the staff who patiently accompanied him in his journey of life and for the efforts of tracing his family.
