DON BOSCO-AN ACCLAIMED AND BELOVED SOCIAL WORKER

Don Bosco, called the 'father and friend of youth', was born on the 16th August, 1815 at Becchi, 35 kilometers from the Italian city of Turin. When he was barely two years old, he lost his father and his mother Margaret had to struggle to bring up the children. At the age of 20, Don Bosco entered the seminary at Chieri and six years later he was ordained a priest. Don Bosco died on January 31, 1888. He was declared a Saint in 1934.

In the wake of the Industrial Revolution, the harsh winds of political unrest, along with moral and religious emptiness were sweeping across Europe. Don Bosco saw the city of Turin swarming with boys peddling odds and ends, chimney sweeps, newspaper vendors and errand boys, exploited in their workplaces. They were underpaid and their employer often violated contracts, and some were subjected to cruel corporal punishments, or were to be found in prisons, idle and vermin-ridden. Don Bosco realized that thousands of these and other young people who had migrated to towns and cities needed education, care and guidance. He opened his own trade schools to train them, starting courses in printing, book binding, tailoring, carpentry and mechanics. He pioneered an educational system founded on the principles of reason, religion and loving kindness.

Don Bosco devoted his energies to the education and caring of young people and for this he founded the Salesian Society. This society has spread far and wide, experiencing tremendous growth and becoming a world wide movement of priests, brothers, sisters, co-operators, past pupils and volunteers who share Don Bosco's educative method.

BOSCO (Bangalore Oniyavara Seva Coota) was started in 1980. It is one of the projects of the Salesians of Don Bosco which attempts to translate his legacy of love into action, on behalf of the young at risk, such that they may have life in all its fullness.

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In the year 2015-16 BOSCO was awarded the National Child Welfare Award, a truly commendable moment in our 35 year old history. BOSCO received the coveted national award from the Honourable President of India, Mr. Pranab Mukherjee, at a function held at the Rashtrapati Bhavan, New Delhi on the 14th of November, 2015. This award, the highest of its kind, was instituted by the Government of India in 1979 as a national recognition to encourage voluntary action in the field of child welfare in India. It is a praise worthy recognition for the dedication and commitment of BOSCO to the welfare of children in difficult situations.

It is heartening to note that BOSCO is emerging as a reference point and benchmark in the area of child welfare in the country. We have grown as an organization that works on behalf of children to protect their rights and to ensure speedy justice when their rights are violated. As BOSCO celebrates the National Award we applaud the current BOSCO team of over 140 dedicated persons, the many dedicated staff of past years and the dynamic and visionary leaders who led and guided BOSCO from its inception to what it is today. Thank you all from the heart. The elation and hype of the National Award have probably died down at BOSCO but its' joyful memory keeps reminding us about our responsibilities towards children in vulnerable situations. BOSCO cares for the dreams of vulnerable children and we will continue to care for them with love and support them in realizing their dreams.

This Annual Report presents to you, in a nutshell, the account of our efforts during the year 2015-2016. BOSCO continued to be present in the railway stations, bus stands, markets and other vulnerable areas of the city to reach out and rescue unaccompanied children. We meet and receive such unaccompanied children who land in the city as a priority, because if we don't quickly rescue them, they will fall into the hands of child traffickers and other dangerous people.

In the past year, BOSCO rescued around 7,000 children from the city streets, out of which 5,248 children were helped to return to their families safely within a few days. BOSCO shares the belief that family is the best place for a child to grow up. Several hundreds of boys and girls who couldn't get back to their families because of serious problems at home were provided shelter and education for rehabilitation at the many childrens' homes of BOSCO.

BOSCO continued to implement several child related Government programmes such as Open Shelter, MCB, CHILDLINE and SJPU with zeal. Railway CHILDLINE Programme was the new Government programme which BOSCO accepted to implement in the last year. Another instance of collaboration with the Government was the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) that began to function from the space provided by BOSCO at its premises. Working with the Government Departments, such as Women and Child Development, Police, Railways, Education, Health, State Child Rights Commission, etc. added much strength to BOSCO's efforts towards the welfare of children.

The Bridge Education Programmes and school enrolment drive in the slum communities led to school re-enrolment of hundreds of out-of-school children. Various slum based community programmes were carried out to prevent child rights violations and to promote child welfare. Child Rights Clubs established by BOSCO in the slum communities have many happy stories to narrate about their efforts to prevent child labour and child marriages. The various vocational training programmes at the BOSCO centers were helpful in empowering the youth towards a life of dignity. Continuous activities to make the public aware about child rights and their welfare, have urged society to look favourably at marginalized children. This Annual Report is pleased to present many happy stories of child welfare promotion.

But success has not been our only companion on this journey; BOSCO faced moments of helplessness too. Child labour is something that we feel helpless about and we want to work harder in this area in the coming year. Foster Care - an alternative form of family care - needs to be taken forward in the state of Karnataka so that more unaccompanied children can stay with families and experience their loving care. We want to strengthen the After Care System for the children growing up in the children's homes of the State by joining hands with the Government of Karnataka. Our passionate mission is to help marginalized children realize their dreams.

A glance through this Annual Report will reveal that BOSCO's work and reach were deep and wide thanks to the support that we received from the various Government Departments, corporate houses, funding partners, organizations, institutions and caring individuals.

A heartfelt thank you to one and all. We request you to continue this journey with us, for today the young are more at risk than ever. Let us be friends and partners in the years to come because we all have a responsibility towards these marginalized children.

We thank God, our Father, for calling all of us to care for your little ones and for showing us the way.

Martin O'Brien is a British actor who besides acting in many films and plays is the founder and artistic director of Ten Ten Theatre. He has written and directed many theatre-in-education plays which continue to be shown throughout the UK. Ten Ten Theatre is a professional theatre company with underlying Christian values. It also works mainly with young people and the name comes from the Gospel of John 10:10, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." The principal objective of this theatre is to help young people to live life to the full. The founder Martin says that the idea of founding the theatre came when a number of Catholic school teachers, knowing about his drama works asked him if he could produce something to support their provision of 'Relationship Education' in their schools. They started off with a play called 'Baby' which would help them to respect life and people and to help them to think about how they relate to one another and with God. Today the topics of the plays are wider and they deal with themes like respect for life, climate change etc. and see as to how the young can do something about it politically, personally and spiritually. Another project they run is called Safer Street Project that tackles knife crime and insecurity among young people within their own communities. Plays based on spiritual themes that can evoke the social feelings of people were created and staged to initiate discussion in the community on being asked as to how he perceived God and he said, "I experience God mainly through my relationships with other people. I also experience God through Nature and the Eucharist, but most profoundly through human relationships because I feel that there is something of an imprint of God in every human being".

BOSCO has been living this very same 'Ten Ten Culture' for the past 36 years and it has been of service to (an almost accurate calculation of) 2, 52,000 children and youth. We remember with gratitude the pioneers of this noble work and we also remember the Salesian Fathers, Brothers and the Staff who have given their very best to make BOSCO what it is today. We wish that this noble intervention continues to do the good especially in today's context when there are several elements that promote division in the society, community and even in the sacred space of the family. We shall continue to be enthusiastic about creating a safe and secure space for our youth to grow in social responsibility and pursue a life of integrity.





CENTRES AND AREAS COVERED





Many children take to the streets either lured by the prospects of a lucrative job or to lead an independent life. This move opens them up to getting trapped by crooked and shady elements that rule the streets. Sadly, this move brings an abrupt halt to their childhood and innocence. It is BOSCO's fervent endeavor to extend round the clock presence through various services such as counseling, medical assistance, providing food and shelter, organizing orientation camps etc. our core practices include rescue operations and awareness programs.

Rescue

A large number of children who find it hard to adjust or deal with personal issues tend to run away to big cities with the hope of leading a better life. Here, they fall prey to human predators such as child traffickers, criminals and abusers. Therefore, BOSCO's mission is to come in contact with them before they are preyed upon. Once they are trapped, rescue becomes difficult. BOSCO attempts to apply the best strategy in accordance with the circumstances and ensure that quick action is taken, thus attempting to decrease the intensity of the problem.

- BOSCO's rescue operations take place from railway platforms, bus terminals, factories, hotels, parks, public places, etc.
- BOSCO's important components such as CHILDLINE, SJPU, Child Safety Net, etc., collaborate
 with Police and other Government Departments in crucial intervention for mass rescue
 operations and prevention of child right violations.

Counseling

deep sense of utter abandonment is so strongly rooted in the psyche of street children that they are totally dejected with life. It is BOSCO's primary goal to make the child feel that he/she is worthy and capable of living a better life. BOSCO provides counseling service to the children with the help of professional counselors at different stages of intervention. A counselor tries to bring out a child's hidden feelings and emotions, endeavors to change his/her unhealthy and inappropriate attitude, instill self-confidence, prompt the child to come to terms with the reality and thus inspire him/her to make suitable resolutions. The rehabilitation centres of BOSCO offer therapeutic counseling and refer them to specialized centres. Counseling to parents, guardians and legal custodians of the rescued children is also offered.

'Save The Children' is working with BOSCO on an "Education Project" to bring about change in the early learning of children who are in pre-school, as well as effective learning for children already in school. BOSCO has contributed towards making learning more creative through its activity driven programs.

BOSCO is a reputed organization with strength in establishing strong networks with various education and Integrated Child Development Services, so that projects can be smoothly implemented. BOSCO has a good channel of communication with various stakeholders like Anganwadi workers, school teachers, grass root communities and local leaders who are aware of BOSCO's integrity.

BOSCO'S SHAKTHI-MAN

Shakthi Velu, a 13 year old boy from Bangalore's Majestic area was born to Kumar and Uma Maheshwari, and he has four siblings. Shakthi means "Power" and this little boy's name matches his personality! Despite an extremely disturbed past, Shakthi doesn't have a sign of glumness on his face, and is an extremely cheerful child. His father is a drunkard and it was not easy for the mother, Mrs. Uma Maheshwari to take care of the entire family of 7 members. All the money for the family's needs was snatched away by Kumar for his alcoholic needs, leaving the family deprived of food and basic

necessities. Abuse, beatings and violence at home was a mundane thing for Shakhti. At the age of 10 he was fed up with home life. The final moment came when Kumar, Shakthi's father, murdered his 9 month old child by pressing on the baby's chest. This incident shook the entire family and devastated Shakthi and his mother. Not surprisingly, Shakthi was shocked and disturbed and decided to take the dire step of leaving home and family.

Running away from home he met with an accident and suffered major injuries in his leg. This was the moment when BOSCO came to his rescue. The staff and other members saw this boy at Majestic and took him for medication and kept him at BOSCO Yuvodaya. During the process, BOSCO staff enquired about his parents and sent him back home with his mother. But the financial problems and responsibility of 4 children was not an easy task for Uma Maheshwari who by now had has left her husband and was on her own. Uma Maheshwari started working at a hotel where she met a friend who connected her with BOSCO. She then reached out to BOSCO to protect her children.

Observing all formalities, Uma Maheshwari enrolled all her children in BOSCO and each off them were sent off to suitable centres of BOSCO. These children are now in safe hands, going to school and living a comfortable life. Every Sunday they all get to meet each other and once a week or month, Uma comes to visit her children. The family has absolutely no idea about the whereabouts of Kumar, but nevertheless they are a comparatively happy family now. Uma is grateful and happy that her children are getting an education and leading a better life.

Shakthi says he really likes his stay at BOSCO and now feels at home here. He has great plans for his future and along with his friend at BOSCO, has decided to set up a home for orphans. His story can be summed up: "It's not where you are born that decides your future; it's your strength, will power and good learnings that take you to places".

Health Care

Nowing that a child in the street lives in extremely unhygienic conditions and consequently becomes vulnerable to a variety of diseases and parasitic infestations, BOSCO makes notable medical interventions. The Health Care Department of BOSCO takes care of the medical services for the rehabilitation centres, slum communities and its operational areas. Besides direct interventions, it conducts many health awareness programs and medical camps.

Non-Formal Education

he children rescued by BOSCO are diverse: school dropouts or children who have never been to school, with little or no academic skills and learning. The first priority of the organization is to prepare these children for formal education provided they possess the aptitude and interest in studies. In this case, classes are organized in different shelter homes of BOSCO to prepare them for schooling. Classes are organized for children beyond school age, to prepare them for open school exams in the 10th standard and further to take up jobs according to the skills that they are trained in.

Education

OSCO believes that education forms the basis of human development. The organization attempts to intervene Ifor those children who have the least chances of attaining regular schooling. Children from the slums do not lack intelligence but transforming them requires immense motivation, love and support from the educator. Children who land up on the streets usually have little interest in academics, which results in an increase in the number of school dropouts. BOSCO uses innovative strategies to motivate the children and help them gain an interest in academics and regular classes. Its centres such as BOSCO Vikas, BOSCO Rainbow Home and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan are dedicated towards making the children develop greater interest in their studies. BOSCO Summanahalli, on the other hand, is dedicated towards providing higher education to its resident youth.

Bridge Schooling

Of the children rescued from the streets and vulnerable pockets of Bangalore, those who were unable to return to their homes or were orphaned were admitted to the half way home of BOSCO, as some of the identified children may have never attended school. Here skill training, nonformal education, creative learning, a homely atmosphere, therapeutic counseling, mentoring, craft, play, art, etc. are provided to eliminate the deep rooted negative impact of street life, and/or the problems faced by them at home due to various unavoidable circumstances. The bridge schooling program not only aims to enroll children in schools but also focuses on their overall development and reintegration into mainstream society.

Once the children complete their schooling, they remain vulnerable young adults who are either orphans or are unable to return to their families. Each of them has dreams, aspirations and wishes to continue education at a higher level. BOSCO enrolls such youth in colleges, ITIs and other training institutes based on their interests and aptitude.



Skill Training

BOSCO runs its own skill training centre for boys at BOSCO Summanahalli, on the outskirts of Bangalore. It is equipped with the latest machinery as well as qualified and experienced staff to promote work culture and bring youth into mainstream society. Besides training them in six trades - carpentry, electrical, two wheeler mechanics, bakery, book binding and welding - BOSCO Sumanahalli also provides computer education to the youth in Basics, Microsoft Office, internet and Tally. Apart from the above mentioned trades, a tailoring unit is also functioning at BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan.

Computer Education

With the advancement of technology, the computer has become an inevitable part of daily life. BOSCO provides an opportunity to youth and children to become computer literate. There are two computer training centres situated at BOSCO Mane and BOSCO Summanahalli campuses which widen career options for children and youth, contributing to their integral development. BOSCO Mane computer training is aimed toward employment opportunities, whereas BOSCO Sumanahalli provides training in computer basics to children as part of their curriculum. In BOSCO Sumanahalli, a total number of 174 youngsters were equipped with computer knowledge.

Note: 26 students did not complete their course during the year due to various reasons such family problems, timings of the course not being suitable, etc.

Computer education is a 4 month long course, and during the last year 3 batches completed their course in Basic, Tally and Vocational. Among the students above 18 years of age, some were placed in companies such as Rangoli, Metro, LIC, SBI, Exide Life Insurance, Star Health Insurance and RCMS Company while others established their own start-ups.



Most of the youth come to the city in search of jobs. After being counseled at BOSCO Yuvodaya these youth are sent to BOSCO Yuvakendra, where they are assisted and guided in finding suitable employment. Youth who have undergone skill based training at various vocational skill training centres of BOSCO are placed for skilled jobs like welding, carpentry, computer data entry, electricians, mechanics, screen printing, bakery, tailoring, sales, etc. BOSCO is in contact with a number of employers who understand the situation and background of these youth and are ready to extend cooperation and offer them jobs.

Room Placement

Mainstreaming youth- leading them back to the society as economically independent young adults - is our ultimate goal. BOSCO helps youngsters in hiring rooms or renting a place along with other boys. They are equipped to pay for the accommodation; and follow up of these youth is done periodically. The core idea behind room placement is to prep them for the change from a cocooned life of institutionalized care where they were provided with everything, to accommodation where they have to manage on their own. BOSCO staff does follow-ups by visiting them and arranging past-pupils get togethers. During the project year, BOSCO placed two new youth and did the follow up of 10 youth, including 8 old youth.

Home Placement

Home placement is one of the major activities of BOSCO. BOSCO Yuvodaya acts as a transit home for around 30 children on a daily basis who are rescued from the railway stations, bus stands and the various contact

points in the streets of Bangalore. The children who are brought to the centre are counseled and encouraged to return to their homes. BOSCO's main aim is to reunite the children with their parents since it believes that family is the most suitable place for a child to grow up. A lot of motivation and awareness is given to children as well as parents before BOSCO decides to home place a child. This home

placement in most of the cases includes calling the parents or close relatives and handing over the child to them; sometimes our staff accompanies the child back home. In the previous year a total of 5,248 children were home placed from BOSCO.

Having been associated with BOSCO in Bangalore for close to two decades, I wish to place on record my deep appreciation for the work by the entire team of BOSCO who work with highly vulnerable children. Earlier BOSCO used to work only with boys, and now it is also working with girls by providing them with care, support, counseling, educational alternatives including vocational education and shelter. Its recent work in the communities is a welcome addition, since it is also located in areas where there is a surfeit of marginalized communities, including Muslim girls, who are already benefitting from the intervention in a very significant manner.

Interacting with the children who are part of the children's clubs set up, a part of the CREAM project supported by BREADS, was inspiring. They were courageous, well informed and getting equipped to face the

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A HOME FOR SANTHOSH

A resident of Nagwara village in Bangalore, 13 year old Santosh Kumar bears a very tragic past- he was disowned by his own parents. The child has no idea about who his real parents are because he has never had a glimpse of them. Santosh spent his growing up years with his grandfather- who he thinks is his father - and his uncle, in Nagwara village.

His journey and connection with BOSCO started when the CWC (Child Welfare Committee) members found him at Shivajinagar and enquired about the reason he ran away from home. This is what he related: One day in Nagwara village, Santosh

went to his neighbour's house, met a girl, and engaged in inappropriate behavior. The girl told her parents and they complained to Santosh's uncle. Fearing a beating from his uncle, Santosh decided to run away from home and thus landed Shivajinagar. For almost a month he spent his days and nights at the bus stop and in nearby places where he met Arun, who helped him earn a small amount of money which he used to buy his meals for a while. He earned a living making dolls and small jewellery, and took shelter in the church at night. After almost a month the CWC members found him wandering around and took him to BOSCO Yuvodaya.

Usually it's the parents that protect a child, and so Santosh having none, lost his way and cultivated bad habits, becoming the kind of child which society frowns upon. At BOSCO Yuvodaya, while enquiring about his family and parents, BOSCO came to know that he was left an orphan and his grandfather took responsibility, but, besides providing food and shelter, did not guide him. He began troubling children from the neighborhood, smoking and so on. This turned him into a frustrated, angry and unpleasant adolescent.

Santosh's journey at BOSCO started 3 years ago; ever since he came to BOSCO Mane, with the help of counselling and advice, the officials were able to bring about positive changes. After several attempts and enquiries, BOSCO found that his mother's sister stays in a village near Big Banyan Tree, Bangalore. Santosh had told us that he had visited his aunt during vacations and was very fond of her. After talking to his aunt, they came to know that Santosh's real mother, who he thinks is no more, was alive and came to Bangalore after getting married to another man and she has two new children. When Santosh's aunt told his mother about him, she did not want him back nor did she want to have anything to do with him. Despite this, it is heartening that he still has a place which he can call home, and an aunt and uncle who will take him into their home.

Santosh will now be going back to his home at Big Banyan Tree to stay with his family and finally get a life which he deserves. They have also assured us that he will be starting his education once he goes back. Santosh is extremely thankful to BOSCO for treating him like a family member and also said that he will miss BOSCO and his friends in BOSCO. But like they say, there's no place like home, and this boy is happy to head back to his nest.

SLUM/COMMUNITY CARE AND DEVELOPMENT

Dosco, being a rights based organization, concentrates its effort on the holistic development of slum communities to promote child protection. In this regard, the BOSCO team works closely with slum communities and especially women and children on various issues such as health, shelter, food, education and women empowerment.

In 2015-16, BOSCO team worked closely with various slum communities and ensured the following:

- Birth registration of 21 new born babies
- 2125 children were immunized.
- The Pulse Polio Drive benefitted thousands of children
- 65 malnourished children were identified
- 9 health camps were conducted in slums during the year and a total of 1,471 people benefitted from them.
- Ration card for 55 families were renewed through the 'Adalath'.
- BOSCO team assisted in filing and procuring Voter ID cards and filed 209 applications.

School and Tuition Centres

During the scholastic year, 15 children secured seats under RTE in various private schools. There were 193 new enrollments and re-enrollments from slum communities. An average of 160 children from RG Colony, Vasanthnagar, Mackan compound, Nehrupuram and Nivas center were given tuitions and they proved to be eager learners. Also, summer camps were conducted for 2014 where several skills of arts and crafts were taught with the help of resource persons and awareness was given on "good and bad touch".

Child Rights Clubs

BOSCO works closely with children in schools and slum communities with the objective of providing them with a platform to share their ideas and empowering them to address their own protection issues. The Child Rights Club acts as a powerful medium for bringing about transformation in society. Through their timely intervention, many child marriages were stopped, child labourers were rescued and many children were re-enrolled in schools. Once a month, club members meet with their animator and discuss current child related issues particularly those pertaining to their respective schools.

Advocacy with Slum Board and Other Departments



BOSCO is directly involved with communities, especially slums, to ensure that their basic rights are protected. It conducts field visits to study communities in crisis and advocate for their essential needs. BOSCO's strategy of conducting awareness programme for the well-being of the slum community involves not only spreading awareness about child rights, health care, women empowerment, etc. but also ground level work for the community. Through BOSCO's intervention - in collaboration with Action Aid- negotiation on land allotment for evacuated slum people is on.





Women Empowerment

Women have a major role to play in any society. Very often it is the women who run the family with their meager income shouldering the burden of sick parents and young children, as the men are either alcoholics or have deserted the families or are no more. It is against this socio-economic background, that BOSCO started intervention among women in slum communities. The objective of BOSCO here is to empower women to educate their children, and through their children, bring about transformation in their lives.

BOSCO has strengthened Mother's Groups across 26 ICDS centres through 55 sessions. Capacity building of Mother's Group members focuses on emergent literacy and math, and is done on the basis of 1 program for 52 mothers. At present there are 5 SHGs in total.



Stakeholders

Stakeholders can affect or be affected by the organization's actions, objectives and policies. Major stakeholders include a wide range of people who are supporting both directly and indirectly, the rescue and rehabilitation of children. They range from the common man on the streets to Government officials such as Police, RPF, GRPF, Railway and bus stand officials, AHTU, child rights clubs, NGOs, school teachers, parents, SDMC members, local leaders of the ward, etc. It also includes the duty bearers such as CWOs, DCPO, CWC, JJB, railway officials, KSRTC, BBMP officials, officials from the Departments which includes WCD, ICPS, labour departments, education departments and health departments, Law Enforcement and Legal System, etc.







RUBEN SETS HIS GOALS HIGH

The story of Ruben is a fable of someone who displayed the grit to reach his goal. He doesn't remember anything about his family. Ruben was rescued from the street by sisters from the congregation of Salesian Missionaries of Mary Immaculate (SMMI). He finished his schooling up to 7th standard at SMMI convent school in Hassan. Later on as the boy expressed his desire to do vocational training, he was given admission in BOSCO Sumanahalli on July 1st, 2007.

Ruben completed his training in carpentry and welding during his stay at BOSCO Sumanahalli. After the training he was job-placed and worked for 6 months before returning to BOSCO Sumanahalli to prepare for KOS Exams. He wrote the exam and completed his SSLC in 2011. He continued his studies in regular college and completed his PUC in the year 2013. He joined Govt. First Grade College, Vijayanagar and successfully completed B.A in 2016. On completing his studies, he joined as Store Manager in LIVEN-UP Concept Cycle Store on Malgala Ring Road, Bangalore. Now he is earning Rs. 10,000/-per month. He wants to become an acclaimed cyclist in the future and carve a niche for himself in society. He has won 4th place in the 200 km cycling run (Bangalore to Krishnagiri, Tamil Nadu) and was awarded with the Bronze Medal. He has also won 1st place in 400 Kms for cycling (Bangalore to Vellore, Tamil Nadu) and won the Silver Medal.



TULASI BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan

I left my home at the age of 6 due to the physical torture by my family members; because of this I stayed in a government home for 11 years. Four years ago, BOSCO took me out of the government home and put me in its own shelter. It was altogether a new experience for me in the beginning. I was a little confused, but when I met the Fathers, Sisters and the other girls like me, I was surprised to see how they kept the doors wide open for me and accepted me just the way I am. BOSCO gave me ample opportunity to learn new things. It also gave me a chance to get admission in one of the most reputed colleges in Bangalore, Jyothi Nivas College. With a lot of care and support provided to me by BOSCO, I managed to pass PUC exams with 72 percent.

Thank you BOSCO for your love and support! I shall remain ever grateful to you for rendering such a service to girls like me.







BRIDGE Network

BRIDGE (Bangalore Rights Initiative for Development and Gender Empowerment) is a ten year project which was initiated in 2006 as a network of 11 NGOs, among which BOSCO is functioning as the nodal agency. It is supported by Action Aid. BRIDGE Network, was instituted with the aim to connect urban deprived communities with government agencies and avail government schemes or projects that are set apart to ensure these people's basic rights. BRIDGE network works towards safeguarding five rights:

- · Right to land and housing
- · Right to education
- · Right to food
- · Rights of women and children
- Right to health.

The BRIDGE network has its presence in 32 slums in the city of Bangalore and it connects people with government projects aimed at their holistic development.

Some of the major actions of BRIDGE Network:

- A campaign resulting in 1,228 slum dwellers giving application to the government demanding land allotment.
- 134 RTE applications were applied for and 54 admitted.
- Re-enrolment of 35 school dropouts.
- Stopped 8 child marriages.
- 554 BPL cards have been applied out of which 269 have been accessed.
- 149 application for pension were applied and 86 have been accessed.
- · Capacity building for women and summer camp for children.

It is a great experience to work with BOSCO Bangalore Railway CHILDLINE at Bangalore city railway station. The efforts of the staff of BOSCO Bangalore Railway CHILDLINE are really very effective. Every month on an average more than 200 children are being rescued in Bangalore city railway station premises. The rescued children are sheltered, counseled and as per the Child Welfare Committee advice they are safely returned to their parents, or sent back to their hostels. I feel that BOSCO Bangalore Railway CHILDLINE is doing a great service to the community and to the nation.



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IN COLLABORATION WITH GOVERNMENT AND OTHERS

CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE is a 24/7 free emergency telephone helpline service for children in distress. It is a project of the Ministry of Women and Child Development and works in partnership with NGOs, Government and Corporate Sector. BOSCO is the collaborative organization of CHILDLINE. BOSCO CHILDLINE is committed to respond to the CHILDLINE calls on 24/7 basis and intervene in crisis situations since 2002. It identifies high risk areas where the number of vulnerable children is high and reaches out to them. CHILDLINE intervenes in cases of child labour, child marriage, abandoned children, sexual abuse, corporal punishment, school dropout children, begging children, etc.


Jayakumar is Rescued

During the field visit of the BOSCO CSN team in Chandra Layout, 13 year old Jayakumar, was found working in 'Naveen Men's Shop'. The shop owner was very rude

and he didn't allow the team to meet the child. But along with the support of the police, the team caught hold of the child and enquired about his whereabouts. Jayakumar belongs to Bellary District, Thuorannagalli. His father's name is Hokarappa and mother's name is Gangamma and both parents are illiterate. They are financially poor and the father is the only breadwinner of the family. Jayakumar has two siblings. His uncle took him to Bangalore promising to give him education and a job after that. But no education was provided to him, rather he was employed in a shop. Jayakumar is interested in pursuing his higher education. His work timings in the shop are from 7 am to 7 pm and he was paid a very poor salary, and food and shelter were given to him in the house of the shop owner.

With the support of the Chandra Layout police station, Jayakumar was rescued and taken to BOSCO Yuvodaya for rehabilitation.

Railway CHILDLINE

Railway CHILDLINE is a new project which is jointly initiated by the Department of Women and Child Development and Indian Railways in 2015. The aim of the programme is to rescue children from the railway station and the surrounding areas, provide counseling to the children and re-integrate them with their family members. The procedurestarting from rescue till the reintegration- involves several stages such

as collecting details of the children, producing the children before the Child Health Group (CHG), sending them to the open shelter and finally producing them before Child Welfare Committee (CWC). The information of the rescued children and the final action taken is given to CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF).

Foster Care

Foster care refers to a temporary arrangement for children who are in a difficult period in their lives such as orphaned/semiorphaned and children who do not have a family of their own. These children are placed in a home, individually or in a group, of foster parents certified by the state. BOSCO Foster Care works in collaboration with various Government Departments, Government Homes and other NGOs. The activities of BOSCO Foster Care include identifying the potential foster parents, counseling them, identifying and preparing children for going into foster care, visiting homes of the potential foster parents,



visiting children at school to ensure their well-being and growth as well as maintaining systematic documentation. BOSCO provides foster care services such as individual and group foster care. In 2015-16, 5 children were placed in Individual Foster Care, out of which 1 child was referred back to CWC due to ill health of his parents and 11 children were placed in Group Foster Care.



It is indeed an immense pleasure to be associated with BOSCO (Bangalore Oniyavara Seva Coota) as one of our partners for implementing the Rainbow Homes Program for vulnerable girl children on the streets. With the immense experience that BOSCO has of working with children, our program has been effective in not only implementing the home, but also for working with the systems, especially Government, in advocating for child rights and for bringing out child friendly policy directives.

My best wishes for BOSCO in all its endeavors and hope to scale up the association in the future for creating a better future for underprivileged children.

Manikantan Starts Over

Trying to make a living out of rag picking, tells us what kind of a tough childhood a boy like Manikantan experienced. Fathers are usually the pillars of the house. However in the case of Manikantan, his father is the reason for many issues in the family. Periya, Manikantan's father, stopped working when he came to know that he had Epilepsy, and he used this as an excuse to not go to work. Instead, he stayed at home and drank, leading to a lot of fights and physical abuse in the family. The regular fight between Manikantan's parents was one of the reasons why Manikantan lost interest in studies and decided to leave school when he had just finished Std 2!

Once he stopped going to school, Manikantan chose the life of a rag picker, roamed around with his friends and got into the habit of smoking. He gave up on his dreams of becoming an educated person. Due to financial restraints, it was difficult for his mother to send him to a hostel or a school nearby because she, working alone, could not afford it. BOSCO officials observed him and his mother in one of the big sewers for a few days and finally approached his mother and convinced her to send her child to BOSCO where he could lead a different life and start to dream again.

Even today, whenever Manikantan goes back home, he encounters the same behavior of his father and ends up in a dull and negative frame of mind all over again. His grandmother is unfortunately at the receiving end of all these abuses and was in fact admitted in hospital after she was beaten up by Manikantan's father. Manikantan has three older sisters, of whom two are studying whilst the youngest one has also chosen the life of a rag picker. Manikantan loves his mother, sisters and his grandmother; they have lavished love, care and affection on him. He wants to get them away from all the troubles caused by his father and help them move away from the emotional and physical abuse.

On the academic front, he is very slow in terms of learning; he gives up very easily, the repeated abuse that he has been through makes it tough for him to do things again and again. One of the volunteers had asked him to make a duck out of paper and after two unsuccessful attempts; he gave up and wanted to do something different. The volunteer, however, wouldn't give up, and this time he took five to six attempts to make the duck, but he persevered. In the past one year, things have changed a lot and the credit goes to BOSCO for making him believe in life again. Here he gets to play around with other kids and the toys, and he is learning to relax and feel safe.

Manikantan is now trying his best to educate himself and has successfully stayed away from smoking or any kinds of drugs for that matter. The new environment provided to him by BOSCO has made him a better person and one can only hope that his life too becomes better from now on.

BOSCO Bangalore is a nationally recognized NGO that is not only a home to hundreds of children and young people who live and work on the streets, but also to many who have walked through its doors and were encouraged to use it as a stepping stone to a more happy and dignified life within the community. The wide array of services offered for this vulnerable group is truly a demonstration of the commitment and genuine service to the most marginalized, particularly when many organizations are now transforming homes for such children into 'hostels' for school going children. The Action Research approach drawing from the 'street presence philosophy' that it adopts often results in a positive contribution to policy and law, as well as in replicable models - an invaluable contribution to the normative framework and professional practice with children. I congratulate BOSCO for its wonderful work, and wish the organization all the very best in its ongoing endeavors.

ANNUAL REPORT 2015-16

Open Shelter

This is a programme for Integrated Child Protection Scheme in urban and semiurban areas to provide care, support and rehabilitation for the children. Open shelter caters to children in need of care and protection like beggars, street and working children, rag pickers, orphaned, deserted and trafficked children particularly those without home and family ties, vulnerable to abuse and exploitation, especially children of sex workers and pavement dwellers. The project provides shelter, nutrition, healthcare, sanitation and hygiene, safe drinking water, education and recreational facilities, protection against abuse and exploitation, enrolment in schools, vocational training and placement, health services, reducing drug and substance abuse and HIV/AIDS among street children.











ECCE

Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) is a project which aims to improve the quality and learning environment of children belonging to primary schools as well as ICDS (Anganwadi) centres. This project is carried out by BOSCO in partnership with Save the Children. The objective of the programme is to create a child friendly learning environment for supporting children's education in the slums of Bengaluru Urban. In this programme children were supported in 26 ICDS (Anganwadi) centres and 60 schools in 21 wards, out of which 55 schools are run by the government and 5 are private schools in the urban slums of Bengaluru.





The project 'Child Safety Net' was initiated for vulnerable children on the streets of Bangalore. The objective of the project is round the clock care and protection to children at risk; through the physical presence of the street educators/field animators


in the most vulnerable pockets of Bangalore city patrolling on rescue vehicles. It focuses on the rescue of vulnerable children, and bringing public awareness. It also creates awareness and advocacy with various Government Departments and formation of caring communities. In 2015-16, the CSN team has attended 58 cases of child labour, conducted 192 public awareness and door to door awareness programmes and 54 school awareness programmes.



Missing Child Bureau

BOSCO functions as the State Nodal Agency for the Missing Child Bureau (MCB) of the state of Karnataka. It works in collaboration with the Department of Women and Child Development and police in collecting and sharing information about missing and unaccompanied children by using the latest technology and strategy. MCB uses a web based

Rescue, Return & Rehabilitation

On the 29th of January, 2016, the morning brought shocking news for the good hearted people of Kolar. It was the untimely demise of an innocent child named Sashikiran, an inmate of Venkateshwara Orphan Educational Charitable Trust. As a result of this incident, an enquiry was done by KGF police and it led to the unnecessary detention of 19 more children in the institution. The arrest of the head of the institution caused panic among the orphans and semi orphan children.

A member of the Zilla Panchayat, took all the children to his residence at Ananthapura, Aavani Hobli without consulting or taking prior permission from any concerned personnel. The Missing Child Bureau District Cell got this information through the general public and acted upon it immediately along with DCPO and CWC. All the 19 children were taken back and given adequate facilities to stay at homes in KGF.

MCBDC started talking to these children and gathered information, based on which they started searching for parents and close relatives of the children. The astonishing result helped embrace a permanent solution to this issue and made sure that all 19 children are now safe with their parents and relatives.

Among the 19 children, 8 have a single parent and their beloved mothers are extremely happy to hold their children once again; 11 are orphans and have been taken in by their relatives. The follow up ensured that all the children are going to school regularly and leading a happy life.



Child MISS

Child MISS is a software cum web portal tool to assist documentation of both quantitative and qualitative data to create a database for the organization. It is networked with Homelink and the team focuses on documenting the information of vulnerable children of its networking partners. The Child MISS Program supports its partners to collect the data in systematic formats based on the JJ Act. The use of Child MISS would reduce re-typing the reports, helps in downloading the reports in needed formats such as CVS, Excel, Word, PDF, etc. The option of online editing and modification is provided which allows updating of the children's information regularly and makes it accessible, secured online use and view of data, maintaining data bank in cloud base without the use of system space.

Special Juvenile Police Unit

BOSCO through Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) has been assisting the police in handling cases in the two divisions of Bangalore city- South and West Divisions covering 35 police stations. The primary objective of SJPU is to create a child friendly approach while dealing with the children involved in criminal offences and thereby, ensuring their rights are not breached at any stage of the legal procedure. BOSCO SJPU wing conducts various public awareness programmes to prevent crimes by children. These programmes include special training for police officials and counseling sessions for both children charged with criminal offences and their parents. All serious cases are referred to Observation Home for further intervention by Juvenile Justice Board. BOSCO SJPU networks with various Government Departments and other NGOs.

Youth Parliament

Youth Parliament is a meeting of all the inmates of the centre, led by the youth themselves. In the meeting the office bearers are elected and the ordinary



and simple issues of the centre are solved by the members. The meeting usually takes place once in a month and all the members attempt to address the matters concerning the centre and their life there. It is a platform for the inmates to express their views and opinions freely to make a necessary transformation in their lives. It also inculcates in them a sense of ownership and a sense of belonging.

Psycho Social Interventions at the Government Run Juvenile Homes

BOSCO works with children in need of care and protection and with children in Government Homes. As per the Juvenile Justice Act, children are grouped under two broad categories, namely, children in need of care and protection and children who come into conflict with the law. BOSCO reaches out to children who are given shelter at the Government juvenile homes. Once children are placed in the Government children's home, periodic follow up is done by BOSCO. Special counseling sessions are planned for the needy to guide them with regard to changes in life. BOSCO also organizes cultural events and awareness programmes for these children. BOSCO staff takes initiative in motivating children and youth for doing skill training and encourage them to continue with their academics.

Kishore Goes Back to School

Kishore Kumar belongs to a very poor family. He has no father, and his mother struggles to make both ends meet. Kishore's elder brother has completed Std 10 and is looking for a job. His sister studied up to Std 9, is not interested in studying further and has taken up a small job. The family lives in a rented house paying a rent of Rs. 2,000 per month.

Currently, Kishore is studying in Std 7, but he was a school dropout when BOSCO staff spotted him wandering in the nearby areas of an Anganwadi centre. The BOSCO staff spoke to Kishore and asked about his details, his family, and his school and informed the same to the Coordinator of ECCE, BOSCO. Later, the Coordinator met the school teacher and spoke to her about Kishore and ensured that he continued going to school. When Kishore was asked to state the reason for discontinuing education he said that his teacher used to beat him, and so he had developed an aversion towards the teacher and the school.

At present, a regular follow up to ensure that the child is attending school daily is being done by BOSCO staff. Also, staff members keeps meeting Kishore to see that he completes his school education.

inspired the gathering of children with real life tales of people who achieved great things and came out in flying colours even when they had mountains of difficulties to overcome.






Stop Violence Against Children

Children's Sports Day Celebration at BOSCO







Research and Documentation

The department also has remarkably well maintained information on child data of the last three decades.

It has a library where books, journals, research papers, case studies and other private circulations on child-related articles are preserved for reference. Besides managing BOSCO website, updating and uploading reports on social media, NRD also coordinates the publication of newsletters, annual report and researches.

BOSCO and YaR

Headquartered in Delhi, Don Bosco National Forum for the Young at Risk, commonly called YaR is a National Network of Don Bosco organizations in India that are committed to the care and protection of the children/youth who are at risk. The term 'Young at Risk' embraces specific categories of children – such as street and vagrant children, runaways, unaccompanied children, child labourers, school dropouts, children of migrant manual labourers, refugees etc. BOSCO is an active member of the YaR network and joins hands with the YaR National Office to serve the young at risk in various ways.

Don Bosco YaR Forum has developed a new web portal, Child MISS (Management Information System & Services) to implement the concept of child care and protection system. BOSCO, Bangalore has been appointed as the Nodal Agency by Don Bosco YaR network in implementing the Child MISS program in the state of Karnataka and Kerala.

Another National YaR network programme in which BOSCO is part of is Participatory Action Research (PRA). This is a training and research programme to support YaR centres to be effective in caring for children with behavioural difficulties.

Volunteering

BOSCO Bangalore through its department of Human Resource is doing a wonderful program called "volunteer management". BOSCO is recognized and known far and wide, and its volunteers come from corporates, educational institutions, religious institutions and foreign countries. The presence of these volunteers in BOSCO programs like early intervention surveys, street presence programs, public awareness programs, fund-raising, research and the other support programmes in the different rehabilitation processes make BOSCO activities more vibrant.

During the reporting period BOSCO's human resource provided opportunities to 315 volunteers to serve. BOSCO would like to thank the schools and colleges, religious congregations and the individual volunteers for teaming up with us for the cause of changing the society. Furthermore, the 'motivating presence' of this young and cheerful faces, have positive impacts on BOSCO's services for the young.
