"History will judge us by the difference we make in the everyday lives of children" (Nelson Mandela). It is the constant endeavor of BOSCO to make a difference in the everyday lives of the vulnerable, deprived and marginalized children and youth in society.

It gives me great pleasure to place before you our Annual Report for the year 2018 to 2019. This year's annual report is a reflection of the heart of BOSCO towards the lost and hurting children in our society. It is a testament of relentless commitment, unceasing dedication, timely interventions and life changing decisions. The vision of our founder - Don Bosco - resonates in all our activities. We have but one mission: to ensure a full and fair life to all our young ones. From rescuing and counseling the children to reuniting them with their families or rehabilitating them, we aim to guide them through every stage of their journey. From shelters to placements, bridge education to life skills training, day care to higher education, we stand by them in creating a space and identity for themselves in this fast paced world. We teach them to take their pain and distress and create something positive and beautiful from it.

In the year that went by, BOSCO was able to rescue and rehabilitate 4829 children, home place 3079 children with their families, supported 628 children for academic education, 479 were given vocational training, 703 children were given supplementary education, 458 out of school children were school enrolled, 3069 children were provided short/long term shelter and 536 missing children were traced. Countless other lives were also touched through initiatives like child rights clubs, child rights education in schools, tuition centres, caring communities, mother's groups, and community leaders and adolescent girls' collectives in many slum communities.

This has been a year of great milestones and greater achievements. BOSCO received the 'Inspire Awards -2018-19' for social significance from The BRITT WORLD



WIDE (BWW) in collaboration with Parivartan Global Success Foundation, Mumbai, for its undeterred and relentless work among children and youth at risk. BOSCO also received a Certificate of Appreciation from the Zilla panchayat, Bengaluru Urban and Department of Public Instruction, Government of Karnataka, for its services for the betterment of schools in South-2, Bengaluru.

In the past one year, there were many supporters, donors, volunteers and well-wishers who stood by us and strengthened us in our efforts to reach out and protect the children/youth at risk. We would like to thank everyone who has helped, supported and contributed to support our efforts to serve the vulnerable young. 'Children are one-third of our population and all of our future.' In this world where children are hurt and exploited, BOSCO stands out as a beacon of light, ensuring a safer, kinder world where children can live with dignity, live with freedom and contribute meaningfully to the society. Our doors and our hearts are always open to the lost and hurting, and we move ahead in Don Bosco's path that, 'They may have life...life in all its fullness.'

This is the passion that BOSCO brings, in and through all its interventions. A wise man once said, "It is a greater loss to lose one's passion than to lose oneself in his passion." Jesus tells us to be the salt and light of the world (Mt 5:13-14). How do we live this passion as Salesians, in response to being called to be the "Salt and Light of the world?" Street Presence

Most children leave their families to live on the street because of family problems such as death of a parent, alcoholism of father, strained relationships with stepparents, parent separation, abuse, and family violence. They live in survival-mode, constantly having to be aware of their surroundings and fighting for their own safety. These circumstances lead children to engage in atypical behaviours, such as creating a new identity, using aggression frequently, and valuing relationships based on what can

be gained from them. This brings an abrupt end to their childhood and innocence. Therefore, BOSCO has round the clock street presence to rescue such children through counseling, medical assistance, providing food and shelter, organizing orientation camps and awareness programmes. Nearly 20 children are rescued daily from the streets. That is many thousands of children in a year. 86% of such children are taken back to their homes.



Rescue

BOSCO rescues run away children, child labourers, abandoned and orphaned children, abused and begging children, trafficked children, drug addicted children, migrant children, out of school children, victims of child marriage and sexual abuse, from railway platforms, bus terminals, factories, hotels, parks, markets, public places, etc. BOSCO's important components such as CHILDLINE, SJPU, Child Safety Net etc., collaborate with the Police and other Government Departments in crucial intervention for mass rescue operations and prevention of child right violations.

Love + Care >> Transformation

Varun (name changed), aged 11, hails from Bengaluru. He lost his father, Shankar, five years ago. His mother, Ashwini, is a domestic worker. He has a younger brother, Kishore, studying in LKG. Varun is in the 5th standard, studying in a government school in Bengaluru.

The mother had no time for the children due to her work schedule. Varun and his mother hardly spent time together. This resulted in Varun becoming aggressive, behaving rudely and also falling into the trap of anti-social elements in his locality. He developed the habit of smoking beedis. He dropped out of school. His mother had no control over him.

It was during the routine follow up of the Child Rights Clubs formed by BOSCO CREAM Programme, that one of the club members and teacher in-charge informed the BOSCO team about Varun. The team visited the child's home. The neighbors informed them that the child was not in good terms with his mother, did not listen to her, and was stubborn and obstinate. When the mother was contacted, she revealed the hostile behavior of the child.

She told that he was placed in a de-addiction centre as part of rehabilitation. The Director of CREAM Project and team visited the de-addiction Centre and after convincing the Centre in-Charge and the mother, Varun was released and re-enrolled in school. With continuous counseling and follow up, the child is now regular to school. He has also become a regular visitor to BOSCO Nilaya Centre. His teachers are happy and appreciated the efforts made by BOSCO to re-enroll the child.

CREAM

Child Rights Education and Action Movement (CREAM) was initiated in 2012 to establish child participation as the key face of child development. CREAM wants to achieve a high level of child participation in child development, promote child rights and ensure child protection by establishing the appropriate structures and networks in different areas of Bengaluru Urban. BOSCO is the nodal agency in implementing the programme. BOSCO works closely with children in schools and slum communities through the CREAM project to provide them with a platform to share ideas and empower them to address their own protection issues. It works through Tuition centers, Child rights clubs (CRCs), Schools,



Govt. departments, local administrative bodies and other stake holders in the society. Children become advocators of their rights and work to prevent any child rights violations. The child rights club acts as a powerful medium for bringing about transformation in society.

Empowering Shreya

Young 16-year-old Shreya is a testament to the life altering power of awareness and empowerment. Shreya, a simple girl who preferred to stay within the safety and anonymity of her home, was transformed into a capable leader with new dreams and aspirations. She says, "I was a girl who used to be at home, not involved in any other activity other than studying. But by participating in the CRC Club and Federation, I was able to remove my stage fear, and aim to be a good leader by learning leadership qualities."

The child right clubs open up a new world of possibil-

ities for children whose voices might otherwise never be heard. Shreya was selected as one of the BOSCO CRC Federation Leaders for the batch of 2017-2018. She is very thankful to BOSCO for giving her the opportunity to evolve by participating in many training programs and state level advocacy meetings. This exposure helped her excel in her academic life as well. Shreya secured 92.16% (576) in her SSLC exam. She even had the opportunity to meet the Education minister. Shreya aims to work hard, study well, and make a place for herself in the world.

Saroja B., Raichur

"I am Saroja B. I am from Raichur. I have been working in BOSCO since the last 3 months. This is my first experience working with children. My team members guided and supported me when I faced difficulties in my job. My director also helped me to solve the difficulties. She taught me and gave me suggestions, guidance, support, and also appreciated me. Before I joined, I had never heard of CWC which is working for children. Now, I have knowledge about the CWC system, children's follow up, the documents to be maintained, how to talk to the children, tracing the family, and talking with police to trace the family. It is very good experience for me, and has helped me in building my confidence.

I would like to thank BOSCO for giving this good opportunity to work."

Counseling

Many street children suffer from psychological and psychosocial problems like low self-esteem, loneliness, anxiety, depression, fear, feelings of hopelessness, feeling alone and afraid, and aggressive behavior, most of which are due to poverty, violence, conflict, lack of parenting, and sexual, physical and /or mental abuse. BOSCO addresses these problems by having them participate in individual and group counselling sessions conducted by professional counsellors. Counseling is also provided to the parents, guardians, and legal custodians of the rescued children.





Health Care

Children on the streets and in the slum areas regularly face a lot of health issues. Children rescued and sheltered in the BOSCO centers need to be constantly taken care of to deal with their health problems. The Health Care Department of BOSCO takes care of the medical services for the rehabilitation centers, slum communities and its operational areas by means of first aid, OPD, admission in the hospitals for serious health problems. Besides direct interventions, as many as 45 health and nutrition awareness programmes, 20 general health checkup camps, 9 dental camps and 5 eye camps were conducted during the year.

Non-Formal Education

Non-formal education is an organized educational activity outside the established formal system -intended to serve identifiable learning groups and learning objectives. The children rescued by BOS-CO are often school dropouts or have never been to school. In order to mainstream these children into formal schools, BOSCO adopts an education system which is relevant to the child's needs, appropriate to the child's development levels, flexible, participatory, inclusive, and protective of their rights to survival and development. Thus, classes are organized in different BOSCO shelter homes which prepare them for schooling. BOSCO also organizes classes for children beyond school age, to prepare them for open school exams in 10th standard, and to take up jobs according to the skills that they are trained in.



Education

BOSCO centres receive children from different programmes of BOSCO, Govt. Boys and Girls Home or directly through their family members. Children from various categories like street children, abandoned children, child labourers, children found begging, orphans, semi-orphans, children from poor backgrounds, children addicted to substances, children in conflict with the law, run-away children, etc., are enrolled in BOSCO centres for rehabilitation and undergo deep counselling and motivation to get into the mainstream. BOSCO, with its innovative strategies motivates these children to study and attend regular classes. Its centers such as BOSCO Vikas, BOSCO Rainbow Home and

BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan are dedicated to making the children develop a greater interest in their school education, while BOSCO Sumanahalli is dedicated to providing higher education to its resident pupils.

Huligamma Believes in Herself

Huligamma is a 16-year-old and she comes from a poor family in Muddatnur, Bellary district. Her mother passed away from an illness when she was very young. Her father works as a coolie. She is a single child. She dropped out of school in the 5th standard and has been staying with her father at home since then. Her father was an alcoholic. He would drink daily and scold Huligamma without any reason.

Tired of her father's ill treatment, she left home to stay with her aunt. But one day her father suddenly took her back home, and she realized that he had fixed her marriage to a 40 year-old relative. Huligamma was shocked by this new development. She did not want to get married to this 40 year old man, but all her pleas fell on deaf ears. Her father was determined to have his way. With no one to help her, this 16 year old child was left with no option but to leave home. She left home without telling her father and came to Bengaluru in the hope of finding a job and starting a new life.

It was while standing in the Majestic bus stand, thinking about what to do next, that a BOSCO staff mem-

ber who was present at the stand noticed her, heard her story and found that she needed help. She was rescued and taken to Vatsalya Bhavan on the instruction of the Child Welfare Committee. Her father was traced, contacted and asked to come to BOSCO with all the necessary documents. When asked about why his daughter left home, he admitted his part in the situation. Huligamma's father was then counseled about child rights and the legal marriageable age for girls. He was reminded about his duties as a father and his responsibility to protect his daughter from all harm.

As per procedure, the CWC was informed about the developments and according to their instruction, Huligamma and her father were produced before the committee. In the end, taking everything into consideration, it was decided that she should not be sent home with her father. She was enrolled in the Home for Girls.

BOSCO's commitment to children in need of care and protection safeguards the rights of countless children like Huligamma and gives them new beginnings.

Bridge Education

Children rescued from the streets and vulnerable pockets of Bengaluru, who are unable to return to their homes, are admitted to BOSCO centers. Here, skill training, non-formal education, creative learning, therapeutic counseling, mentoring, craft, play, art, etc. are provided to eliminate the deep rooted negative impact of street life or the problems faced by them at home due to unavoidable circumstances. The bridge schooling makes them school ready and focuses on their overall development and reintegration into mainstream society. During the current year 42 children were part of the Bridge Education.



Abandoned Child is Gathered in by BOSCO

A second chance in life is the silent plea of every street child. Yogi (name changed), a 6 year old boy, was thrown into the vulnerabilities of the street by his own mother. He was rescued by BOSCO staff one year back, after being spotted in a helpless condition on one of the busiest streets of Bengaluru. When the child was brought to BOSCO Mane, he was identified to have a severe speech and hearing disability. This was brought to the notice of the Health Care Department by the counselors, and the child was taken to Victoria Hospital, Bengaluru, for medical treatment.

He underwent several medical examinations by the multidisciplinary team in the hospital. Diagnosed as a child with borderline intelligence, he was recommended for remedial education, speech therapy and medication. With the continued care and support of the committed team at BOSCO, Yogi has gradually started showing signs of improvement. Currently the child is continuing with speech therapy and attends school regularly.

Vocational Training

BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre located in Sumanahalli is a seasoned vocational training centre for the youth from the age of 15 to 18 years. It extends its service to all young boys who are from dysfunctional families as well as poor youth from the neighbourhood who are passionate about acquiring a skill in life. Besides dispensing training in five trades such as carpentry, welding, bakery products, two-wheeler mechanics & electrical, the centre also organizes training in soft skills for the occupants as part of their curriculum. With the aspiration to create camaraderie among the youth and to strengthen the bond amongst them, besides generating an intensive interest in learning a skill, activities like youth meets, sports and picnics are organized from time to time. These activities help the youth gain certain skills to keep them off the street and get reintegrated into mainstream society.

Apart from the above mentioned trades, tailoring units are also functioning in BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan along with the Beautician Course being offered at BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan.

While BOSCO Sumanahalli provides computer education to the youth in Basic, Microsoft Office, Internet and Tally, BOSCO Mane provides computer training to youths focused on training for a job. Computer education is a four



month course, and during the last one year, 3 batches completed their course in Basic, Tally and Vocational training. During the last one year, 123 students were benefitted from the BOSCO Computer Training Centre. Among the students who were above 18, 29 have taken up computer related jobs in companies like-Accenture Pvt Ltd., Phone Pay, Joshi and Co, HDFC Bank, Swathi Pvt Ltd, Shanthilal Mehata & Co, BOSCO Nilaya Tuition Teacher (part time job), Flipkart computer related job, MPN Co, Max Nova co, and Medical Shop (Part time job).

Job Placement

Most youth come to Bengaluru in search of jobs. They are rescued and brought to Yuvodaya where they are counseled and later sent to BOSCO Yuvakendra. In Yuvakendra the youth are assisted and guided in finding suitable employment through motivation and training. The centre empowers the youth in the areas of employment and entrepreneurship. Youth who have undergone skill training at BOSCO's various vocational skill training centers are placed in jobs like welding, carpentry, computer data entry, screen printing, bakery, tailoring, sales, as electricians, mechanics etc. BOSCO is in constant contact with the employers who understand the situation and background of these youths and are ready to extend cooperation and offer them jobs. During the 2018-19 academic year, 167 youths were job placed in different companies involving screen printing, printing press, carpentry, welding, bookbinding, bakery, two-wheelers, driving, electronics, Coffee Day, caterings, hospital service, garments, small scale companies, graphic design, colleges, as office boys, salesmen, electricians etc.

Room Placement



Mainstreaming youths, aged 18-25, by leading them back to society as economically independent young adults is our ultimate goal. BOSCO helps youngsters in hiring rooms or renting a place along with other boys. They are equipped to pay for the accommodation. The purpose of room placement is to prep the youth for the metamorphosis from the cocooned life of institutionalized care to rooms where they have to manage on their own, facing the stark realities of life. BOSCO staff does regular follow up visits and arranges Past-Pupils get together. This year, BOSCO placed 4 new youth and followed up with 5 youth. 6 youth were provided job with accommodation.

I am Shwetha

"I am Shwetha. I am presently working in the Swathi Group, as an accountant. This is my first step in reaching my goal of becoming a Senior Accounts Manager. This happened because of BOSCO MANE. I belong to a poor family. I was not able to pay fees and go for computer classes. Then one of my friends referred me to BOSCO Mane. Here I learnt Basic and Tally courses which helped me a lot in learning about computer. This also helped me in getting a job. The life skill sessions and spoken English classes enhanced our skills to lead life in a better way, helped us to be more confident and have a positive approach towards life. I thank BOSCO and Creating Futures for motivating us and giving us a career and a secure future."



THE 2018-19 ANNUAL REPORT TEAM

Home Placement

Nearly 20 children are rescued daily from the railway stations, bus stands and other contact points in the streets of Bengaluru. 86% of such children are taken back to their homes as institutionalization is seen as the last resort. Thus Home Placement becomes one of the major activities of BOSCO. The children brought to Yuvodaya - Transit Home are counseled and encouraged to return home. BOS-CO's main aim is to reunite the children with their parents, as it believes that family is the most suitable place for a child to grow up in. The process includes call-



ing the parents or close relatives and handing over the child to them, and sometimes the staff accompanies the child back home. During the year a total of 1321 children were home placed from BOSCO.

Manjunatha Prints His Own Future

A woman in her mid-thirties approached BOSCO Yuvakendra with her 16 year old son, Manjunatha.K. Though she herself works for the welfare of distressed women in society, she is helpless, with nowhere to shelter. Kamakshi and Krishna got married 17 years ago against the wishes of their elders. But soon after Manjunatha's birth, they went their separate ways due to a difference of opinion. Krishna married another woman and settled somewhere in Bengaluru. To survive and fend for her son, Kamakshi joined an NGO and immersed herself in her work, leaving the child with relatives.

Manjunatha deprived of the love and care of his parents, grew up bearing the brunt of his relatives' sarcasm and taunts. To escape the unhappy situation at home, he joined different peer groups and started living life his own way. Slowly he started losing interest in school and his mother started receiving repeated complaints from school.

Kamakshi shifted her son to a hostel thinking it would bring some change in his behaviour, but in vain. Manjunatha had become very stubborn and got expelled from the hostel for disrespectful behaviour towards their staff. Kamakshi was at a complete loss as to how to save her son, when a colleague told her about BOSCO Yuvakendra. Without a second thought she decided to give up his upcoming 10th standard exam and approach Yuvakendra. Learning about his exams, the counsellor at Yuvakendra counseled both mother and child, and motivated him to take up the exam (exam was scheduled for the next day). The counsellor also spoke to the hostel authorities and succeeded in persuading them to let him stay in the hostel till his exams got over.

After his exams, Manjunatha was back at Yuvakendra, and he involved himself wholeheartedly in the screen printing training. Meanwhile, with repeated counseling, close follow up and motivational classes, he succeeded in passing his 10th supplementary exam, as he was not prepared for the exam the first time.

Kamakshi was beginning to lose all hope, when BO-SCO stepped in and transformed her son's life. She is grateful to BOSCO for renewing his interest in studies again. Manjunatha expressed his desire to continue his education. Keeping his best interests at heart, he was counseled and motivated to take up higher studies at BOSCO Sumanhalli. He got admission in Sri Gandhadakaval PU College for 1st PUC.

BOSCO'S PRESENCE IN THE COMMUNITIES

BOSCO aspires for a society that unreservedly cares for its children/youth at risk through various awareness creation programs and campaigns. BOSCO, being a rights-based organization, concentrates its effort on the holistic development of slum communities to promote child protection. To this end, the BOSCO team works closely with slum communities - especially women and children - on various issues such as health, shelter, food, education and women empowerment.



In 2018–19, the BOSCO team worked closely with various slum communities and ensured the following:

- » Birth registration of 73 new born babies and immunization of 295 children.
- » In total, 472 children were surveyed in which 31 children were identified as 2nd Grade SAM and 7 children were identified as 3rd Grade SAM. All SAM cases are referred to NRC.
- » 1624 people including children have undergone health check-ups during 15 health camps.
- » Nilaya supported 4222 families to get Aadhar cards, Ration cards, Voter ID cards, 45 birth certificates, 3 Disability certificates, 4 Aadhar Cards, 10 Bank Account, 17 Caste income, 3 Affidavit. 73 applied for Election ID card.
- » Nivas assisted in filing and procuring 3500 social security documents viz ration cards, Aadhar cards, BPL cards and voter ID cards, homes under housing schemes, autos and cabs, and other facilities listed

- under KMDC and BBMP schemes for the residents of the areas.
- » Urban Homelessness at all Wards in West and South divisions of Bengaluru Urban was organized in which 723 street dwellers were identified.
- » Water Problem in the Jolly Mohalla area was resolved by approaching the Ward Councillor.
- » 7 Civic Society Groups were formed and followed up
- » 240 women benefitted and were empowered through old age pensions, widow pensions, handicapped pensions, Manasvi scheme and several other Govt schemes.
- » 3 Nivas Open Shelter boys were referred to deaddiction centers.
- » 2 Ward Advocacy Meetings were organized by the children's collectives on issues related to water etc.



School and Tuition Centre

During the scholastic year, there were 458 new enrollments and re-enrollments from slum communities. About 616 children from the areas where BOSCO works, who proved to be eager learners, were given tuitions. BOSCO team worked with 20 ICDS (Anganwadi) centers and 30 schools of South and West Bengaluru. Special tuition for 9th and 10th standard children at BOSCO Nilaya, Karate class at J. C. Road, Spoken English class at BOSCO Nilaya, Digital center at BOSCO Nilaya, Badminton Coaching class at BOSCO's New Campus, Ramanna Garden, Computer class at BOSCO Nilaya during summer vacation were some of the special achievements during the year.

The Journey of Maruthi!

Maruthi Prakash Mavarkar hails from Bagalkot, Mudhol Taluk. He is an orphan and a 9th standard school dropout. He was in the care of his maternal uncle, when he left home and came to Bengaluru in November 2017. After trying his hand at various odd jobs for almost three months, he ended up in the Majestic bus stand, and was rescued by BOSCO.

He spent a few days at BOSCO Yuvodaya and was later transferred to BOSCO Yuvakendra. After staying at the centre for two months, as he expressed a desire to undergo skill training in two-wheeler mechanics, he was sent to BOSCO Sumanahalli, the Life Skill training centre.

Maruthi showed a keen interest in learning the trade and completed the six months course in two-wheeler mechanics. While undergoing skill training, he persistently informed the counsellors and authorities at the centre that he wants to continue his studies. Considering his sustained interest, he was referred to Don Bosco Yuvakaragrama, Ajjanahalli, Magadi. He was directly admitted to the 10th Standard in the Rural Residential High School in Ajjanahalli.

He continued his studies, staying at the centre. Maruthi appeared for his SSLC exam and scored 401/625 (64.16 %¬). Now he wishes to go back to stay with his maternal uncle and sister. He wants to stay with his family and continue his education. His dream is to have his own two-wheeler showroom.

Maruthi says, "Had it not been for the care and support that I received at the BOSCO institutions, I would have reached nowhere in life."

Advocacy



BOSCO becomes the voice of the marginalized children/ youth at the Government, and relevant departments and institutions for better policies, laws and schemes for their protection, care and welfare. BOSCO works with Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Junvenile Justice Board (JJB), Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (KSCPCR), Integrated Child Protection Society (ICPC) State Committee, CPP Committee and Drafting Committee for foster care guidelines. BOSCO in Collaboration with the Government has four rescue booths- bus stands and railway stations; implements two CHILDLINE projects-which respond to the CHILDLINE, an emergency helpline 1098 for children in need of care and protection calls on 24/7 basis; is a Nodal Agency for Missing Child Bureau; implements Open Shelter; is assisting Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) in South and West Divisions of Bengaluru in the care and protection of children and children in conflict with the law to undergo the legal process and reintegrate them into society.

BOSCO is directly involved with the communities, especially slums, to ensure that their basic rights are protected. It conducts various field visits to study the communities in crisis and advocate for their essential needs. BOSCO's strategy of conducting awareness programmes for the well-being of the slum community involves spreading awareness about child rights, health care, women empowerment, etc. and ground level work.

Dinesh Gets a New Life

The greatest achievements in life often come after the greatest challenges.

I am Dinesh Kumar hailing from Bengaluru. I lost my parents at the age of three and became an orphan. Even though I lost hope at that young age, I did not give up. After a few days, the family of a doctor adopted me. While growing up, I couldn't bear the ill-treatment at home and I ran away so many times. Finally I decided to leave my home for good.

When I left home, I had nothing except the clothes I was wearing. I left home and settled down on a street on Hosur Road, and did odd jobs till one day I heard about a place in Tirupati where I could get free food and shelter. So, I went to Tirupati. As I didn't feel like staying there, I returned to Bengaluru. A police man found me and referred to BOSCO.

I have been in BOSCO for more than twelve years now. I received education, care, shelter and love. I feel that I am really blessed by Almighty God. Things that happen to us at the beginning of our lives and during our childhood, very often have a great impact on our entire existence in this world. The best thing that can happen to a person in his early years is a revelation of what he is supposed to do in life.

It wouldn't be an exaggeration to say that one of the most important aspects of our lives is our work, something to which we dedicate most of our time, and to choose the right option from the very beginning is an exceptional blessing. In my opinion, one of the most difficult steps in every beginning is to actually choose what to do, and to choose it correctly.

Sometimes I have failed in my own rights, but I think, that is normal. All of us at one point or the other have faced challenges and difficulties. I am grateful to my mentors, Sheeba aunty, Manavi aunty, Silvy aunty and Bharathi aunty who have tried to change my behaviour through counselling, motivation etc. I really thank you for your hard work and moulding me into the person I am today.

I am really thankful to Fr. George PS who believed in me and gave me a second chance to study in BOSCO Vikas, and who also supported me with various learning activities. I am grateful to another mentor, MD. Shafi who motivated me and helped me identify and nurture my talents.

Joji uncle is another significant person in my life. He supported me in pursuing higher studies, PUC at St. Joseph College and Degree at Christ University. Fr. Mathew, Fr. John and Fr. Rubin have accompanied me throughout my academic journey with their guidance and motivation. Currently, I have just finished my Bachelor's Degree in Hotel Management from Christ University (A four-year course). The course which I specialized in is kitchen and bakery. I also did an additional course in marketing.

Thank you BOSCO for making me who I am!"

Women Empowerment

Very often it is the women who run the family with their meager income, shouldering the burden of sick parents and young children since the men are alcoholics, have deserted the families or are no more. Against this socio-economic background, BOSCO aims at empowering women to educate their children and enable them to lead respectful lives in society.



- » BOSCO has strengthened Mother's groups across 20 ICDS centers through 40 sessions. A total of 423 mothers were capacitated on emergent literacy and maths.
- » The Mothers raised their voice and made a strong statement regarding a child abuse case in Ramanna Garden and made sure that the child is provided with necessary medical and legal assistance.
- » Mothers and SHG members from Venkataram Nagar approached Mr. Zameer Ahmad Khan, MLA, regarding own space for the Anganawadi in the area and have managed to get a space. Meanwhile they are in the process of finding funds for the construction of the Anganwadi.
- » In Ramanna Garden, Mothers got the garbage dumped near the AWC entrance cleared by approaching local authorities.
- » Many parents are sponsoring vegetables, fruits, their children's birthday celebrations. Some parents have sponsored electric wires, fans, etc.
- » Four mothers were enrolled in the Computer class and 2 mothers were enrolled in Tailoring (Vocational skill training) at BOSCO.

Zena Gets her Right to Education

Zena (name changed), age 16, a resident of Broadway Street, Shivajinagar, lives with her parents and younger sibling. Zena's father is a tailor by profession and her mother a housewife. Her family is from Mumbai, but shifted to Bengaluru some years earlier.

When in Bengaluru, the children were studying in the VKO Government School in Tasker Town, Shivajinagar. When Zena was in the 7th standard, the family shifted back to Mumbai. For three years they lived there, and Zena and her brother were enrolled in the same class in a government Urdu school. When the children were in the ninth, Zena's parents fell sick and were hospitalised for several months, because of which her brother was not able to write his final exam. While Zena completed her ninth standard, her brother lost a year as he was busy taking care of their parents.

In April, the family relocated to Bengaluru and once again started the process of seeking admission for the children in schools close to home. During the SKNN campaign, the family saw the Nivas team moving with the rally along Broadway Street, propagating enrolment and re-enrolment of drop outs into school. Impressed by the effective way the rally was conducted, the couple approached them for help in enrolling their children in school.

Having assured the parents of complete support, the children were escorted to VKO School. Before visiting the school, team Nivas happened to visit the BEO office. When the team visited the school, the Headmistress informed them that admissions were closed and there were no seats available. After confirming with the BEO, admission forms were issued to the children. Finally, when Zena went to school, she was pulled up for attending class without being enrolled in school. Even though all the admission formalities were completed, Zena's parents were harassed to the maximum. The Nivas team confronted the school authorities and informed them that this was a direct violation of the child's rights.

Intervention of the BEO, and the intention to contact KSCPCR member, Mr. Mariswamy, made the school authorities wake up and realize the consequences of stopping the child's admission. The Nivas team's tireless efforts helped enforce the basic right of this child: her right to education.

Networking

Stakeholders can affect or be affected by the Organization's actions, objectives and policies. BOSCO has been instrumental in expanding its wings, exploring newer shores of the government machinery, conducting convergence meetings with various departments, interacting, seeking permission and establishing rapport, meeting

Commissioners of Police, RPF, GRPF, Railway and Bus Stand officials, AHTU, child rights clubs, NGOs, school teachers, parents, SDMC members, local leaders of the ward, Returning Officers, SIO members, WCD, ICPS, labor departments, Education Department officials, Health Departments, Law Enforcement and Legal System, etc.

Kanthraju "I am an under graduate. My relative referred me to BOSCO Mane for the Basic Course. After the completion of the course I have joined Flipkart. I am working in a computer related job. I am very grateful to BOSCO."

Shamala "I completed 10th standard, and was not able to continue my education due to the financial crisis at home. My neighbour referred me to this place. After coming here I realised the importance of this course. I not only completed my computer course but was also benefitted with Life Skill Education and Spoken English Classes. Now I am a more confident person."

Ayesha "BOSCO has been working in my area, Mackan Compound for four years, and I have been attending tuitions for the past three years. I have learnt a lot from the tuitions....values like discipline, punctuality, respect, and above all my rights. I'm empowered by these tuitions. I have learnt the importance of education from my teachers in tuitions. I have learnt to fight for my rights. Being the CRC leader, I have to show the way to others. I enjoy and look forward to taking part in all the activities of BOSCO, especially sports. In the tuitions, we are not only tutored, but are also motivated, guided, inspired, taught values and rewarded for our performances. Thank you Nivas for giving me the opportunity to prove myself."

CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE 1098 is a 24/7 toll-free National emergency helpline for children in need of care and protection. Any concerned adult or a child can dial 1098, the toll-free number to access the services. CHILDLINE is a platform bringing together the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Government of India, Department of Telecommunications, street and community youth, non-profit organizations, academic institutions, the corporate sector and concerned individuals. On May 16, 2002, BOSCO Bengaluru began to function as the collaborative organization of CHILDLINE.

CHILDLINE works for the protection of the rights of all children in general. But the special focus is on all children in need of care and protection, especially the more vulnerable sections, which include: Street children and youth

living alone on the streets, Child laborers working in the unorganized and organized sectors, Domestic help, especially girl domestics, Children affected by physical / sexual / emotional abuse in family, schools or institutions, Children who need emotional support and guidance, Children of commercial sex workers, Child victims of the flesh trade, Victims of child trafficking, Children abandoned by parents or guardians, Missing children, Run away children, Children who are victims of substance abuse, Differently-abled children, Children in conflict with the law, Children in institutions, Mentally challenged children, HIV/ AIDS infected children, Children affected by conflict and disaster, Child political refugees, Children whose families are in crises.

Railway CHILDLINE

Krantiveera Sangolli Rayanna Railway Station, Bengaluru is a huge area with 10 platforms where every day around 219 trains arrive and depart carrying passengers from allover India. So is the child inflow-children coming from different districts of Karnataka, different states of India and neighboring countries like Nepal, Bhutan and Bangladesh for various reasons like seeking employment, eloping, for fun, exam fear etc.

From the time of inception, railway station has been the core rescue area of BOSCO. Railway CHILDLINE is a project jointly initiated by the Department of Women and Child Development and the Indian Railways in 2015. Its aims to rescue children from the railway station and the surrounding areas, provide counseling to the children and reintegrate them with their family members. The procedure, from rescue through reintegration, involves several stages such as collecting details of the children, producing the children before the Child Health Group (CHG), send-



ing them to the open shelter and finally producing them before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). Bengaluru Railway CHILDLINE has also collaborated with the Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives (APPI) since April 2018.

Deepak Returns Home

Deepak Kumar was 10 years old when he dropped out of school in the 4th standard and came with his father, Suresh Raj Bansi, and mother, Sunmantidevi, to Bengaluru from Chandipur Village, Nawada District, Bihar. He has a younger brother and a younger sister. He recalled that they came to Bengaluru two years ago.

In the month of September, his parents had apparently sent him to Bihar along with another person from his village. But at the railway station platform, he lost track of the person who had accompanied him as there was a huge crowd. Although he had a contact number, the number was wrong. On November 27, 2018, he was referred to BOSCO Mane, Chamarajpet, from CWC, for temporary shelter.

On December 07, 2018, CHILDLINE counselled the boy. Deepak Kumar said that he would like to return to his native place, Chandipur.

CHILDLINE BOSCO, Bengaluru, contacted CHILDLINE Gaya through the Regional Research Centre and traced the address and family of Deepak Kumar in Bihar. As the contact number of the parents of Deepak Kumar was provided, the team contacted them and informed about the child. The father of the child came to CHILDLINE office on December 29, 2018 with the original documents and proved his identity. The CHILDLINE team accompanied the child and his father to the Child Welfare Committee. The CWC passed an order to send the child along with his father. The father of the child thanked CHILDLINE and said that he would re-enroll the child to mainstream school in his village.

Keerthana's Many Lives

Keerthana is the 17-year-old daughter of a daily wage construction worker. Keerthana did not have the happy childhood that every child deserves. Her whole life changed when her father was accused of murdering her mother under the influence of alcohol. After her mother's death, Keerthana went to live in her uncle's house, where she spent the greater part of her 17 years.

In August of 2018, Keerthana was found at the KSR railway station by the BOSCO Railway CHILDLINE team. She told them that about 2 years ago she had fallen in love with a man who owns a small grocery store. When the boy told his parents about their relationship, they readily accepted it under one condition that the marriage should happen only after Keerthana turns 18. But the situation was totally different at Keerthana's end. Her relatives did not approve of their relationship and this led to a clash between the two families. The situation worsened to such an extent that the police had to be called to reach a compromise. But, the girl and the boy were not happy with the compromise, and decided to leave home and come to Bengaluru.

Though the team found many discrepancies in her story, such as Keerthana not being able to explain the absence of the boy, she was rescued and sent to BOS-CO Vatsalya Bhavan. The next day, during counselling, Keerthana had another story to tell the counsellor. She said that everything that she had said the previous day was a lie and she had run away from home because her uncle was making sexual advances towards her. But on cross checking this piece of information, it was found that this too was a lie. On contacting the boy whom she claimed to be in love with, he said that he was never in love with her. It was the girl who was always stalking him.

All the upheaval of the past few days was taking its toll on Keerthana, and she started showing signs of frustration. Keerthana was produced before the CWC and referred to the Government Girls Home. She is undergoing in depth counselling at the Home.

The BOSCO Railway CHILDLINE rescues and restores so many such lives on a daily basis; lives that would otherwise have become just a statistic on the street.

Foster Care

Foster care refers to a temporary arrangement for children who are in a difficult period in their lives such as orphans/semi-orphans and children who do not have a family of their own. These children are placed in a home, individually or in a group, of foster parents certified by the State. BOSCO Foster Care works in collaboration with various Government Departments, Government Homes and other NGOs. The activities of BOSCO Foster Care include identifying the potential foster parents, counseling them, identifying and preparing children for going into Foster Care, visiting homes of the potential foster parents, visiting children at school to ensure their well-being and growth, organizing training and advocacy at the NGO and Government level as well as maintaining systematic documentation. Awareness about foster care programme was created in 23 districts of Karnataka for the Panchayat Raj Institutions, Anganwadi Motherhood Groups, ICDS Teachers, Asha Workers, Community based Task Force Groups, Child Rights Clubs, SHGs, Religious Communities, Corporate Groups, NGOs, WCD officials, CWC members,

After Care

The Government of Karnataka is formulating an After Care scheme for children who have to leave the child care institutions upon attaining 18 years of age. Most often the children in the children's homes are not ready yet to integrate themselves into the society and live independent lives there when they attain 18 years of age. Such children require after care support.

BOSCO is closely working with the Government in coming up with the After Care Scheme. BOSCO's programme of after care support for the social integration of youth involves higher education, skill training, job placement, room placement and past pupils' association. This programme encourages them to pursue education in high schools, ITI, Polytechnic and Colleges and also helps them to secure a job, and brings them to the main stream of society ensuring financial sustainability and life settlement.

Open Shelter

BOSCO Yuvodaya and Yuvakendra serve as open shelters for children on the streets who are away from their families. Shelter, food, counseling, health care, literacy, informal education, recreation and entertainment, possibilities of education and skill training, home reunification etc. Open shelters are not permanent in nature but are transit homes. The children who make use of BOSCO Open shelters come from the out reach areas such as: railway station, bus stand and the various other contact

points on the streets of Bengaluru. Families of these children are traced through the police or with the help of the MCB, Anganwadis, Panchayats etc. and these children are encouraged to return to their homes.



Open Shelters were able to rescue and rehabilitate 2093 children from railway stations, bus stations and various parts of Bengaluru city.

Imam Returns Home, Finally

From Jasta Village, Rampur District, West Bengal, comes 17-year- old Imam. His father works as a vendor and his mother is a housewife. He has one sibling. Imam had to drop out of school in the 9th standard due to poverty. He says that he had previously worked in Odisha for 2 years at a construction site. Recently an agent promising to take him to Delhi, brought him to Bengaluru instead and left him here. He did not even have his ID proof with him. Not knowing where to go, he ended up at the railway station and was on the street for more than 4 days when he was rescued and brought to BOSCO Yuvodaya.

When Imam came to the open shelter he was doing well, but the next night he started showing signs of convulsion and was immediately taken to the hospital. He was admitted there and discharged on 26/02/19. After a day's rest he was produced before the CWC on 28/02/19. The discharge summary and all his medical documents were produced before the CWC.

But the CWC was also unable to accurately trace the child's address and thus requested BOSCO to escort the child to his house. A BOSCO outreach worker, with a transfer order, was sent along with the boy to West Bengal. Once they reached his village, it was not difficult to find his house, as the boy's poster was stuck everywhere along the streets. Imam was taken to the related Boys Home and handed over with all the relevant documents. Imam was then successfully reunited with his parents.

Early Childhood Care and Education

Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) is a project which aims at ensuring improved learning levels of marginalized children in Government preschool and primary schools and a smooth transition from pre-school to primary education. The objective of the programme is to create child-friendly learning environments for supporting children's education in the slums of Bengaluru Urban. In this programme 241children were supported in 20 ICDS (Anganwadi) centers and 276 children were enrolled in 30 schools of Bengaluru.



Child Safety Net (CSN)

The main objective of the project is to give care and protection for children from any kind of risk round the clock (24x7). The presence of street educators/field animators at different locations through patrolling on a rescue vehicle in the most vulnerable pockets of Bengaluru West has played a major role in protecting children and their rights. The team also creates awareness, does advocacy with various Government Departments and is involved in the formation of caring communities.

During the last one year, the team rescued 374 children who were child labourers, beggars, rag pickers, street children, runaway children etc. Through its area focused patrolling, the team was able to bring down child labour. The total number of employers, who were warned, was 98 during the daily visits of the CSN team with the help of the patrolling vehicle to the identified areas. The team has created awareness among people about the presence of a team which keeps vigilance around the clock on chil-



dren and their rights, besides, creating awareness among people on the JJ Act.

The CSN team conducted 144 public awareness and door to door awareness programmes, 12 community awareness programmes, 66 apartment awareness programmes, 72 shop to shop awareness programmes and 55 school awareness programmes.

Bharat Finds a New Home

Bharath, a resident of Kengeri, Bengaluru, lost his parents at an early age. He ran away from his home in Kengeri to Mandya. He was resuced from there and produced before the Mandya Child Welfare Committee (CWC). After listening to the child, the CWC transferred his case to Bengaluru CWC. Bengaluru CWC instructed that the child be placed in BOSCO Mane for the Bridge course.

In the meantime, BOSCO Foster Care team found a potential foster parent, Mr. Chandrappa Jogi from Shivamogga, who was ready to welcome the child into his family. With the permission of the CWC, the Foster Care team placed him with Mr. Jogi's family. The family has enrolled Bharat in school. He is now a happy boy, enjoying the love and care of his foster parents. Bharat is very happy and thankful to BOSCO for finding him a loving and caring family.

Navya Finds Her Voice

Unable to mingle and play with other children her age, 4-year-old Navya was not able to speak and express herself. She had a stammering problem. She was also very inactive at home. According to the advice of her pediatrician, Navya's parents enrolled her in the Venkatramnagar anganwadi. With the help of speech therapy from the hospital and the dedication

of the cluster coordinator and the anganwadi teacher, Navya gradually began learning to speak.

Now Navya is a very active, happy child who always has lots to say. During the Mothers' meeting, Navya's mother could not thank the ECCE staff enough for their commitment and dedication.

Missing Child Bureau

Missing Child Bureau Karnataka (MCB) has been established as per the Juvenile Justice Act 2000 (JJ Act-care and protection of the children). BOSCO functions as the State Nodal Agency for the Missing Child Bureau (MCB) of the state of Karnataka. It works in collaboration with the Department of Women and Child Development and police in collecting and sharing information about missing and unaccompanied children by using the latest technologies and strategies. BOSCO monitors the entire project

for the better implementation and convergence of data of the missing and unaccompanied children under a single window system. It also acts as a link between the DWCD, the police and the partner NGOs in their operations. MCB uses a web based technology (Child MISS) to track and trace missing children. It also collaborates with NGOS in all the districts of the state of Karnataka who carry out missing complaint registration and other related work.





Child MISS



Child MISS is software cum web portal tool to assist documentation of both quantitative and qualitative data to create a database for the organization. It is networked with Home link, and the team focuses on documenting the information of vulnerable children of its networking partners. The Child MISS Programme supports its partners to collect the data in systematic formats based on the JJ Act. The use of Child MISS reduces re-typing the reports and helps download them in formats such as CVS, Excel, Word, PDF, etc. The option of online editing and modification enables regular updating of information and makes it accessible and secure for online use and viewing, maintaining the data bank in the cloud without the use of system space.

jective of SJPU is to create a child friendly approach while dealing with the children involved in criminal offences and thereby ensuring that their rights are not breached at any stage of the legal procedure. BOSCO SJPU conducts public awareness programmes to prevent crimes by children. These programmes include special training for police officials and counseling sessions for children charged with criminal offences and their parents. All serious cases are referred to the Observation Home for further intervention by Juvenile Justice Board. BOSCO SJPU networks with various Government Departments and other NGOs.



Getting Punith Safely Home

Punith is from Thindlu, near Kodigehalli, Bengaluru North. He is a 15-year-old studying in the 6th standard of a government school. His father is a daily wage worker and his mother is a housewife. Punith is a mentally challenged child. On 25/4/2018, he went out with his friends as usual to play. But that day he did not come back home. He got inside a train with his friends, but lost them somewhere along the way.

On 10/5/2018, Punith somehow reached Mangalore. The Mangalore railway police saw him roaming near the station premises and collected his details. He told them that he is from Bengaluru but was unable to recollect his house address. So he was referred to the Mangalore Government Boys Home.

By this time, Punith's parents were frantically searching for him. They had given a missing complaint in the Kodigehalli Police Station, Bengaluru and had filed a FIR. They had also given a Missing complaint to the BOSCO MCB. During the follow up in the Missing Cit-

izen Website, MCB staff member found a match for Punith's photo. She immediately called the Mangalore MCBDC Staff, Mr. Yogesh, and gave him all the details of the child and told him to check in the Government Boys Home. Mr. Yogesh confirmed that it was the same child. He immediately passed on the information to MCB staff and she informed the parents. Punith's photo was also sent through WhatsApp to his parents for confirmation, and they confirmed his identity.

On 7/6/2018, Punith's parents travelled to Mangalore, and with help of Mr. Yogesh, reached the Mangalore Government Boys Home. After meeting the Mangalore DCPO and submitting the child's ID proof, Punith was handed over to his parents. His parents were relieved to see their son safe and unharmed. They thanked the MCB for their wholehearted commitment to children in need and the countless lives they touch through their dedication and perseverance.

Youth Parliament and Child Rights Clubs

Youth parliament is a meeting of all the residents of the centers where leadership is taken by the youth themselves. In the meeting the office bearers are elected. The meeting usually takes place once a month and all the members attempt to address the matters concerning the center and their life there. It also inculcates in them a sense of ownership and a sense of belonging. During the year 12 meetings were conducted in Yuvakendra, Vatsalya Bhavan and Rainbow Home centers each.

BOSCO has formed 84 Child Rights Clubs (CRCs) in the schools and communities that it is working in. 1609 children are active members of these clubs. CRC District Federation was also formed during the year. Club members meet monthly with their animator and discuss current child-related issues, particularly those pertaining to their studies and respective schools.



The CRCs got busy through the year exercising their rights, advocating cause of school drop outs, re-enrolling them into schools, strongly voicing their safety issues, injudicious homework, planning strategies to enhance learning, motivating drop outs to enter the main stream of education, also participating in all the activities of the centre. Children learnt that being a good human, cultivating good habits, adhering to the values, avoiding procrastination, befriending the subjects, course books, valuing time, persevering, as the keys to success.

Through their timely intervention, CRCs were able to rescue and resolve 31 children irregular to school, 26 dropouts,16 child labourers, 5 CHILDLINE calls, 2 physical abuse cases, 1eve teasing case, 3 child marriages, 1 child sexual abuse case with the support of BOSCO CHILDLINE, BOSCO SJPU, Police department, CWC, School Teachers, H.M, SDMCs and AWC teacher during the year.



Adolescent Girls' Collectives

7 Adolescent Girls' Collectives comprising of 125 girls were established in Shivajinagar and KR Market areas during the year. Through various strategies, girls were empowered, guided on various topics such as adolescent issues, changes, child rights and related laws, Government facilities for adolescent girls, menstrual health and hygiene, online safety measures and awareness on issues like maintaining cordial relationships and personal hygiene, shunning undue friendships with either sex, ac-

cepting and accounting for their actions, recognizing their responsibility towards the society, stress management, protecting children from violence, protection mechanisms.

Through their regular meetings children were seen advocating for various issues in their communities regarding insufficient water supply; presence of out of school children in their respective areas; eve teasing; absence of teachers in the schools, garbage clearance and so on.





Rescued Happily

Saroja and Pooja are cousins. Saroja is 11 years old and the daughter of Hanumanthappa and Chandramma. Saroja is the youngest of seven children; she has three elder brothers and three elder sisters. Pooja is ten years old and the youngest daughter of Shekappa and Kalavva, originally from a village called Padmavatipur in Ranebennur, Karnataka.

Their parents entrusted the children in the hands of a woman from their native place, to take care of them. However the woman came to Bengaluru with the children. She mistreated both of them and made them do a lot of work in and around the house. According to Saroja and Pooja, the woman tortured and abused them. She forced them to wash clothes, dishes, clean the house and do all the work in and around the house. Moreover they were not given proper food, rest or time to sleep. The girls did not have proper access to water either.

At first the girls were frightened and did not know what to do. They could not contact anyone because they did not have access to the phone and were not allowed to go out of the house. On the third day of their stay, they decided to wake up early in the morning and escape. They managed to run away from the house without anyone finding out. They wanted to go back home to their parents.

The CSN team rescued the children when they were wandering around Mahalaxmi Layout. Initially they were not ready to talk. However after offering them food and water, they started opening up to the team and gave them all the necessary details. The CWC chairperson, Ms Anjali Ramanna, was informed and she advised the team to hand the children over to their parents if they had the proper documents. The girls were then taken to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan, where they were instructed to hand over the children only if parents had necessary documents.

The girls' parents were traced, and were called to the centre. Their parents were very thankful to the entire organization and the CSN team for averting a disaster and returning their children back to them; safe and sound. Right now the girls are back home with their parents; happy and safe.

Mr. Gunasekar, Anandhpuram Area Leader and Social Worker

"In Anandhpuram, for the past one and half years, BOSCO has been working for the betterment of children and youth through tuition centers and referrals to vocational skill training and rehabilitation centers. BOSCO is also working in other vulnerable areas all over the world. BOSCO is like a parent for the children in need. BOSCO provides shelter, food, education and even recreational activities for the betterment of children.

There are children who are studying well but due to their economic background they are unable to continue their studies. But with the assistance of BOSCO, these children have got the opportunity to study well and become role models for others. I suggest working with children, especially adolescent girls whose rights have been violated and motivate them to become achievers. Let's all do it together to create a child friendly environment."

Karate Clubs

Started in December 2017, Karate classes are held at BOSCO Nilaya, Shivajinagar areas and Ramanna Garden every Saturday afternoon. 180 children from these areas are regularly getting the benefits of Karate coaching. The course is divided into 4 stages such as basic exercise, punch, leg works and kata, and lastly basic kata. Each stage is a minimum 3 months of duration depending on the child's strength. Presently all the children are in the 3rd stage of coaching.

Self-defense sessions were also conducted during Summer and Dasara camps at BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Nilaya. Karate classes have helped children to learn self-discipline, teamwork and have acted as stress buster. It had also improved flexibility and mental concentration. In total, 150 children are benefitted through the session.

Adjacent Railway Street Presence (ARSP)

BOSCO team is present in Cantonment, East, Kengeri, Bidadi, and Yelahanka Railway Stations and Satellite Bus Stand of Bengaluru identifying children at risk and who are in need of care and protection. The team carries out awareness programmes in the adjacent areas of the railway stations and Satellite Bus Stand, in the railway and bus station platforms, nearby schools, moving trains, educating the stakeholders, public and children about child rights, child protection mechanisms, Child Helpline -1098 and CHILDLINE.

During the year ARSP team rescued and rehabilitated 799 boys and 88 girls. Two tuition centres were opened in Yelahanka and Satellite Bus Stand areas during the year in order to provide supplementary education to the area children.



MAJOR EVENTS AND PROGRAMMES 2018 -2019

CAMPAIGNS

World Day against Child Labour

BOSCO observed 'World Day against Child Labour', in Bengaluru, on the theme "Abolish Child Labour and Save Childhood" on June 12, 2018.

The campaign was inaugurated in the presence of Jagadeesh M, President, Jaya Karnataka, Bapujinagar, Bengaluru, Fr. Mathew Thomas, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru and Fr. Prasad SDB, Director, BOSCO CHILD-LINE, Bengaluru at Bapujinagar, Bengaluru. The campaign in Bengaluru Railway Station was inaugurated by Mr. Iqbal Ahmed, Dy. Station Manager, Bengaluru Railway Station, Mr. Laxmiprashanth, APSA, Bengaluru and the Directors of BOSCO. Children from the various centres of BOSCO

performed a 'Mime' at the City Railway Station, BMTC Bus Stand, Majestic, Bapujinagar, Kengeri Bus Stand, Pantharapalya, Vijayanagar, KP Agrahara, JJR Nagar, KR Market and Kalasipalya areas of Bengaluru, to create awareness among the public about child labour in Bengaluru. The public were made aware of their responsibility to send children to school instead of pushing them into child labour. The message was disseminated through distribution of pamphlets, shouting slogans and exhibiting placards. Over two thousand people were reached out to in various parts of the city.



World Yoga Day at Bosco Nivas

International Yoga Day was celebrated at Mackan Compound and Nehrupuram areas of Shivajinagar, Bengaluru at the two tuition centres by BOSCO Nivas, Bengaluru,

on June 21, 2018. Children were given an introduction about the term yoga, which implies a group of physical, mental and spiritual practices which originated in ancient India and could be considered as a disciplined method to attain integral well-being and harmony.

Children were given a demonstration of the various asanas and yogic exercises, which the children performed. Children were briefed about the physical and mental benefits of yoga such as increased flexibility, strength, balance, stami-

na, improved body alignment, stress reduction, awareness and improved self- confidence. Forty-five children participated in the program.



Shale Kade Nanna Nade School Enrollment Campaign



Inauguration of the week-long enrollment and re-enrollment awareness campaign of school drop outs, and out of school children into mainstream schools - ShaaleKade Nanna Nade was flagged off in the working areas of BOS-CO Bengaluru on May 20, 2019.

Focus Group Discussions/Consultations/ Review Meetings/ Networking Meetings

State Level Consultation on Foster Care

State Level Consultation on Foster Care was organized by Fr. Joy Nedumparambil, Executive Director, BREADS, Bengaluru, for 10 NGOs of various districts of Karnataka at Provincial House, Bengaluru on June 6, 2018. Fr. Joy welcomed the NGO participants and introduced Foster Care Program and BOSCO and its activities to them. Mr. Shivamallu, Coordinator, BOSCO Foster Care Program started the session with the meaning of Foster care and the reasons for implementing foster care as an alternative family care for the children.

Ms Akshitha, Social Mobiliser, Foster Care Program, explained about child rights, foster care concept, types of foster care, selection criteria of parents & children, rights of children in foster family, responsibilities of foster parents, different levels of awareness programs, case study file of parents & children, placement of children and follow up of children.



Awareness materials were distributed to the Directors representing their NGOs. Forty-one NGO participants representing ten districts of Karnataka attended the consultation.

Focus Group Discussions



Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU), BOSCO, Bengaluru, organized a focus group discussion with the parents of children in conflict with the law of West Division, Bengaluru at BOSCO Mane, Bengaluru, on July 15 and 29, 2018 and February 24, 2019. Fr. C V George, Director, SJPU, Bengaluru exhorted parents to ensure that their children do not end up becoming habitual offenders. Basavaraju P N, Coordinator, SJPU, BOSCO, Bengaluru, explained in detail about child protection, child rights, POCSO Act, child marriage and child traf-

ficking citing various examples. The participants were shown a video on child marriage. He also spoke about the importance of children's follow-up and present situation of the non-serious offences.

The resource person asked the children to make use of the services of BOSCO for counseling and vocational training. Two youth enrolled themselves for skill training in BOSCO after the discussion. Ms Kavitha, Social Worker, SJPU, BOSCO Bengaluru, shared that the reports on home visits, counseling sessions with the children and behaviour of the children were submitted to the Juvenile Justice Board regularly. Thirty-four parents and twenty-one children participated in the discussions.

NGOs Networking Meeting Organized



Foster Care Program, BOSCO, organized a half-day networking meeting of the NGOs at BOSCO Mane, Bengaluru, on October 27, 2018. Mr. Shivamallu, Coordinator, Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru, discussed about creating a WhatsApp group of the networking

NGOs, maintaining a directory for Urban NGOs and State NGOs, sharing information on child related issues through email on a continuous basis, and organizing follow up meetings of networking NGOs thrice a year. Ms Akshitha, Counselor, Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru, spoke about child protection, child welfare issues, child care institutions, child rights, foster care, after care, new policies, acts, difficulties faced in implementing the programme, child rights violations and the role of the network during events etc. Promo video on Foster Care was screened during the meeting. Mr. Shivaraju and Mr. Praveen, State and District Coordinators, Missing Child Bureau explained about the Missing children and the procedures to follow when a child is missing. Fifty-five participants representing fifteen Bengaluru Urban NGOs and eleven NGOs from various districts of Karnataka attended the meeting.

Research and Documentation

The department also has well maintained information on child data of the last three decades.

BOSCO and YaR Network

Headquartered in Delhi, Don Bosco National Forum for the Young at Risk, commonly called YaR is a national network of Don Bosco organizations in India committed to the care and protection of children/youth who are at risk such as street and vagrant children, runaways, unaccompanied children, child labourers, school dropouts, children of migrant manual labourers, refugees, etc. BOSCO is an active member of the YaR network.

Don Bosco YaR Forum has developed a new web portal, CHILD MISS (Management Information System and Services) to implement the concept of child care and protection system. BOSCO, Bengaluru has been appointed as the Nodal Agency by Don Bosco YaR network in implementing the Child MISS program in Karnataka and Kerala.

BOSCO is a part of another National YaR network programme called Participatory Action Research (PAR). This is a training and research programme to support YaR centers to be effective in caring for children with behavioural difficulties.

Volunteering

Through its department of Human Resource, BOSCO, Bengaluru has taken up a 'Volunteer Management' programme where it receives volunteers from corporates, educational institutions, religious institutions and foreign countries. During the reporting period BOSCO's Human Resource department provided opportunities to 246 volunteers to get involved in BOSCO's activities. These volunteers were involved in early intervention surveys, programmes, street presence public awareness programmes, fund-raising, research and other support programmes.
