It's a synthesis of interventions, achievements, milestones, a quaint perception of life, a commendable avenue of affirmation of the path chosen for the upliftment of the marginalised youth and children.

It gives me immense pleasure to present before you the accomplishments of BOSCO during the year 2017-2018, where children from the streets and in other dangerous situations were rescued, rehabilitated and re-united with their families.

We are living in an era of rapid growth and change. Greater emphasis has to be laid on the building, moulding of personalities of children, making them self-reliant and competent. We, at BOSCO receive the at risk young, provide them a haven, a home to nest, look into their needs, accompany them back to their homes, educate them, train them in various skills, empower them, job place them, thus enabling them to pursue their goals which act as fuel in the furnace of achievers, thus building a strong fortress of motivating force around them that cannot be penetrated by negative influences.

If we work on marble, it will perish, if we work upon brass, time will efface it, if we rear monuments, they will crumble into dust, but if we work upon the innocent minds of children with values and principles – we engrave on these impressionable minds something that will brighten the whole universe.

At BOSCO, not only are children moulded into respectable members of the mainstream society vide the tuition centres in areas, communities and slums, but also empowered with their rights, urged to practise advocacy on violation of their rights viz: child labour, child marriage. Adolescent girls meetings, children's collectives, caring communities, mothers and youth groups, child rights clubs help in resolving the issues in the communities, with the assistance of task force, the stake holders, Corporators, area leaders, etc.

Railway Childline celebrated its second anniversary, intensifying its rescue operations. While ARSP widened its



horizons, extending its services across other stations like Bidadi, Yelahanka, and Kengeri from 17th October 2017. Azeem Premji Philanthropic Initiative, an initiative of Azeem Premji foundation, started its services at Bangalore City Railway Station under the patronage of BOSCO CHILDLINE, from April 2018.

Our Shelter Homes for boys and girls at BOSCO Mane, Vikas, Vatsalya Bhavan and Rainbow Home, Skill training centres at BOSCO Sumanahalli and Yuvakendra, Open shelter at Yuvodaya, Nivas and Nilaya have been offering yeomen service, protection to the children under their care.

The year that was, was a year of achievements, success, accolades and acclaims, all possible due to the unstinted and indefatigable efforts, dedication and commitment of the 154 Personnel of BOSCO, under the committed leadership of the Directors, who worked unitedly strategizing, implementing and executing plans to reach milestones and fetch laurels.

After care and Foster care for children are two important programmes that BOSCO worked on to support the Government of Karnataka for their effective implementation in the state. In the coming year too, BOSCO will advocate for after care and foster care with much dedication.

The Lord Almighty has been bounteous and copious in showering His blessings on us at BOSCO. We hope and pray that He continues to shower His blessings in the year to come too.

BOSCO Bengaluru has been translating life, giving way of life to thousands of youth for several years now. I take this opportunity to congratulate and thank all the Fathers, Brothers and members of the staff for their dedicated service involving deeper planning, discussion, sharing, and above all love for the lesser privileged ones who live a life of sacrifice.

We are all inspired by the vision, and the person himself, Saint Don Bosco who lived his testimony of faith by transforming challenging experiences into occasions of service in favour of the poor and abandoned youngsters. He gave them hope, a reason to live and a way to live it meaningfully. "For you I study, for you I work, for you I am ready to spend the whole of my life" thus deposed the Saint, Don Bosco.

'Protecting Children from Violence'; is the theme that guides the interventions of BOSCO in a special way for the next year. The theme of non- violence is not in any way strange to us Indians, as the Father of our Nation Mahatma Gandhi led the freedom struggle with non- violence. There are five ways in which a person can do harm to the other... physical, mental and emotional torture, blemishing one's good name, contempt for the 'Guru' or disrespecting and indifference to others. But, when we look at our life realistically, it is our common experience; we find difficulty in accepting that life at times is hard. This can make us violent and lose peace. How does one become non-violent and pursue what makes for peace and mutual building up.

First of all we need to accept that peace is the result of a struggle and does not come just by chance. There is a struggle between what is acceptable and non- acceptable. One man's poison can be another man's food; therefore we need to learn to choose, also it is true to say that 'politeness is the ability to choose among your thoughts, as it leads us to the third reality towards building peace, and as eternal vigilance is the price of peace, we need to be vigilant.

Message of FR. PROVINCIAL

The human mind has the capacity to deny the veracity of what it knows to be right just by a matter of choice, according to situations and convenience. The mind can refuse ascent to the thing which the intellect knows to be right. In the book, 'On Being Good' the author says with insight, "Happy are the rulers whose subjects do not think. The Nazis thought, but Hitler coloured their thinking." What colours our thinking will affect our pattern of behaviour and the way we act and that in turn will affect the health of the society.

The educational environment in Don Bosco is coloured by goodness of heart and mind that helps towards doing good, looking good, feeling good, and above all being good. What colours our thinking influences the way we act. Don Bosco once said, "If one is to do good, he must have a little courage, be ready for sacrifice, deal affably with all and never slight anybody."

Finally non - violence leading to peace and harmony is a matter of co-responsibility which involves being a positive presence, offering timely support, also living with a spirit of healthy interdependence; it is the responsibility of everyone, the children and the grownups alike.

There was a little grape stem. This stem was so glad to be alive. She absorbed water and manure from the ground and grew up well, grew up slowly and could manage on her own. One day the wind was very cruel, the rain harsh and the snow was not one bit understanding towards her. The little stem drooped, weak and suffering. It would be so easy to stop trying to grow and to live. The stem was poor and the winter turned harsh wearing out the stem. One day the stem heard a cry; it was another stem calling out. "Here reach out, hang on to me." First she was hesitant what did this mean? She had always managed well, all on her own, yet very cautiously she reached out towards the other stem. The other stem said, "See I can help you. Just wind your tendrils about me. I will help you lift your head."

Accepting the help, she could stand straight again. The wind and the rain and the snow came, but the grape stem was clinging to many other stems and it could stand. They stood strongly united towards each other and in their strength they could smile and grow. One day the little stem looked down and saw a tiny stem swaying frightened in the wind. The stem said, "reach out to me, hang on, I will help you", and the little stem reached up to the grape stem and all the stems grew together. Leaves sprouted, flowers bloomed, and the vines bore grapes, feeding many in their life.

May BOSCO continue to be a healthy presence to the young in whom all of us rejoice, as they form a very important part of the society.



RESCUE

Many children who find it hard to adjust or deal with personal issues tend to run away to big cities with the hope of leading a better life. Here, they become prey to human predators such as child traffickers, criminals and abusers, and here acts BOSCO with its mission to contact them before they are preyed upon. It is the collective effort of BOSCO to apply the best strategy in accordance with the circumstances and ensure that quick action is taken; thus attempting to decrease the intensity of the problem. BOSCO's rescue operations take place in railway platforms, bus terminals, factories, hotels, parks, public places, etc. BOSCO's important components such as CHILDLINE, SJPU, Child Safety Net etc., collaborate with Police and other Government Departments in crucial intervention for mass rescue operations and prevention of child right violations.



Health Care

Knowing that a child in the street lives in extremely unhygienic conditions and consequently becomes vulnerable to a variety of diseases and parasitic infestations, BOSCO makes remarkable medical interventions. The Health Care Department of BOSCO takes care of the medical services for the rehabilitation centers, slum communities and its operational areas. Besides direct interventions, many health awareness programmes and medical camps are also conducted.

Mrs. Sandhya (Mother)

I am Jyothi's mother. We are from a middle class family. I lost my husband 7 years back due to heart attack. I was not having anybody to support me in my bad times. I brought up my children with my own efforts. I have two children, one daughter and one son. My daughter named JYOTHI is 10 years old and my son JOYEL is 7 years. I am working in a thread factory. I admitted my daughter to BOSCO VATS-ALYA BHAVAN in 2014 when she was in 1st STD, and BOSCO helped me in a noble way which gave my child a good future. During these four years BOSCO helped my daughter to study well and she was also happy to stay in BOSCO. It also provided shelter, good education and medical facility for my daughter. We are always thankful to BOSCO for guiding my child and moulding her in a good way to lead a better life and study well.

Non-Formal Education

The children rescued by BOSCO are often school dropouts or have never been to school. The organization's priority is to prepare these children for formal education provided they possess the aptitude and interest in studies. Thus, classes are organized in different BOSCO shelter homes which prepare them for schooling. BOSCO also organizes classes for children beyond school age, to prepare them for open school exams in 10th standard and to take up jobs according to the skills that they are trained in.



Formal Education

BOSCO believes in educating children who have the least chances of attaining regular schooling, who require immense motivation, love and support from the educator. Children who land on the streets usually have less interest in studies and often drop out. BOSCO, with its innovative strategies motivates the children to study and attend regular classes. Its centers such as BOSCO Vikas, BOSCO

Rainbow Home and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan are dedicated to making the children develop greater interest in their studies, while BOSCO Sumanahalli is dedicated to providing higher education to its resident pupils.

Bridge Education

Children rescued from the streets and vulnerable pockets of Bangalore, either orphaned or unable to return to their homes, are admitted to BOSCO centers. Here, skill training, non-formal education, creative learning, therapeutic counseling, mentoring, craft, play, art, etc. are provided to eliminate the deep rooted negative impact of street life or the problems faced by them at home due to unavoidable circumstances. The bridge schooling Programme enrolls children in schools and focuses on their overall development and reintegration into mainstream society.



Vocational Training

BOSCO runs its own skill training center for boys at BOSCO Sumanahalli, on the outskirts of Bangalore city. It is equipped with the latest machineries, qualified and experienced staffs to promote work culture in the youth, thereby enabling them join the mainstream of society. Youth are trained in carpentry, electrical, two wheeler mechanics, bakery, book binding and welding. Apart from the above mentioned trades, tailoring units are also functioning at BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan along with Beautician course being offered at BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan.




While BOSCO Sumanahalli provides computer education to the youth in basics, Microsoft Office, internet and Tally,-BOSCO Mane provides computer training to youths focused on training for a job. Computer education is a four month course, and during the last one year, 3 batches completed their course in Basic, Tally and Vocational training. Among the students, who were above 18, 48 got placed in companies such as Deenys Gift Shop, Uma Shankar & Co, Heera Travels, Lawyer's office, Lakshmi Mudralaya, Vodaphone, Global Logistics Services, Ashwini Electronics, Asian Paints, Tata Motors, Sampanth Income Tax Expert, Amazon, Dominos, Mehul Pharma, Sudarshan Silks and Harsha enterprises.

CREAM

BOSCO works closely with children in schools and slum communities through the CREAM project to provide them with a platform to share ideas and empower them to address their own protection issues. The child rights club acts as a powerful medium for bringing about transformation in society. Through their timely intervention, many child marriages were stopped, child laborers were rescued and children re-enrolled in schools. Club members meet monthly with their animator and discuss current child-related issues, particularly those pertaining to their studies and respective schools.



Job Placement

Most youths come to the city in search of jobs. After being counseled at BOSCO Yuvodaya they are sent to BOSCO Yuvakendra, where they are assisted and guided in finding suitable employment. Youth who have undergone skill training at BOSCO's various vocational skill training centers are placed in jobs like welding, carpentry, computer data entry, electricians, mechanics, screen printing, bakery, tailoring, sales, etc. BOSCO is in constant contact with a number of employers who understand the situation and background of these youth and are ready to extend cooperation and offer them jobs.

Room Placement

Mainstreaming youths, aged 18-25, by leading them back to society as economically independent young adults is our ultimate goal. BOSCO helps youngsters in hiring rooms or renting a place along with other boys. They are equipped to pay for the accommodation. The purpose of room placement is to prep the youth for the metamorphosis from a cocooned life of institutionalized care to rooms where they have to manage on their own, facing the stark realities of life. BOSCO staff does regular follow up visits and arranges Past-Pupils get together. This year, BOSCO placed one new youth and followed up with 6 youth.

Deepa S. is a student of B Com final year. She was very much interested in taking up computer courses but could not because of the financial constraints. To her luck, she happened to meet a longtime friend of hers who suggested her about BOSCO and the vocational courses that are provided by BOSCO for the youth of underprivileged communities.

Through her friend's help she came to BOS-CO and enrolled herself for the Basic and Tally courses. She was happy learning these courses free of cost. It was not just the computer course; but was also made to undergo spoken English and life skill classes to help her communicate effectively and refine her life skills and personality.

Having completed the course, she has been awarded a certificate. In appreciation of the opportunity provided to her she states, 'This certificate is a life saver and will help me in fetching a job. I thank BOSCO for all the support they have given me and in shaping my life. If I had done this course elsewhere, I would had to part with a huge sum my heartfelt gratitude to BOSCO and its staff.'

Home Placement

Home placement is one of the major activities of BOSCO. BOSCO Yuvodaya acts as a transit home for close to 30 children daily who are rescued from the railway stations, bus stands and other contact points in the streets of Bangalore. The children brought to the center are counseled and encouraged to return back home. BOSCO's main aim is to reunite the children with their parents, as it believes that family is the most suitable place for a child to grow up. This home placement usually includes calling the parents or close relatives and handing over the child to them, and sometimes the staff accompanies the child back home. During the year a total of 4356 children were home placed from BOSCO.

SLUM/COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

As a rights-based organization, BOSCO concentrates its effort on the holistic development of slum communities to promote child protection with the support of CRY. BOSCO team works closely with slum communities, especially women and children, on various issues such as health, shelter, food, education and women empowerment.

In 2017-18, BOSCO team worked closely with various slum communities and ensured the following:.....

- » Birth registration of 80 new born babies and immunization of 225 children.
- » The pulse Polio Drive benefitted thousands of children
- » 1032 malnourished children were identified, referred to Anganwadis and NRCs.
- » 7 Health Camps were conducted in slums benefitting a total of 741 people.
- » Supported 4222 families to get Aadhar cards, Ration cards, and Voter ID cards.

School and Tuition Centers

During the scholastic year, there were 380 new enrollments and re-enrollments from slum communities. About 410 children from the areas where BOSCO works were given tuitions who proved to be eager learners. BOSCO team worked with 12 ICDS (Anganwadi) centers and 60 schools in 21 wards, out of which 55 schools are run by the government and five, private schools in the urban slums of Bangalore during the year.

My mother is sick but still she is working in garment industry for our wellbeing. Before I came to BOSCO I was not interested in my studies, in other activities or to know more about life. After coming here I learned many new things and I got good education with all facilities. In BOSCO I got to know many people with different characters and different habits, therefore, I learned new habits myself. I also attended many life skill sessions. These sessions made me more confident, I got clear plans for my future and I set new goals for myself. After attending life skill classes I take more responsibilities for myself and my life. People in BOSCO hope that I can be a good sports player in the future. For this I am grateful to BOSCO.

Advocacy with Slum Board and Other Departments



BOSCO is directly involved with the communities, especially slums, to ensure that their basic rights are protected. It conducts various field visits to study the communities in crisis and advocate for their essential needs. BOSCO's strategy of conducting awareness programmes for the well-being of the slum community involves spreading awareness about child rights, health care, women empowerment, etc. and ground level work.

Women Empowerment

Women have a major role to play in any society. Very often it is the women who run the family with their meager income, shouldering the burden of sick parents and young children since the men are alcoholics, have deserted the families or are no more. Against this socio-economic background, BOSCO started intervention among women in slum communities. The major objective of BOSCO is to empower women to educate their children and through them bring about transformation which will enable them to lead respectful lives in society. BOSCO has strengthened Mother's groups across 12 ICDS centers through 25 sessions. A total of 401 mothers were capacitated on emergent literacy and maths.



Networking with the Government and Other Stakeholders



Stakeholders can affect or be affected by the Organization's actions, objectives and policies. Major stakeholders range from the common man on the street to Government officials such as Police, RPF, GRPF, Railway and Bus Stand officials, AHTU, child rights clubs, NGOs, school teachers, parents, SDMC members, local leaders of the ward, etc. They also include the duty bearers such as CWOs, DCPO, CWC, JJB, Railway Officials, KSRTC, BBMP officials, officials from the Departments which includes WCD, ICPS, labor departments, Education Departments and Health Departments, Law Enforcement and Legal System, etc.

CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE is a 24*7 free emergency telephone help-line service for children in distress. It is a project of the Ministry of Women and Child Development and works in partnership with NGOs, Government and Corporate Sector. BOSCO is a collaborative organization of CHILDLINE. BOSCO CHILDLINE has been committed to responding to CHILDLINE calls on a 24/7 basis and intervening in crisis situations since 2002. It identifies high risk areas where the number of vulnerable children is high and reaches out to them. CHILDLINE intervenes in cases of child labor, child marriage, abandoned children, sexually abused children, children subjected to corporal punishment, school dropouts, and begging children, etc.

Timely Rescue...

Shruti (Name Changed) 15 years hails from Bangalore. She is a 9th standard school dropout. She was staying in one of the hostels in, Nelamangala. Her father is a coolie while her mother a house wife. Her mother married another man and was staying in one of the slums in Bangalore. She had five children from the first husband and three children from the second husband. Thus, unable to take care of children, she placed some children in hostel, some with her mother and some were with her. Likewise Shruti was also placed in a hostel, but unable to bear the hostel fees, she was forcibly brought home and not allowed to study. Shruthi's mother had borrowed some money from the prospective groom selected for Shruti, and thus, in turn, Shruti was forced into marriage with him much against her wish.

CHILDLINE received a call regarding her marriage in one of the temples in Bangalore on June 28, 2017. Responding to the call, BOSCO CHILDLINE team went to the temple. The Temple In-Charge said that there was no marriage scheduled for the day at the temple. When enquired, the caller informed that the marriage is in the same temple. Team waited at the spot for more than three hours but could not find any signs of anyone solemnizing a marriage. Hence the team contacted the caller for further information. The caller informed that the girl was taken away by her mother to another place to get her married in their house to a 36-year-old man, who was already married and father of two children. With the help of the caller and Police, BOSCO CHILDLINE team rescued the girl from the spot and stopped the marriage. After counselling, Shruthi was produced before Child Welfare Committee for further care and protection.

Railway CHILDLINE



From the time of inception of BOSCO, railway station is the core rescue area. Railway CHILD-LINE is a project jointly initiated by the Department of Women and Child Development and Indian Railways in 2015. Its aims to rescue children from the railway station and the surrounding areas provide counseling to the children and reintegrate them with their family members. The procedure, from rescue through reintegration, involves several stages such as collecting details of the children, producing the children before Child Health Group (CHG), sending them to the open shelter and finally producing them before Child Welfare Committee (CWC).Bangalore Railway CHILDLINE has also collaborated with the Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives (APPI) since April 2018.

BOSCO Railway CHILDLINE rescued three children from city railway station found begging, named Pramila aged 14 years, Saraswathi aged 12 years and Devi aged 11 years. 3 of them belong to the Adivasi community and are basically from Ramanagara. Parents are working in Ramanagara and the kids are school drop outs.

3 shabbily dressed children were found begging at the railway station, and appeared to have gone for days without food. These children were brought to the office, made to feel comfortable and safe. During the initial counselling they revealed that they came to Bangalore to go to Tamilnadu to see their brother butwere found begging in the moving train. It had been 3 days since they left home. They had no contact details of the parents. The children were escorted to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan for follow up.

From BVB children were produced before CWC who ordered to transfer the children to Ramanagar CWC which the staff from BVB did.

Foster Care

Foster care refers to a temporary arrangement for children who are in a difficult period in their lives such as orphans/ semi-orphans and children who do not have a family of their own. These children are placed in a home, individually or in a group, of foster parents certified by the State. BOSCO Foster Care works in collaboration with various Government Departments, Government Homes and other NGOs. The activities of BOSCO Foster Care include identifying the potential foster parents, counseling them, identifying and preparing children for going into Foster Care, visiting homes of the potential foster parents, and visiting children at school to ensure their well-being and growth as well as maintaining systematic documentation. Five children were placed in Individual Foster Care, and seven children were placed in Group Foster Care during the year.

From Footpath to Path of Love

Appu (alias Syed Ayyub), a 10-year-old boy, hails from Bangalore. His father Babu (Pasha) and his mother Selvy are economically poor and were living on the pavement. The family used to live in a shack on the pavement and picked rags for a living, and earn a living of minimum of Rs. 200/- per day.

The parents of Appu were alcoholics and were unable to provide the required care and protection for him and his younger sister. The boy was placed with a wealthy family at Shivajinagar, Bangalore for a time. However, the family began to mistreat the child. They used to beat him and scold him. Appu's father never visited him after leaving him in the house and the boy began to feel lonely.

One day, the boy ran away from the house when he was sent to the market to buy vegetables and groceries, but he didn't know how to reach his parents. He had very little money and didn't know any work apart from what his parents were doing. Hence, he began to roam around the city engaging in begging and rag picking.

The staff of BOSCO met Appu and rescued him. When asked, he expressed his willingness to pursue education. He was enrolled to bridge school through SSA project. BOSCO's team made efforts to find Appu's parents, but to no avail.

In the meantime, Chand Pasha, a businessman, and his wife Shabana approached foster care team asking for a boy child below 10 years, for adoption. A detailed investigation and assessment of the family was done. The couple had three biological children, two girls and one boy.

After all the legal process through Child Welfare Committee Bangalore, Appu was given for foster care. Now Appu is showing tremendous improvement in his studies and expressed his thanks to the BOSCO team. Through continuous monitoring and follow-up, BOSCO found Appu and his foster family have a loving and longing relationship.

BOSCO Yuvodaya Shelter Home

BOSCO Yuvodaya serves as a day-night shelter home for the children on the street and young at risk. BOSCO Yuvodaya also acts as a transit home for around 30 children on a daily basis, those rescued from the Railway station, Bus stand and the various contact points at the streets of Bangalore. The children who are brought here from all over the city especially from Railway stations, Bus stand, Police, Public etc, are counseled and their problems addressed. Families are traced through police or with the help of MCB, Anganwadis, Panchayat, etc. and these children are encouraged to return back to their homes.

BOSCO Yuvodaya Shelter Home caters to children in need of care and protection like beggars, street and working children, rag pickers, orphaned, deserted and trafficked children, particularly those without a home and family ties, since they are vulnerable to abuse and exploitation, and children of sex workers and pavement dwellers. The project provides shelter, nutrition, health-care, sanitation and hygiene, safe drinking water, education and recreational facilities, protection against abuse and exploitation, enrolment in schools, vocational training and placement, health services, reducing drug, substance abuse and HIV/AIDS among street children.

BOSCO Yuvodayawas able to rescue and rehabilitate 3684 children, including 61girls, from Railway station, Bus station and various parts of Bangalore city.



FCCF

Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) is a project which aims to improve the quality and learning environment of children belonging to primary schools as well as ICDS (Anganwadi) centers. The objective of the Programme is to create child-friendly learning environments for supporting children's education in the slums of Bangalore Urban. In this Programme children were supported in 12 ICDS (Anganwadi) centers and 60 schools in 21 wards, out of which 55 schools are run by the government and five, private schools in the urban slums of Bangalore.



Child Safety Net (CSN)

The objective of Child Safety Net is round the clock care and protection to children at risk through the physical presence of the street educators/field animators in the most vulnerable pockets of Bangalore city patrolling in rescue vehicles. It focuses on rescue of vulnerable children as well as increasing public awareness. It also creates awareness and advocacy with various Government Departments and formation of caring communities. The CSN team attended 133 cases of child labor, conducted 321 public awareness and door to door awareness programmes, 13 community awareness programs and 54 school awareness programmes and enrolled 187 children in different schools in Bangalore.



Ajay and Vijay, brothers born to Govindaswami and Rani are 10 years and 13 years old respectively. They are born and brought up in Yeshwanthpur, Bangalore. Ajay is studying in 4thstd and Vijay is studying in 5th standard in BMC hostel, Yeshwanthpur. Mother works in a garment factory. They lost their father in a road accident recently. Unable to bear the pain of losing their father, both of them ran away from the hostel to be with their mother. Finding it difficult to make both ends meet, the mother sent them to their uncle in Laggere, Bangalore. Both the mother and the boys were not serious about education. However, their uncle wanted the children to go to school but was unable to send them because of lack of knowledge about the procedures of enrolling them into school coupled with extreme poverty.

On a regular visit to Laggere slum, BOSCO Child Safety Net (CSN) team found the two boys playing in the ground during the schools hours. Upon enquiring, the team got to know the situation. The CSN team motivated the children, uncle, and mother and made them aware about the importance of education, child rights, and took them to the Government Primary School in Laggere along with their uncle. They met the Headmistress and explained her about the background of the children. The HM was very happy to admit the children in school and children also were happy to go to school. But later during the follow up visits, it was learnt that the children were very irregular to school and the mother also was not serious about them going to school regularly.

Hence the CSN team with the permission of the mother and the uncle referred the boys to BOSCO Mane where the children would be safe and secure and at the same time be regular to their school.

Missing Child Bureau

BOSCO functions as the State Nodal Agency for the Missing Child Bureau (MCB) of the state of Karnataka. It works in collaboration with the Department of Women and Child Development and police in collecting and sharing information about missing and unaccompanied children by using the latest technologies and strategies. MCB uses a web based technology (Child MISS) to track and trace missing children. It also collaborates with NGOS in all the districts of the state of Karnataka who carry out missing complaint registration and other related work.

Child MISS

Child MISS is software cum web portal tool to assist documentation of both quantitative and qualitative data to create a database for the organization. It is networked with Home link, and the team focuses on documenting the information of vulnerable children of its networking partners. The Child MISS Programme supports its partners to collect the data in systematic formats based on the JJ Act. The use of Child MISS reduces re-typing the reports and helps download them in formats such as CVS, Excel, Word, PDF, etc. The option of online editing and modification enables regular updating of information and makes it accessible and secured for online use and viewing, maintaining the data bank in the cloud without the use of system space.

Shobha proudly says "I work in Vodafone office which fetches me Rs.8000/per month. This was because I was able to complete my Computer course in BOSCO. I am ever grateful to BOSCO". Muttu Raj Ningappa Ganiger called as Muttu Raj is a 17 years old boy from Nilagunda village Badami taluk of Bagalkot district. He left his home and reached Bangalore on March 4th, 2017 and was found by BOSCO staff. The boy was in BOSCO Yuvodaya for two weeks and post counseling he was sent to Yuvakendra on April 7, 2017. After deeper counseling and motivation, the boy desired to do his Bakery Training at Sumanahalli and was sent to BOSCO life skill training center on 9th May 2017. The boy started his training course in Bakery trade.

Since Muttu Raj left home in the month of March his mother thought her son would return back home because he has left home twice earlier to return back home. His mother panicked because Muttu Raj did not turn up since three months, hence approached the MISSING CHILD BUREAU DISTRICT CELL BAGALKOT, following which the MCBDC Coordinator, Bagalkot, enquired of MCBDC, Bangalore. As per verification, it was found that the boy is doing his training at BOSCO Life Skill Training Center, Sumanahalli. This has brought awareness among people about MCB. With the permission of his mother, the boy is continuing the training at BOSCO Life Skill Training Center.



Special Juvenile Police Unit

BOSCO through Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) has been assisting the police in handling cases in Bangalore's South and West Divisions, covering 35 police stations. The primary objective of SJPU is to create a child friendly approach while dealing with the children involved in criminal offences and thereby ensuring their rights are not breached at any stage of the legal procedure. BOSCO SJPU conducts public awareness programmes to prevent crimes by children. These programmes include special training for police officials and counseling sessions for children charged with criminal offences and their parents. All serious cases are referred to Observation Home for further intervention by Juvenile Justice Board. BOSCO SJPU networks with various Government Departments and other NGOs.

Psychosocial Interventions at the Government-run Juvenile Homes

BOSCO works with children in need of care and protection and with children in Government Homes. As per the Juvenile Justice Act, children are grouped under two broad categories; namely, children in need of care and protection and children who come into conflict with the law. Once children are placed in the Government children's home, periodic follow up is done by BOSCO.

Special counseling sessions are planned for the needy to guide them towards needed changes in life. BOSCO also organizes cultural events and awareness programmes for these children. BOSCO staff takes initiative in motivating children and youth for doing skill training and encourages them to continue with their academics.

Youth Parliament

Youth parliament is a meeting of all the residents of the centers where leadership is taken by the youth themselves. In the meeting the office bearers are elected. The meeting usually takes place once a month and all the members attempt to address the matters concerning the center and their life there. It is a platform for the residents to express their views and opinions freely to make a necessary transformation in their lives. It also inculcates in them a sense of ownership and a sense of belonging. During the year 12 meetings were conducted in Yuvakendra, Vatsalya Bhavan and Rainbow Home centers each.



Beating Odds All the Way

Vinod Kumar hails from Bannimantapa, Mysore. He lost both his parents at a very young age. Ever since the demise of his parents, he was raised by Munirathna, his maternal grandmother who is a vegetable vendor at K.R. Market, Bangalore. Formerly Vinod used to stay with his granny on one of the pavements at K.R.Market. Although there was no one else except his grandmother to look after his welfare,, he pursued his studies with passion and determination. When he was studying in standard nine in December 2016, Vinod Kumar got acquainted with BOSCO Nilaya. He began frequenting the center to attend the free remedial classes conducted in the evening. After a month when he shared his plight, Fr. Regi Jacob, Director, BOSCO Nilaya, he agreed to help him with academic expenses and accommodation. Thus, Vinod became an inmate at BOSCO Nilaya. He completed his SSLC at BBMP High School, Ganganagar, R. T Nagar, with 78.9%. Vinod Kumar aspires to become an IPS officer in the future.

Besides pursuing his education, he helps children with remedial teaching at the center. He is the Leader of Child Rights Club (Nehru Makala Sangha), Jolly Mohalla, Bangalore. He participated in Karnataka State 10th Child Rights Parliament in November, 2017 and was a student representative to evaluate child related issues with State level authorities and dignitaries. He won 2nd Rank at State Level, Siri Kannada Examination in November, 2017. He has won 2nd Place, State Level, Hindi Secondary Examination. He has been selected for the Quiz competition at Hyderabad organized by ISRO on World Science Day. The

Competition dates are yet to be announced. He won 2nd Place in Mathematics activities organized at Tata Institute, Bangalore on National Mathematics Day December 22, 2017. He won 1st Place, Qualifier level in Essay writing Competition organized by LIC in 2017.

Pradeep (Group Foster Care placement) says,

I am very glad to say that BOSCO has given me a good Group Foster Care family & siblings from other families. I am very happy that I am older than other children & I have the responsibility to take care of others as my brothers. Parents take care of me with love, which I didn't get from my relatives so far. I am very thankful to BOSCO & my foster parents for giving me an opportunity to live in family environment.

MAJOR EVENTS AND PROGRAMS DURING 2017 -2018

Campaigns

World Day against Child Labor observed

BOSCO, Bangalore observed 'World Day Against Child Labor' at Bangalore City Railway Station, BMTC Bus Stand, Majestic, Gandhi Bazaar and M.G. Road areas and Orion, Gopalan, Mantri and Garuda Malls, on June 13, 2017. Fr. Mathew Thomas, Executive Director, BOSCO, Bangalore, said that the most effective way to fight child labor is to ensure that every child is benefitting from mainstream schools and education system. At Basavangudi, Rajshekhar, the Child Welfare Officer and Sub Inspector, Basavangudi Police Station, Bangalore, were present for the Programme.

The guests exhorted the people gathered to join hands in protecting children from child labor. The program focused on the theme, 'Stop Child Labor'. Children from BOSCO, Bangalore who are now studying in various mainstream schools, staff and volunteers reached out to strategic locations and vulnerable areas in the city and spread the word through a mime based on the theme of the day. At every location, general public were invited to pledge their support for the campaign by attesting their signature against the slogan, 'Stop Child Labor'. Twenty-six children from BOSCO Bangalore participated in the awareness Programme.



Awareness Programme on Independence Day

BOSCO, Bangalore, organized an awareness campaign with the theme, 'Caring for the Earth' on August 15, 2017. The team reached out to Sumanahalli Signal, Vijayanagar Bus Stand, KR Market and Satellite Bus stand areas, Bangalore, with a theme-based dance.

"Everyone needs to make efforts in conserving the earth", said M Kumar, PSI, Kalasipalya Police Station, and Bangalore. The team had to repeat the performances in several areas owing to the demand of the general public. Summer Camp at BOSCO Nilaya








Women's Day Celebration






