Shaale Kade Nanna Nade



BOSCO Bengaluru organized the ‘Shaale Kade Nanna Nade’ campaign in collaboration with Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Child Rights

(KSCPCR), Sarva Shikshana Abhiyan, Women, and Child Development Department, and ICPS in various areas of Bengaluru South and West and Bengaluru Rural from May 25 to 31, 2022. The campaign aimed at enrolling and re-enrolling children to schools across Bengaluru in the upcoming academic year and thus ensure that the number of school dropouts is brought down to zero.

The campaign was inaugurated in the presence of Smt. Geetha B Patil, Member Secretary, Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Children’s Rights, Bengaluru, Ms. Geethalaxmi, HN, In-charge, District Child Protection Officer, Bengaluru Urban, Mr. Srin-

Formation of Child Protection Committees

CREAM Project, BOSCO Bengaluru organized meetings and formed Child Protection Committees (CPC) to strengthen the child rights supporters in the community at Bettakote, Channrayapatna, and Nallur Panchayat, Devanahalli, Bengaluru Rural on May 13, 16, and 19, 2022. Addressing the gatherings, Mr. Devaraj, Coordinator, BOSCO CREAM Project gave an introduction about BOSCO and its services. He explained CPC, child rights violations, and the role of stakeholders in society. He motivated them to provide information regarding children in difficult situations to CHILDLINE. He spoke about the four fundamental rights of children. He also gave information about skill training programmes, and



tuition classes available at BOSCO. Sixty-two ASHA Workers, Anganwadi Workers, School Teachers, Parents, SHG Group Members, and PDO were inducted as the members of CPC.

The week-long campaign included awareness rallies, door-to-door awareness, and street plays by children. Government school teachers, children, community leaders, and BOSCO teams were involved in the campaign. More than one thousand people were reached out to who pledged their support in enrolling and re-enrolling the children in their communities into schools. The campaign helped in enrolling thirty-three children into Government schools.

Value Education on Positive Thinking



BOSCO Yuvakendra organized a value education session on Positive Thinking for the youth of the centre on May 14, 2022. The session was started with introductory words by Geethamala, Counsellor, BOSCO Yuvakendra on the importance of value education in one's life. Later, children were asked to form a circle and to make three statements about themselves, two of which must be facts or truths, and one must be a lie. The other boys were asked to guess the statement that was a lie.

The resource person explained that one must be positive and think positive to understand the perspective of life in a better way and lead a successful life. Twenty-two youths participated in the session.

State Level Foster Care Parents and Children Meeting



State Level Foster Care Parents and Children Meetings were organized by BOSCO Foster Care Programme at Chitra Don Bosco, Chitradurga on May 23, 2022, and at BOSCO Mane, Bengaluru on May 27, 2022. During the meeting in Chitradurga, Mr. Prabhakar, CWC Chairperson, Chitradurga appreciated Don Bosco for placing three children in Chitradurga. Mr. Somashekar, Chitradurga said that, in the future, support would be taken from Don Bosco for conducting the procedures for placement. Fr. Saji George, Rector, Chitradurga said that the ideal atmosphere for children to grow up in is in families. Fr. Joseph Dandavathi, Director, Chitradurga said that COVID has resulted in several children losing their parents, and we must place such children in foster families.

Meeting at Bengaluru

In the meeting at Bengaluru, Fr. Prasad, Director, BOSCO Mane facilitated a session with the parents and children on parenting skills. He said that children learn through imitation and that parents have to set good patterns of behaviour for the child to imbibe good values and qualities. Ms. Bharathi, Member, CWC, Bengaluru Rural thanked the parents for coming forward to foster children. Ms. Savitha, Counselor, DCPU Staff, Ramanagar said that we need to create a family environment for children who need foster families. She briefed about foster care procedure, the role of DCPO, Unit Staff, CWC, and documents to be submitted by prospective parents.

Mr. Shivamallu, State Coordinator, BOSCO Foster Care Programme, explained briefly the purpose of the meeting, foster care concept, eligible criteria of parents and children, placement of children, follow-up of children and parents with CWC, types of foster care, and termination. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru briefed about the roles and responsibilities of parents. Seventy-six parents and children from Bellary, Chitradurga, Davanagere, Ramnagar, and Bengaluru participated in the meetings.

Awareness Programmes at BMTC Bus Stand

An awareness programme was organized by the BOSCO Bus Stand team in BMTC Platforms to create awareness among BMTC drivers and conductors and BMTC Officials about the category of runaway children, child labourers, and child helpline number 1098 on May 17 and 20, 2022. Mr. Ramaswamy, Outreach Officer, BOSCO Foster Care Programme, briefly explained child rights and how BOSCO is supporting needy children. Mr. Balaraj, Bus Stand Area Coordinator, explained about BOSCO Assistance Center, Bus Stand protocols, and activities. Mr. Venkatesh Murthy, ATM motivated the officials to support BOSCO in their activities. The team distributed pamphlets. The officials included Assistant Traffic Manager, Assistant Traffic Supervisors, Traffic Controller, and BMTC



Office Staff. About twenty-five BMTC officials, drivers and conductors received information regarding child-related issues.

Health Camp at Nagarbhavi Community

Child Safety Net (CSN) Project, BOSCO Bengaluru organized a health camp in collaboration with Health Care Project, BOSCO Bengaluru for the people of Nagarbahvi Community on May 1, 2022. There was a formal inauguration of the health camp which was attended by Sri Shanthappa, PSI, Vidhanasabha Police Station, Sri Shravan, PSI, Annapoorneshwari Nagara Police Station, Sri Nagarajan, ASI, Annapoorneshwari Nagara Police Station, Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru and the team of doctors from St. Martha's Hospital.

Eye, weight, height, BP, and physical health checkups were done on all the children and parents. One person was referred to Jayadeva Hospital, twenty people were referred to a dental hospital, and twenty were referred to Minto Eye Hospital for further treatment. Dr.



Abraham expressed that many children and adults were anemic and needed to consume protein-rich food. All the attendees of the camp were treated with Vitamin A and deworming tablets. Fifty-seven children and forty-three parents availed the services of the health camp.

Picnic to Bannerghatta National Park



BOSCO Nivas organized a one-day picnic to Bannerghatta National Park for the children of the areas attending the tuition classes on May 6, 2022. The purpose of the picnic was to provide infotainment and practical memories by creating opportunities for experiential learning. Jungle Safari was the highlight of the park where the children saw tigers, lions, elephants, giraffes, etc. Watching colourful butterflies was fascinating. The children were exposed to a new world outside their homes and classrooms and were happy to enjoy and learn about nature, man-made wonders, heritage, and wildlife. Twenty-three children were part of the outing.

Rescued from the platforms of the Bengaluru City Railway Station, Kuldeep was brought to BOSCO Yuvodaya in October 2018. With disheveled hair, tattered clothes, and fury of the street weighing him down, he seemed to be around 15-16 years of age. After the initial counseling and intervention, it was found that Kuldeep was deaf and dumb. He appeared withdrawn and tired with wounds all over. After serving him food and catering to his basic needs, he was taken to St. Martha's Hospital for treatment. He was given medical care at St. Martha's and when he was discharged from the hospital, he was produced before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). As per the order of the CWC, he was transferred to BOSCO Yuvakendra for further care and protection.

At BOSCO Yuvakendra he was provided with care and timely medication. He was supported with hearing aids that helped him communicate better. He gradually adjusted himself to the environment and became one with the group of youths. Kuldeep, a well-behaved and disciplined boy showed interest in academic matters too. During one of the counseling sessions, he expressed in sign language that he had come from Mumbai. His parents had passed away and he does not have anybody to take care of him. Hence, he came to Bengaluru in search of a job. He wanted to learn some trade and earn a livelihood. As the boy had no documents regarding his identity, the staff from BOSCO Yuvakendra made efforts to obtain Aadhaar Card. During the process, the details regarding his whereabouts were found. Kuldeep is a native of the Gonda District in Uttar Pradesh. He was asked to share the memories of his place and home. After seeing the pictures of his hometown, he was able to recognize the bus stand, railway station, and the school where he studied up to SSLC. He shared information regarding his siblings. With the given information, the Gonda District Police were



contacted and with the help of the District Superintendent of Police and Chapia Police Station, Kuldeep's parents were traced in July 2021. Kuldeep interacted with his father and brothers over a video call. His father and brothers were in tears of joy for having found Kuldeep after about six years. Kuldeep also was excited to see his family after a long time and exclaimed, "Baba... Mere Baba!"

The counsellor also spoke to the father and it was learned that he was the youngest child in the family and had three more siblings. One of his elder brothers also was deaf and dumb. Unhappy with his father for having scolded him, Kuldeep had left for Mumbai along with his elder brother in search of a job. It was during this time he contracted a skin infection and having failed to take timely treatment, it began to spread further. Moreover, he was not treated well at the workplace. Owing to all this, he had run away from Mumbai and had landed up in Bengaluru to make a living. However, he reached the safe hands of BOSCO, Bengaluru.

Later, Kuldeep's father and Chapia police personnel came to BOSCO Yuvakendra. On seeing his father, Kuldeep cried in happiness. His father had a beaming smile on his face. Kuldeep was handed over to his father through the CWC. It was a beautiful journey back home for Kuldeep!
