Uday started the session by pointing out the difference between animals and human beings. He quoted the words of Socrates, "Know thy self'. The concept of self-awareness, different stages of psychosocial development, and its effects on each individual, Johari Window, and Maslow's Hierarchy of needs were explained. Trainees were asked to draw a picture and explain their state of mind. A questionnaire was filled out by the trainees to understand themselves. The session helped the trainees to equip themselves with social and interpersonal skills that



enable them to cope with the demands of everyday life, bridge the gap between basic functioning and capabilities and help them make use of their potential in its fullness. Twenty trainees and two staff took part in the session.

Emotional Intelligence



BOSCO Rainbow Home organized a life skill session on "Emotional Intelligence" for the centre children on February 18, 2023. Rev. Fr. Uday SDB, Resource Person explained that emotions come from the heart and intelligence comes from the mind. The children were taught about the capacity to be aware of, control, and express one's emotions and to handle interpersonal relationships judiciously and empathetically. He said that emotional intelligence is the ability to manage both own emotions and understand the emotions of the people around.

He screened a short movie on emotional intelligence and gave a few examples of great personalities, their failures, and their successes. He taught them how to balance their emotions which will help them develop effective ways of managing their feelings. Twenty-six children attended the session.

Life Skill Training



A Life Skill training was organized for the youth at BOSCO Yuvakendra on February 25, 2023. Mr. Mahesh, Life Skill Trainer, Dream a Dream asked the youths to meditate and explained the importance of meditation. He later conducted an activity on 'presence of mind.' Forty drivers and conductors received the pamphlets during the awareness programme.

Adolescent Girls' Meeting



Adolescent Girls' Meeting was conducted at BBMP High School, Shivajinagar, Bengaluru, by BOSCO Nivas on February 9, 2023. The team interacted with the girls and spoke about personal hygiene, menstrual hygiene, and consuming nutritious food. The discussion was focused on following healthy food habits, maintaining cleanliness, and drinking water frequently. Twenty-five girls participated in the interactive session.

Tuition Teachers Training



A training programme was conducted for the teachers of the tuition centres established and managed by BOSCO Nilaya at the centre on February 11, 2023. Fr. Jude Anand SDB, Director, BOSCO Nilaya and Nivas briefed about the general rules and regulations to be followed in the tuition centres.

Twenty-eight children attending the tuition classes participated in the competition.

Short Film on Social Issues Screened

BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, Bengaluru organized the screening of a Kannada Short Film, 'Aa Ondu Kshana,' in coordination with Asha Kirana Trust for the inmates of the centre on February 8, 2023. The movie directed by Ms. Malathi Mysore, Asha Kirana Trust gave a powerful message about the importance of wearing helmets, donating organs after death, donating blood, etc. Ms. Malathi addressed the trainees and said that a few moments of care could make a big difference in the lives of the people. She exhorted the trainees to place trust in the words of elders and follow the common rules and practices like wearing helmets, donating eyes, blood, organs, etc. After watching the movie, a few trainees expressed their desire of donating eyes after their



death. Fr. Joshy Puttur, Director, BOSCO Sumanahalli appreciated Ms. Malathi for her initiative of communicating social values to society through her film. Fifteen trainees and the staff of the centre watched the movie.

Exposure Visit



The tailoring unit of BOSCO Nivas organized an exposure visit for its trainees to Ramachandrapuram, Bengaluru on February 15, 2023. Ms. Daisy, Tailoring Teacher showed the trainees the different types of fabrics used to sew different dresses for different occasions and daily use. She guided them regarding purchasing materials for tailoring, fabric selection, length and measurement of fabrics, costbenefit analysis, and raw materials required like threads, needles, scissors, buttons, zips, etc. Thirteen trainees along with Girija, Social Mobilizer, BOSCO Nivas were part of the exposure visit.

Health Camp at BOSCO Mane



A Health Camp was organized at BOSCO Mane by the BOSCO Health Care team for the children of Mane and Vikas, on February 11, 2023. Weight, height, BP, pulse, temperature and physical health check-ups were done for all the children. The overall health of the children was good. However, a few children were suffering from the common cold, cough and skin infections. The doctors advised the children of Mane to improve and maintain hygiene and cleanliness. They were prescribed medicines. Thirty-four boys from Mane and thirty-three boys from Vikas availed the services of the camp.

One Day at a Time.

It was a 15-year-old's desperate attempt to find a way out of solitude that had driven her to the police station asking for help to start life over again. Lata (Name Changed), a native of Bengaluru, has battled with losses for as long as she can remember. Her parents passed away when she was very young leaving her in the care of her paternal grandmother. But when her grandmother turned out to be more loyal to the alcohol that she was addicted to than to her granddaughter, Lata's next

hope became her elder brother who did coolie work to make a living. But an issue with her brother soon distanced her from that relationship as well.

year ago, life changed again when she took up a job as dreamer in her. a caretaker in an old age home. But there too, she was confronted with the same set of problems she was forced to fight her whole life. After working for an entire year at the old age home, often managing responsibilities that went beyond a child's capacity, what she was paid for a whole year's toil was a meagre sum of ₹ 6,000/-. Understanding the futility of continuing there, Lata quit her job and left that place, but was then faced with the dilemma as to what to do and where to go. She was certain that she did not want to go back home. She had once left the crippling environment of her childhood behind and was certain that she did not want to go down that path again, and it was this decision that had led her to the doorsteps of the police station.
