General health check-up



A general health check-up was organized for the girls of BOSCO Rainbow Home by the BOSCO Health Care Department on February 24, 2024. The camp was conducted by a team comprising Dr. Abraham, Ms. Uma Rai, Social Worker, and others from St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru. They checked the height, weight, BP, pulse rate and temperature of the children in the centre. Eye screening was also done. The doctor opined that the majority of the children were healthy. Medicines were prescribed for some children. All the girls were administered Vitamin A and deworming tablets. Fifty-three girls availed the benefits of the general health check-up.

Training Programme on First Aid

The BOSCO Health Care Department organized a first aid training programme for the organization's staff at BOSCO Mane, Bengaluru, on February 20, 2024. Mr. Augustin, the Resource Person, facilitated the sessions, which included a theory class in the morning and practicals in the afternoon.

He started the session by explaining the structure and functions of the human



body. Defining first aid, he said, it is an immediate treatment given to a person on an emergency basis. He explained the aim and the golden rules of first aid. He also briefed the gathering about the three types of artificial breathing. He gave information about various health problems like nasal bleeding, foreign bodies in the eyes, ears, mouth, and nose, and the immediate treatment that could be given. The session also included information on heart attacks, epilepsy, heat strokes and different types of fractures. Twenty-five BOSCO staff from the centres, areas, and projects attended the training.

The research and writing process heightened my awareness and instilled a profound responsibility to advocate for change. The process underscored the urgency of addressing teenage depression comprehensively. It revealed the interconnectedness of academic pressure, social influences, and the need for mental health education. The research deepened my understanding and fuelled a commitment to advocate for systemic changes and foster societal empathy. I chose to delve into the escalating prevalence of teenage depression as it signifies a silent crisis profoundly impacting the very essence of adolescence. Having personally experienced the effectsof depression due to bullying and domestic issues, my objective was to address the subtle yet disturbing impacts often neglected due to societal unawareness. Lastly, my purpose extended to exploring solutions that could help individuals, particularly teenagers, overcome depression, as this life stage is deemed the most crucial, not only affecting the present but also leaving lasting imprints for the future. An Environment, Climate Change, and Sustainability Studies student at the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai, Bicky aspires to continue advocating for mental health awareness and supportsys-

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An Economics student minoring in Psychology from the St. Joseph's College of Commerce in Bengaluru, Nethra plans to pursue a career in Finance. She also feels humans are "predictably irrational" or function within "bounded rationality." Thus, she sees herself contributing and working at a juncture where she can interpret data at the intersection of these domains.

Participating in the essay competition was a captivating journey that allowed me to leverage my interest and passion for identifying and using human behavior patterns to improve oneself. A nuanced analysis of the intricate relationship between gadget dependency and psychological well-being demanded meticulous research and analytical acumen. Engaging with this multifaceted topic deepened my understanding and honed my ability to navigate complex socio-psychological phenomena. This experience underscored the importance of interdisciplinary approaches in addressing contemporary societal challenges and ignited my passion for scholarly inquiry. I find the pervasive influence of gadget dependency on mental health to be an intellectually compelling and socially urgent topic for research.

Drawing from personal experiences and corroborating social data, I observed a concerning trend of compulsive gadget use leading to anxiety, depression, and social alienation, and this demands more profound research to guide public health initiatives, policy formulation, and intervention strategies. By unraveling the intricate interplay between technology and mental well-being, research can catalyze societal discourse and foster a culture of mindful technology consumption, ultimately shaping a healthier and more resilient future. Finally, the most important takeaways from this experience have been the realization that this is a problem that no one takes accountability for and will remain a problem among future generations as well unless there is the identification of where the trade-off is going out of hand and the courage to act to make a difference.

Education, a Priority: Ashwath Chelladurai

I was working on a paper focussing on the shift in education in the Indian context when I came across the essay competition. This would be an excellent opportunity to apply what I had learned. It was an outstanding experience, allowing me to review several literature and documents before submitting the final draft. Ever since COVID hit the world, there has been a change in the work and educational environment.

While the work environment adapted to a remote working mode, the academic sphere took a while. So, I wanted to analyze and critically consider this drastic change in India. The several works and papers I came across during the drafting process have helped improve my knowledge of the topic. Resilience Unleashed:

PORY **Journey from Uncertainty to World of Taste**

Mahesh (Name Changed), an 18-year-old orphan from Davangere, faced significant challenges finding direction and motivation for skill training. Don Bosco Davangere referred him to BOSCO Sumanahalli for skill training, but initially, he showed little interest, expressing a desire only for cricket coaching. Despite these challenges, Mahesh's story is one of resilience and transformation.

Mahesh's lack of family support and changing interests challenged his engagement in the skill training programme. Initially, he hesitated to participate and lacked the motivation to learn a new skill. His emotional stability was poor, and he struggled to maintain a clear vision for his future. BOSCO Sumanahalli intervened by providing Mahesh with consistent mentorship and guidance. They recognized his interest in cricket, so they arranged for him to coach at a nearby school. However, they also encouraged him to consider bakery skill training, highlighting the success stories of other youths who had been trained and successfully employed. Regular motivational sessions and emotional support helped him stay engaged in the programme.

Despite initially expressing interest in cricket coaching, Mahesh's interests evolved. After three months of training, he expressed a newfound interest in football. He received daily training sessions throughout this process to keep him motivated and emotionally stable. Constant counseling and accompaniment played pivotal roles in his journey, providing constant guidance and support. Mahesh completed the bakery skill training and is now employed at Amma Pastries, Kothanur Branch. His transformation is evident not only in

his acquired baking skills but also in his improved behaviour and stability.

From a state of disturbance and uncertainty, he has emerged as a focused and job-ready individual. Mahesh's story exemplifies the transformative impact of skill training and mentorship on vulnerable youth. Despite facing initial challenges and uncertainties, he discovered his potential and secured meaningful employment. His journey exemplifies how empowering youth through skill development can change lives and build a brighter future.
