Celebrating Success: Computer Trainees Receive Certificates



BOSCO Yuvaspandana organized a programme to distribute the course completion certificates to the computer trainees of

the centre on April 8, 2024. In his introductory words, Fr. Jude Anand, Director BOSCO Yuvaspandana congratulated the youths for completing the course. Addressing the trainees, Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru, briefed them about the various skill training courses available at BOSCO. He encouraged them to refer more and more youths to avail themselves of the benefits of skill training. Computer students shared their opinions. Certificates were distributed to eighteen trainees. Around thirty-five tuition children, teachers, and staff were in the programme.

Foster Care State-Level Stakeholders Meeting

Foster Care Programme, BOSCO Bengaluru organized a State Level Stakeholders' Meeting at BOSCO Yuvo-daya, Bengaluru, on April 05, 2024. Mrs. Manju, Member, Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (KSCPCR), said that every child deserves to grow up with a family and to be loved and cared for by his/her parents. Stakeholders play an essential role in identifying prospective parents and children. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru, shared BOSCO's activities and milestones of the Foster Care Programme. He discussed about the ICPS permission letter and standard operating procedures. He urged that departments cooperate and support BOSCO in implementing and placing children in Foster Care.

Fr. P S George, Executive Director, BREADS, referred to the stakeholders as children's friends and said that institutional care should be the last resort for children. He suggested all stakeholders and staff go through the JJ Act and shared that Kerala is the state with the most significant number of children placed in foster care. Mr. Chowdappa, Chairperson, Child Welfare Committee, Kolar, said that through the guidance of BOSCO, two children had been placed in the Kolar District. Mrs. Bharathi, Member, Child Welfare Committee, Bengaluru Rural, said that when a child enters



the institution, the staff must identify his or her relatives and parents. She observed several parents submitting foster care applications through the BOSCO Foster Care team. Mr. Umesh, Director, Veerabhadra Educational Society, Tumkur, spoke on the occasion

Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru, explained about the responsibilities of the stakeholders. Two of the participants came forward to foster children. Mr. Shivamallu, State Coordinator, BOSCO Foster Care Programme, welcomed the participants. Ms. Nandini N, AD Coordinator, and Mr. Obalesh, Social Mobilizer, BOSCO Foster Care Programme, proposed the vote of thanks. Nagaveni, DCPO, Bengaluru South, was present at the meeting. Eighty-one stakeholders from Bengaluru Rural, Bengaluru Urban, Kolar, Chikkaballapura, Tumkur, and Ramanagera participated in the meeting.

Children's Day Out



The children attending the tuition classes from BOSCO Nivas, Nilaya and Yuvaspandana were taken out for a one-day picnic to Fun World, Bengaluru, on April 30, 2024. The children visited the water world and

played in the water pool, water slides, the Fantastic Four, rainwater, devil's drop, etc. It was an enjoyable time beating the summer heat. They also enjoyed the dry games. After spending an extended time in the water, the children had a delicious lunch. One hundred and forty-three children from Nivas, Nilaya, and Yuvaspandana, as well as thirty-three staff and tuition teachers led by Fr. Jude Anand, Director, were part of the one-day outing.

BOSCO Centers Honor Dr. Ambedkar's Legacy



BOSCO Rainbow Home and BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, celebrated Ambedkar Jayanthi to commemorate the 133rd birthday of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar at their respective school and centres on April 14, 2024. The celebrations began with the garlanding of the photo of Dr. Ambedkar. The Directors and the staff spoke about the great personality – the

recipient of Bharata Ratna, India's highest civilian award, Champion of Social Freedom, who argued for legal freedom and social liberties for the oppressed. They enumerated his life story, his contributions to society as a social activist, his achievements and struggles to deal with the caste system, his persistent fight against all institutional and social odds and giving choice and dignity to all Indian citizens in a stratified society. Dr. Ambedkar is the Architect of our Constitution and is known as the "Father of Indian Constitution". As citizens of India, we enjoy constitutional rights because of him. The children and youth were encouraged to follow his principles and values. Fifty girls from Rainbow Home and thirty-two trainees from Sumanahalli centre participated in the celebration.

Basketball Coaching



BOSCO Nilaya organized a basketball coaching camp for the children of their intervention areas in collaboration with the CROSSCOVER mission at BOSCO Mane from April 24 to 29, 2024. The training camp was conducted with a vision of joining together in unity to reach out to the young people who need it most. The team briefly explained Equality, Leadership, Communication, Teamwork, and Gender equality. T-shirts and Basketballs were distributed to the children. The team included Mr. Shaun, Ms. Hannah, Ms. Kirby and Mr. Adam from CROSSOVER, USA, Ms. Sanjana and Mr. Hemanth from Bengaluru and Mr. Tanmay from Mumbai. Fifty children from the communities underwent the training.

Session on Team Work



BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli organized a life skill session on 'Team Work' for the trainees at the centre on April 16, 2024. Ms. Saleena, Centre Coordinator, conducted the session. The session started with an ice-breaking activity. The trainees were divided into pairs and were made to play the 'Land Mine' game. Paper pieces and balls were spread on the floor. One among the pair would be blindfolded, and the other had to lead the way without touching the balls or paper pieces. Through this game, she explained the importance of teamwork. Thirty trainees were a part of this session.

Capacity Development Programmes on Aftercare

The second and third round of training was organized for the Coordinators and Caretakers of the Child Care Institutions by BOSCO Bengaluru at BOSCO Mane on April 18 and 30, 2024. The sessions were facilitated by Mrs. Ramya, Chief Executive Officer, We Live Foundation. The sessions commenced with a discussion on 'Children in CCI's v/s Children in Families', shedding valuable insights into various challenges children face in different caregiving environments. The key points included the identity crisis many children in CCIs experience, where they question who they are and where they belong, the phenomenon of accelerated adulthood, the distinction between behavioural patterns and problems, the complex dynamics of obedience, autonomy, and rebellion, the importance of adopting a value-neutral lens.

During the second session, participants engaged in both individual and group activity, where they were tasked with identifying issues (physical, social, emotional, intellectual) and societal perceptions associated with them. The groups identified resources available, schedule/time, process/structure, and remarks, which helped them gain practical insights into the multi-dimensional nature of challenges faced by children and the societal attitudes shaping these issues.

In the third round of training, a video featuring Suvin, a success story from We Live Foundation, was screened, which got everyone thinking about the importance of support in children's lives. There was a



discussion on the topic 'CCI Expectations and Society's Expectations from a Child.' Mrs. Ramya led the conversation, emphasizing the importance of prioritizing various aspects to ensure the holistic development of children under institutional care. The discussion on controlled and dependent CCIs autonomy and complete independence was a significant highlight of the session. This prompted a thoughtful interaction on strategies to reduce unnecessary control and empower children towards greater independence as they grow. No Bell Day, conducting regular group meetings, and involving children in decision-making were explored.

A group activity made the importance of tailored support based on children's ages clear. Through collaborative discussions, participants evaluated existing approaches and proposed innovative strategies to address these challenges more effectively. Seventeen participants attended the training sessions.

Meeting with APF Programme Lead



A meeting was conducted with Mr. Aditya - Program Lead APF, and the Directors and Coordinators of CCIs at BOSCO Mane on April 30, 2024. Following the self-introductions, Mr. Kevin, Project Manager,

presented an overview of the project. Individual presentations were made by coordinators from various CCIs. Mr. Balaraj, Manager Family Restoration and After Care, presented a detailed report.

The meeting served as a comprehensive platform for assessing the progress and challenges within the CCIs supported by APF. The presentations and discussions provided valuable insights into the various initiatives to rehabilitate and support vulnerable children and families. Seventeen Directors and Coordinators of BOSCO Rainbow Home, Vatsalya Bhavan, Yuvakendra, Sumanahalli, Yuvodaya, Mane and Vikas, and the Project Department team participated in this meeting.

Awareness Programmes in Public Places



The BOSCO outreach team working in BMTC and KSRTC Bus Stands conducted four awareness programmes for commuters and passengers during April 2024 regarding runaway children, child labour, child trafficking, CHILDLINE, 1098, and other BOSCO activities. The team explained child rights and child-related issues and the BOSCO Child Assistance Centre at KSRTC and BMTC to the public and distributed around 250 pamphlets.

BOSCO Adjacent Railway Street Presence Project (ARSP) organized programmes in SMVT, KR Puram,

Kengeri Railway Station, and Yelahanka Railway Stations and moving trains to create awareness about BOSCO work and its services to the public in April 2024. The team briefly introduced BOSCO and the services rendered at the railway stations. They also spoke about the issues faced by children/youth on the streets and called for the support of the public in reaching out to these children/youth in need of care and protection. Around three hundred and fifty public were reached out to by way of distributing pamphlets.

BOSCO Nivas and Nilaya organized public awareness and door-to-door awareness programmes during April 2024 at Shivajinagar and market areas to raise awareness about child-related issues and other services such as tuition and skill training at BOSCO. The teams also spoke about school enrolment and hostel facilities. They requested the public to convey information about tuition and skill training to their friends, family members, and others in their contact list. The children working at grocery shops were motivated to attend school and tuition classes. Around four hundred public were given awareness.

SJPU Organizes Consultation Meeting

The Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU), BOSCO, Bengaluru, organized a consultation meeting with parents of children in conflict with the law of the West Division at BOSCO Mane on April 20, 2024. Ramaswamy, Coordinator, SJPU, BOSCO, Bengaluru, welcomed the gathering. Fr. John Peter, Director, BOSCO SJPU Project, explained in detail the SJPU project and the roles and responsibilities of the social workers. He said that helping the children correct their mistakes and bringing them to the righteous path becomes essential for the parents and the caretakers. Ramaswamy briefed the parents on their roles and responsibilities. He explained child protection, child rights, the POSCO Act, child marriage, and child trafficking. He informed the gathering about the vocational courses and the counselling services for the youth at BOSCO. The life after coming out of the



observation homes was also discussed. Eleven parents and seven children participated in the discussion.

Awareness for the Parents



BOSCO Yuvodaya organized awareness sessions for the parents who visited the centre during the CWC sittings in April 2024. Fr. Johnson, Director, BOSCO Yuvodaya, addressed the parents and stressed the importance of creating a conducive environment for the development of children at home. He urged parents to ensure their children get an education as it is their right. The parents were made aware of the children's rights and the various laws and acts related to children. Group counselling was also done for the parents during the programme. Ms. Vinnarasi, Team Member, BOSCO Yuvodaya, supported Fr. Johnson by translating the information into Hindi. More than a hundred parents benefitted.

Awareness to Stakeholders



Child Safety Net (CSN) Project, and Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) Project, BOSCO Bengaluru organized awareness programmes for the BBMP Pourakarmikas in Nagarbhavi, Moodalapalya, Girinagar and Rajajinagar and for the staff and children of Auxilium Navajeevana, Chamarajpet, Bengaluru during April 2024 respectively. The coordinators- PN Basavaraju and Ramaswamy, spoke about child-related issues like sexual abuse and drug abuse. They requested the support of the stakeholders in identifying children employed, children in difficult situations, and children in conflict with the law so that every child may have a safe and happy childhood. Over a hundred Pourakarmikas and sixty-five Auxilium Navajeevana staff attended the sessions.

Foster Care Awareness



BOSCO Foster Care organized awareness programmes for the ASHA Workers in Dobbaspet, Shivagange and Jigani, Bengaluru Rural during April 2024. Mr. Obalesh K, a Social Mobilizer, introduced the concept of foster care and adoption to the stakeholders. He briefed about the procedures and processes involved in foster care and adoption. He requested the support of the stakeholders in identifying prospective parents for fostering and children in need of a family setting. Fifty-seven ASHA Workers attended the programmes.

Adolescent Girls' Meeting



BOSCO Nivas met with the adolescent girls from Rajiv Gandhi colony on April 12, 2024. Ms. Kalavani, Coordinator of BOSCO Nivas, covered topics such as menstrual hygiene, nutritious food, sufficient potable water intake, healthy lifestyle, choosing good friends, online safety, saying no to drugs, and personal safety. The meeting primarily aimed to create awareness of personal hygiene and peer group influence. Twenty-five girls benefited from the meeting.

Parents' Meeting



BOSCO Nivas met with the parents of children attending tuition classes at Sagayapuram on April 18, 2024. The team guided the mothers on rearing their children, understanding and accepting them as they are, encouraging and motivating them to pursue their goals, being role models, having mutual respect, being responsive and interactive, and caring for their health and education. The parents were informed of the upcoming summer camp and a one-day picnic for the children. Twenty-two mothers attended the meeting.

Health Camp at Nagarabhavi



BOSCO CSN Project, in collaboration with the Labour Department and Mobile Clinic Unit, organized a health camp at Nagarabhavi community on April 27, 2024. Dr. Prakash and two staff nurses conducted the camp. Weight, height, blood pressure, and sugar levels were checked. All children and parents were advised to eat homemade food rather than junk food. They were advised to consume fruits, green vegetables, milk, and eggs daily. Twenty-five parents and children availed of the medical Camp services.

Eye Screening Camp



An eye screening camp was organized at BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan for the inmates and their parents on April 28, 2024. Retina Institute of Karnataka, a Unit of the Eye Foundation Chamarajpet, Bengaluru, conducted the camp. The parents and children had their eyes examined. Based on the results, the doctors prescribed medication. A few were recommended for additional treatment. Fifty-five children and their parents benefitted.

Ugadi Celebration



BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, celebrated Ugadi on April 9, 2024. The centre was decorated with flowers, neem, and mango leaves, and special dishes were prepared for the day. Fr. Joseph Dandavathi, Assistant Director, BOSCO Sumanahalli, explained the day's importance and wished all the inmates a happy and prosperous New Year ahead. He explained the significance of the Ugadi festival and blessed the youths. Twenty-three trainees and staff were part of the celebration.



Summer Camp for Tuition Children

BOSCO Life Skill Training Centre, Sumanahalli, organized a two-day summer camp for the tuition children of Devaraj Urs area, Sumanahalli and Sajjepalya, to help the children discover more about themselves, to improve their talents and abilities and to improve group dynamics at the centre on April 6 and 7, 2024. Many games and activities, such as dance, music, and crafts, were conducted. The Victoria Hospital, Bengaluru medical team organized a health camp for the children. Volunteers from BC College and Ambedkar College conducted the activities for the children. Awareness regarding 'personal hygiene' was given through a skit. Gifts were given to the children during



the camp. The two days were filled with fun and frolic. Sixty-eight tuition-going children and three staff were involved in the camp.

Soaring Spirits - 2024



'Soaring Spirits - 2024' a summer camp, was organized for the girls of BOSCO Rainbow Home at Don Bosco, Srirampura, Mysore, to provide opportunities for children to learn new things from April 11 to April 19, 2024. Rev. Fr. Mathew, Rector, Don Bosco, Mysore and Rev. Fr. Tony, Administrator, Don Bosco, Mysore, inaugurated the camp. The children were divided into four groups. On April 12, 2024, the children participated in the drawing competition and awareness sessions and watched the movie 'Care of Footpath' on account of International Day for Street Children. The children enjoyed exploring Mysore and visiting Sukavana, Palace, Zoo, Museum, St. Philomena's Church, Chamundi Hills and Temple on April 13, 2024.

Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO, visited children on April 14, 2024, and conducted a session on the POSCO Act, during which he discussed the various forms of child abuse, including physical, emotional, sexual, and child neglect, online

safety, drug abuse, etc. Ms. Shruthi Pradeep and Dr. Pradeep, Resource Persons, conducted a session on 'Goal Setting' and 'Healthy Life'. Children learned about meditation and the awakening of Kundalini Power from Suchetta D, Shiva Kumar, Bhagyashree, Prem Kala, Resource Persons, Sahaja Yoga Trust, and followers of Nirmala Mataji. Dr Aruna Diwakar and Dr Diwakar, ex-Army officer, conducted health and hygiene classes. Dr. Aruna led a discussion on how to keep one's physical, mental, and spiritual well-being intact. Children and staff visited Prabodhana, Theological Institute of the Pallottine Fathers. Fr. John Peter, Rector, Prabodhana, spoke to the children on the value of education and life. Rev. Fr. Mathew led a session on "Self Esteem." The valedictory function included the cultural programme and the prize distribution. Every child participated enthusiastically in the outdoor and party games and campfire and gained knowledge of leadership, time management, teamwork, discipline and personal hygiene. Aside from this, they had different competitions every evening, such as fancy dress, skits, group singing, dance, etc.

Additionally, they learned how to make greeting cards, wall hangings, flower making, basic embroidery, stitching, drawing, painting, and more. The children had a self-assessment exercise, which helped them identify their areas of strength and areas of future improvement. Forty-eight girls were part of the camp.



Summer Camp in Communities



BOSCO CSN Team organized a summer camp for the Veerabhadragudda Nagara tuition center children at Government Higher Primary School, Veerabhadranagara Bengaluru on April 12, 2024. The camp aimed to keep the children engaged in meaningful activities during the summer holidays and help them understand themselves better. The camp was inaugurated by Mr. Puttaswamy, ASI, Girinagara Police Station and Ms. Sharadha, Tuition Teacher. Mr. Basavaraju P N, Coordinator, CSN Project, briefed the objectives of the summer camp and explained about child protection mechanisms and rights. Mr. Puttaswamy spoke on child safety and the roles of child welfare police officers in the care and protection of children. The summer camp was filled with differ-

ent activities. Children enjoyed games like passing the ball, bombing the city, kere dada, musical chairs, fun games and activities like dance and singing. CSN team members, two MSW student volunteers, and two CFIC Brothers were present at the programme. A total of sixty-three children participated in the camp.

A summer camp was organized for the children of tuition centers of Doddabasti and Chikkabasti areas at Shanimahathma Temple premises, Chikkabasthi, by the BOSCO CSN Project on April 19, 2024. The camp aimed to engage the children in meaningful activities during the summer holidays and help them understand themselves better. Mr. Basavaraju P N, Coordinator, CSN project explained the objectives of summer camp and child protection, child-related issues and child rights. Mr. Moraiah, ASI, Jnanabharathi Police Station, spoke on child safety and the role of Child Welfare Police Officers in the care and protection of children.

The children were engaged in several activities, fun games, dance, music, etc. Ms. Pavithra, Tuition Teacher, two BSW student volunteers from Acharya College Bengaluru, one MSW student from Don Bosco College, TC Playa, Bengaluru and CSN Staff conducted the camp. Jagadish, Police Constable, Jnanabharati Police Station, was present during the inauguration. Twenty-six children participated in the camp.

Summer Camp at Tuition Centres

Mr Guruswamy, ASI /BNC Railway Protection Force Police (RPF), inaugurating the summer camp, explained the importance of the camp and urged the children to utilize the opportunities to the fullest. The respective teachers and the ARSP team engaged the children in various activities like dance, crafts, music, essay writing, etc. The children of MCTC Anganwadi Tuition centre were taken for a one-day outing to Dodda



Alada Mara and the nearby temples. Around fifty-five tuition children participated in the camps.



Summer Camp at Magadi Road Area

BOSCO Yuvakendra conducted a summer camp for the tuition children of the Magadi Road area from April 8 to 30, 2024. The inauguration of the camp was done in the presence of Mr. Sathyanarayan, Chief Guest, Fr. Dominic, Salesian In-charge and Sr. Silvy, Director, BOSCO Yuvakendra and Fr. Philip, SDB. The children were divided into three groups. During the camp, the centre staff, volunteers, and past pupils taught children spoken English, crafts, drawing, dance, Karate, mimicry, value education, and child rights. The children were taken for a one-day outing to Cubbon Park, the Museum and the Planetarium. The valedictory of Summer Camp was held on April 30, 2024. Mr. Sathyanarayan and Fr. Dominic were present, and the children performed cultural programmes. They also



expressed their feedback about the month-long camp. Thirty-five tuition children participated in the camp.

Value Education Session on Leading a Noble Life

BOSCO Nilaya's value education session on 'Leading a noble life' held on April 5, 2024, aimed to instill important values in the children attending tuition classes at Rajagopal Garden. The session, facilitated by two MSW Volunteers from TISS, Guwahati, emphasized the significance of cultivating values in daily life. In addition to promoting the use of the three golden words—sorry, thank you, and please—the volunteers underscored the importance of empathy, compassion, and cooperation in building character and fostering harmonious relationships within the community. Through engaging activities and thought-provoking videos, the volunteers encouraged the children to reflect on their actions and interactions with others, emphasizing the impact of kindness and respect. By providing practical examples and interactive discussions, the session aimed to empower the children with the knowledge and skills necessary for leading virtuous and fulfilling lives.

The active participation of twenty-seven children in the session reflects their eagerness to learn and their receptiveness to positive values. BOSCO Nilaya's ongoing efforts to provide holistic education and charac-



ter development opportunities underscore its commitment to nurturing responsible and compassionate individuals who contribute positively to society.

PUC

Hemalatha was admitted to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan (BVB) after being denied admission to the previous school due to her low academic performance. In 2018, her father brought her, requesting shelter and education. She was placed in the bridge course. She adapted quickly and achieved 62% in SSLC. Later, she studied PUC at St. Teresa's College, where she struggled to keep up with her academics but, with perseverance and dedication, scored **65%** in her PUC. She wants to pursue higher studies.



After completing her SSLC in 2022, **Preethi** was sent to BVB from Jeevanaliya in Nelamangala. Due to difficult circumstances at home, she could not stay with her family. She has passed the exam and secured **60%** marks. She wants to pursue a degree course.

Sai Krishna hails from Thirupathi, Andhra Pradesh and belongs to an economically underprivileged family. He joined BOSCO Mane in 2015 and completed his 10th grade. In 2022, he was enrolled in BOSCO Sumanahalli for his further studies. He secured **79%** in his PUC II exam and is a talented actor. Although he has considerable talent in acting, his ultimate aspiration is to become a software engineer.



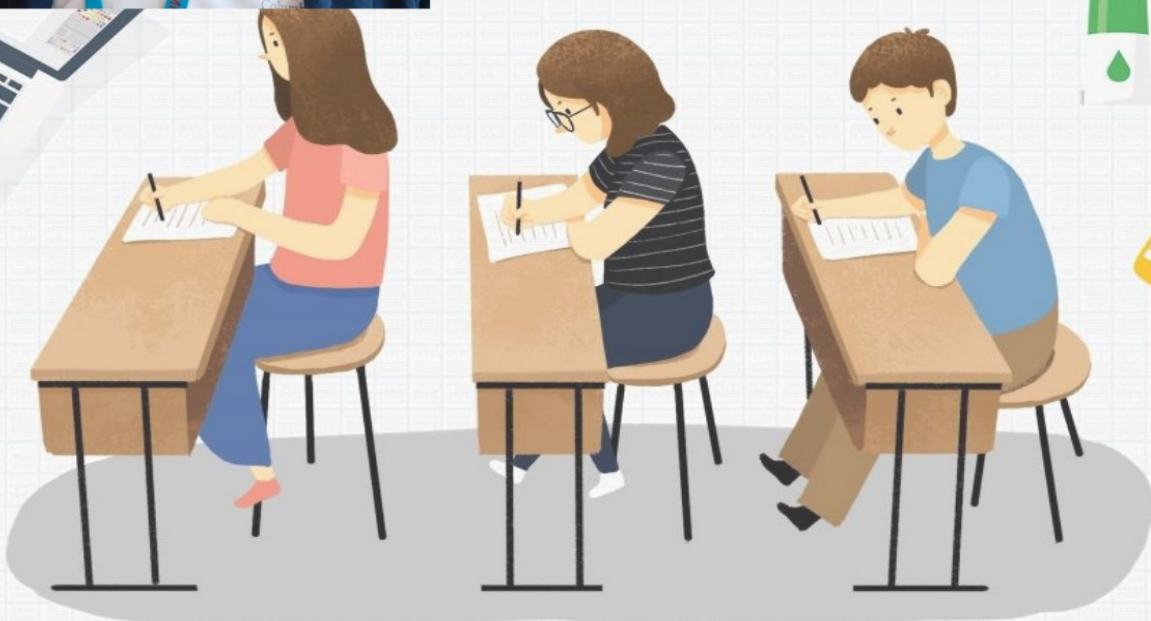
Results
