FOREWORD

As we reflect on the year that has passed, our hearts are filled with deep gratitude on the positive impact that BOSCO has been able to bring into the lives of so many children. As we stand at this juncture, we are more determined than ever to embrace the responsibility that lies ahead. With unwavering resolve, we look forward to welcoming many more underprivileged young people into our journey, eager to share with them the warmth, love, and hope they deserve in the coming year. Our commitment to transform the lives of the vulnerable children remains steadfast, and we are inspired to continue making a difference in the hearts of those who need it most.

I am delighted to present the Annual Report of 2023-24, celebrating a year of remarkable achievements. This year, we enhanced the lives of children through street outreach, rescue, rehabilitation, and more, while also advocating at the community level for rights and empowerment. Our programs are designed with precision to address each child's need and foster their growth. BOSCO is dedicated to nurturing their development and preparing them for success, alongside empowering families and communities to drive positive change.

In the past year, BOSCO has made significant strides in its mission to support and uplift children in need. We rescued 4,477 children and provided services to 567, with shelter given to 3,755 and home placements for 3,415. Our educational initiatives have impacted 187 children through academic education and 203 through skill training. With 27 tuition centres, we offer supplementary education to over 800 children. We have begun follow-ups with After-Care children and those restored to their families. Our efforts to eradicate child labour in Gandhi Nagar area included an anti-child labour sticker campaign. The successful implementation of our Foster Care Program across 20 districts in Karnataka was made possible with support from Don Bosco Institutions and other NGOs. We initiated a new Child Care Institution, BOSCO Sneha Bhavan, and we are planning new initiatives through BOSCO Yuvakendra, including youth skill training in computer and an Open School program for dropouts. We also published the Kannada version of "40 Diamonds" and the revised version of "Glow in the Horizon" and continue to enhance our social media presence. The Child Rights and Integrated Service Program (CRISP) project, a continuation of the Child Rights Education and Action Movement (CREAM) Project, has been implemented, and despite the discontinuation of Railway CHILDLINE and City CHILDLINE services, our Adjacent Railway Stations Presence (ARSP) team has successfully established a strong presence at Sir M. Visvesaraya Terminal (SMVT) and other railway stations where children are rescued and rehabilitated. We were honoured as the best Node for HomeLink Network at the YAR National level and our staff members were recognized by government agencies for their dedication to social involvement.



I would like to extend my profound gratitude to the staff of BOSCO for their unwavering dedication and tireless efforts in providing a safe and nurturing environment for children and youth. Their relentless commitment to rescuing these vulnerable individuals from the clutches of social evils is both inspiring and commendable. I also wish to acknowledge and thank all those who have joined us in this noble endeavour for their support, concern, and involvement especially BREADS, Raja Foundation, Azim Premji Foundation, Claude, and Silviana whose generosity has been instrumental in advancing our mission and has profoundly touched the lives of many. Street Presence

Children on the street in India choose to leave their families and homes for strategic reasons. It could be urban poverty, aberrant families, or urbanization. A child running away from home ends up on the street in most situations. Sometimes the reason is the child's behaviour, and sometimes the cause could be the parents. Children missing school for some reason or not doing homework, and leaving home fearing the repercussions is a very common cause. Stealing money, fights with siblings etc. are other common reasons. Most children leave their



families to live on the street because of family problems like the death of a parent, alcoholism of one or both parents, strained relationship with step parents, parents' separation, abuse, and family violence. It is noticed that many of such children come from communities where illiteracy is high, drug use is rampant and unemployment is the fall out.

Once on the streets, many children are kidnapped or trafficked and forced into begging, stealing, sex trade, etc. Therefore, BOSCO is present on the streets, 24x7, to rescue such children through counseling, medical assistance, providing food and shelter, organizing orientation camps and awareness programmes. On an average 15 children are rescued daily from the streets. A majority of such children (around 80-85%) are taken back to their homes.

FROM SHADOWS TO SUNSHINE...

Shashi (Name Changed) has been under the care and protection of the organization for the past year. His family is originally from Tamil Nadu but migrated to Bengaluru a few years ago for work and settled in K.R. Market. Initially, they lived on the streets, but now they reside in a rented house in Nayandahalli. Shashi has three older brothers—Sharan, Chandan, and Sanjay—and three younger brothers—Rahul, Harish, and Hruthik. Chandan and Sanjay are also under the care and protection of BOSCO Vikas. Shashi lived with relatives in Tamil Nadu and studied in the 3rd standard. During the first wave of the COVID-19 lockdown, he was brought back to Bengaluru but was not enrolled in school. His eldest brother pressured him into substance abuse and sent him to buy cigarettes and tobacco. BOSCO Nilaya staff noticed this and referred him to BOSCO Mane. Recognizing his need for care and protection, he was admitted to the organization on November 16, 2021.

Since his admission, Shashi has been undergoing a bridge course. Initially, he exhibited poor academic performance, language difficulties, and behavioural issues such as bullying and using inappropriate language. However, through individual and group counselling sessions, value education, and constant motivation, Shashi has gradually adjusted to the organization and started mingling with other children. He is now actively engaged in his studies and progressing slowly. He also participates in all organizational activities and aspires to become a football player, playing the sport daily. Shashi is happy and thriving in the organization.

Rescue

Conditions on the street are never child-friendly, and far from being safe. Here, they become prey to human predators. Every day, BOSCO conducted rescue operations for runaway children, child labourers, abandoned and orphaned children, abused and begging children, trafficked children, children addicted to substances, migrant children, out of school children, victims of child marriage and sexual abuse, children from railway platforms, bus terminals, factories, hotels, parks, markets, public places, etc., through its teams. BOSCO's important components such as CHILDLINE, Railway CHILDLINE, SJPU, Child Safety Net etc., collaborated with the Police and other Government Departments in crucial interventions through rescue operations and awareness programmes. BOSCO rescued and rehabilitated 4477 children from vulnerable situations during the year.

WE DARE TO CARE!

It was the news of a newborn child being sold by his own mother that brought the CSN team to the RR temple in Bengaluru, on the trail of a couple from Erode in Tamil Nadu and their 20-day old child. In November 2023, the BOSCO Child Safety Net (CSN) team received information about a newborn male child being sold for money, and accordingly, the team in collaboration with the RR Nagar police and CCB (Central Crime Branch) conducted a rescue mission in which the mother of the child and her 3 accomplices were caught. But this mother and child were just a small part of a larger illegal operation being headed by a broker targeting childless couples willing to pay money for a child and financially vulnerable families with infants aged 2-3 months, with children changing hands for amounts ranging from Rs. 3-5 lakhs.

Following the rescue, the child was immediately taken to Vanivilas Hospital and admitted for necessary medical attention and care. The team also informed Ms Nagaratna, the Chairman of the Child Welfare Committee about the rescue and the events that unfolded thereafter. Finally, on November 27, 2023 the baby was discharged from the hospital under the supervision of the concerned authorities and admitted to Amruth Shishu Nivas in Basavanagudi, Bengaluru, according to the order of CWC 1, away from the shadow of a life written by his parents' abandonment and society's shortcomings, into a future rewritten by the conviction and compassion of people committed to caring for children against all odds.

Counselling

The children rescued from the streets and other dangerous situations often display behavioural patterns of anxiety, tension, excessive worrying, irritability, distractibility, internal tensions and conflicts, uncontrollable avoidance of threatening situations, depression, panic, phobias, etc. This may be due to their exposure to poverty, violence, conflict, lack of parenting, and sexual, physical and /or mental abuse. It is BOSCO's primary goal to make the children feel that they are worthy and capable of living a better life. BOSCO provides counselling services to the children with the help of professional counsellors at different stages of intervention by way of individual counselling and group counselling. Through professional counselors, BOSCO provides both individual and group counseling to these children and youth on a regular basis. Counseling is also provided to the parents, guardians, and legal custodians of the rescued children. During the



past one year, around 4776 rescued children were given counselling on a regular basis.

RESILIENCE UNLEASHED: JOURNEY FROM UNCERTAINTY TO WORLD OF TASTE

Mahesh (Name Changed), an 18-year-old orphan from Davangere, faced significant challenges in finding direction and motivation for skill training. He was referred to BOSCO Sumanahalli by Don Bosco Davangere for skill training, but initially, he showed little interest, expressing a desire only for cricket coaching. Despite these challenges, Mahesh's story is one of resilience and transformation.

Mahesh's lack of family support and changing interests posed challenges to his engagement in the skill training programme. Initially, he was hesitant to participate and lacked the motivation to learn a new skill. His emotional stability was poor, and he struggled to maintain a clear vision for his future. BOSCO Sumanahalli intervened by providing Mahesh with consistent mentorship and guidance. Recognizing his interest in cricket, they arranged for him to coach at a nearby school. However, they also encouraged him to consider bakery skill training, highlighting the success stories of other youths who had been trained and successfully employed. Regular motivational sessions and emotional support helped him stay engaged in the programme.

Despite initially expressing interest in cricket coaching, Mahesh's interests evolved. After three months of training, he expressed a newfound interest in football. Throughout this process, he received daily sessions to keep him motivated and emotionally stable. His counsellors and the centre's director played pivotal roles in his journey, providing constant guidance and support. Mahesh completed the bakery skill training and is now employed at Amma Pastries, Kothanur Branch. His transformation is evident not only in his acquired baking skills but also in his improved behaviour and stability.

From a state of disturbance and uncertainty, he has emerged as a focused and job-ready individual. Mahesh's story exemplifies the transformative impact of skill training and mentorship on vulnerable youth. Despite facing initial challenges and uncertainties, he was able to discover his potential and secure meaningful employment. His journey serves as an inspiring example of how empowering youth through skill development can change lives and build a brighter future.

Health Care

The children in BOSCO usually come from the underprivileged sections of society, and have various untreated diseases. This is mostly because of the unhygienic livings conditions on the street and lack of knowledge about treatment options and medical facilities. The Health Care team of BOSCO tries its best to give the best medical help to the children in the centres, and in the areas of service. Through first aid, medication, and hospital visits, the team gives immediate attention and care to those who are in need. To minimise the occurrence and spreading of diseases, the team also uses awareness programmes to educate the poor communities and children in the centres about health care. With regular health check-ups, the team diagnoses sicknesses at an early stage, which ensures that children receive treatment at the right time.

The most common medical problems seen in the children are fever, various skin infections such as scabies, wounds and injuries, tuberculosis, fractures, mumps, dental problems, eye problems, heart diseases, epilepsy, psychological problems, dengue, ENT problems, and animal bites. Besides direct interventions, as many as 69 health and nutrition awareness programmes in the centres and 8 awareness in the communities and areas of intervention, 33 general health camps including dental camps and eye camps, in the centres were conducted during the year. In the areas 1 cancer detection camp, 4 Eye camps and 2 general health check-ups were conducted. TB tests, HIV tests, blood grouping were also taken up for the children residing in the centres. De-worming tablets were administered to all the centre children once in 6 months.

Non-Formal Education

The children rescued by BOSCO are from diverse backgrounds such as school dropouts or children who have never been to school. The first priority of the organization is to prepare these children for formal education, provided they possess the aptitude and interest for studies. The Non-Formal system of education in BOSCO is relevant to the child's requirements, appropriate to the child's developmental level, flexible, participatory, inclusive, and protective of their right to survival and development. Thus, classes are organized in the different shelter homes of BOSCO to prepare them for schooling. BOSCO also organizes classes for children

for one reason, to prepare them for open school exams in the 10th standard and to take up jobs according to the skills that they are trained in.

Formal Education



BOSCO believes in educating children who have the least chances of attaining regular schooling, who require immense motivation, love and support from the educator. Children from various categories like street children, abandoned children, child labourers, children found begging, orphans, semi-orphans, children from poor backgrounds, children addicted to substances, children in conflict with the law, runaway children, etc., are enrolled in the BOSCO centres for rehabilitation. BOSCO, with its innovative strategies motivates the children to study and attend regular classes.

Its centers such as BOSCO Vikas, BOSCO Rainbow Home and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan are dedicated to making the children develop greater interest in their studies, while BOSCO Sumanahalli is dedicated to providing higher education to its resident pupils. After the children complete their schooling, BOSCO helps them enrol in colleges, ITIs and other training institutes based on their interests and aptitude.

During the year 247 children were given academic education.

Bridge Education

Children rescued from the streets and vulnerable pockets of Bengaluru, either orphaned or unable to return to their homes, are admitted to BOSCO centres. Here, skill training, non-formal education, creative learning, therapeutic counselling, mentoring, craft, play, art, etc. are provided to eliminate the deep rooted negative impact of street life or the problems faced by them at home due to unavoidable

circumstances. The goal of the bridge programme is to progressively bridge the gap between the existing skills of the children and the skills needed to enter and succeed in formal education. It helps children enrol in schools and focuses on their overall development and reintegration into mainstream society.



YASH'S JOURNEY TO SUCCESS

Yash (Name Changed) has been under the care and protection of the organization for the past one and a half years. His parents are from Shivamogga and belong to the Lambani community. Yash is their only child. Five years ago, his parents separated due to family disputes, and his father left to live on his own. Yash's mother took on the responsibility of raising him after the separation. They lived in a rented house, but her income was insufficient to meet their needs. She struggled to provide for him, and during the day, while she was at work, there was no one to look after him. She sought help and reached out to the BOSCO Rainbow Home Staff, who then referred Yash to BOSCO Mane. Mother and child came to the organization, and on February 24, 2022, Yash was admitted. He was then brought before the Child Welfare Committee-1, which assessed his situation, approved his admission, and ordered that he be given care and protection in the organization.

After his admission, Yash underwent a four-month bridge course. He performed well academically and was friendly with others. Initially, he would cry every day, missing his mother. He then participated in individual and group counselling sessions, received value education, and was given constant motivation for behavioural changes. Gradually, he adjusted to the organization, started mingling with other children, and showed good academic performance.

In recognition of his overall progress, he was admitted to the 3rd standard at Government Kannada Model Higher Primary School, Chamarajpet, where he secured 3rd rank in the annual exams. Currently, he is in the 4th standard, continuing to perform well. Yash is developing leadership qualities and effectively manages the green team as a leader. He is happy in the organization, actively participates in all activities, and aspires to become a football player, practising the sport daily.

Vocational Training

BOSCO runs its own skill training center for boys at BOSCO Sumanahalli. It is equipped with the latest machineries, qualified and experienced staffs to promote work culture in the youth, thereby enabling them join the mainstream of society. Youth are trained in carpentry, electrical, two wheeler mechanics, bakery, and welding. Apart from the above mentioned trades, tailoring units are also functioning at BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan along with Beautician course being offered at BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan. While BOSCO Sumanahalli provides computer education to the youth of the centre and surrounding communities in basics, Microsoft Office, internet and Tally, BOSCO Mane provides computer training to youths focused on training for a job. Computer education is a three month course, and during the last one year, 4 batches completed their course in Basic, Tally and Vocational training. Among the students, who were above 18 and 25 got placed in companies.



Life Skills Training and Spoken English Training are provided to students along with computer training for holistic growth and development. 73 Computer Trainees benefited from Life skills Training and Spoken English.

Computer classes were started in BOSCO Yuvaspandana benefitting the children residing in the communities in and around JC Road, Bengaluru. A total of 69 children/youths received the training and five youths were job placed.

With the intention of promoting a positive attitude among the youth and to strengthen the bond amongst them, besides generating a deeper interest in learning a skill, activities like youth meets, exposure visits, sports, and picnics are organized from time to time. BOSCO also arranges many life skills camps and holds talks on subjects like self-respect, personality development, etc.

LOST AND FOUND!

What Diksha (name changed) called love, her family called a mistake, but even after her love was gone, her mistake remained to tell the tale. Sixteen-year-old Diksha comes from a modest family in Deverachikanahalli, Bengaluru. Her mother worked as a house helper, and her father worked as a daily wage labourer, striving to provide the best life for Diksha and her younger siblings. However, beneath their seemingly peaceful life was resentment within Diksha.

Diksha was studying for her PUC when she first met the person who would change the course of her life. She befriended a boy in college and soon decided that her new relationship was more important than her existing ones. When her parents discovered the relationship, they warned her about its dangers, but she chose to ignore them. After completing her second year of PUC, having failed one subject, Diksha decided to leave home to pursue the life she wanted. The young couple soon realized that reality was far from their imagined story. As time and money ran out, they sought a more permanent solution, leading them to a bus stand and into the protective care of BOSCO.

Diksha was rescued from the bus stand and brought to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan for shelter. Gradually, she opened up to the staff about her experiences. Over time, Diksha began moving on from her mistake and made new decisions for her life with the staff's help. However, her family, especially her mother, struggled to escape

the incident. Diksha has been in BVB for over a year now. While her father is willing to forgive and forget, her mother remains adamant in her anger and pain.

In the meantime, Diksha was introduced to the Beautician course offered at the centre, which she completed with enthusiasm and interest. When her mother was contacted after Diksha completed the course to discuss her return home, she responded, "She left the house saying that she could live on her own, so now she has to." Consequently, Diksha has been enrolled in the Tailoring course as she waits out her mother's anger and continues her efforts with the staff's help to change her mother's decision.

Diksha is determined to find the path she wants to pursue. Along with the new skills she is learning at the centre, she aims to re-attempt the paper she failed in her second year of PUC and carve out a space for herself in the Beautician trade. With every new dream, she sees herself moving closer to erasing the mistake written across the canvas of her past.

Many jobs and positions in the corporate sector require basic skills in computers like typing speed, Microsoft Office Management, and Tally. Having these skills can increase job prospects and opportunities. Additionally, Basic computer skills allow individuals to complete tasks more efficiently, saving time and increasing productivity.





IN PURSUIT OF CAREER SUCCESS

Vani (Name Changed) from Kumaraswamy layout, Bengaluru completed her B. Com from St. Theresa's Degree College for Women, Chamarajpet, Bengaluru in 2022. After her graduation, she wanted to build a career, but due to her lack of computer knowledge, she was not hired anywhere. Hence, she joined BOSCO Mane Computer Training in January 2023. She completed the Basics and Tally Course and received the certificate. Now she is confident and capable of handling computers with ease. She has developed good documentation and presentation skills and additional knowledge in Tally. After the completion of her course, she applied for a job and was hired by a reputed company.

Job Placement

Most youths come to the city in search of jobs. After being counseled at BOSCO Yuvodaya they are sent to BOSCO Yuvakendra, where they are assisted and guided in finding

suitable employment. Youth who have undergone skill training at BOSCO's various vocational skill training centers are placed in jobs like welding, carpentry, computer data



entry, electricians, mechanics, screen printing, bakery, tailoring, sales, etc. BOSCO is in constant contact with a number of employers who understand the situation and background of these youths and are ready to extend cooperation and offer them jobs.

During 2023-24, 151 youths were job placed in different companies involving screen printing, carpentry, welding, driving, electronics, bakeries, as two-wheeler mechanics, office boys, salesmen, electricians, etc. 32 youths were self-employed. After the placement, their progress is continuously monitored by BOSCO till they can manage on their own.

FROM BASICS TO BRILLIANCE

"Fear is only as deep as the mind allows. " This expression was lived by Mohan (Name Changed), now an Assistant Manager at Kotak Mahindra Bank. When he started his journey as a computer student, he was intimidated by its complexity but didn't let his challenges discourage him. He knew that learning computer skills is necessary for success in today's world.

With the help of the BOSCO staff, step by step, Mohan started learning the basics, starting with typing, and then moved on to more complex skills such as programs like Microsoft Word and Excel. Through learning computer skills, Mohan could explore the vast world of the internet and its many resources. Eventually, Mohan's hard work and determination paid off, and he secured a position as Assistant manager. Mohan's journey didn't end there; he continued to learn and grow, further refining his computer skills. Mohan's success story shows us that anyone, regardless of background or experience, can thrive in today's technology-driven world if they have the patience, determination, and willingness to learn.

Room Placement

BOSCO aims at mainstreaming youths, in the age group of 18-25, by leading them back to the society as economically independent young adults. Once they are job placed, BOSCO helps youngsters to hire rooms or rent a house along with other boys. They are equipped to pay for the accommodation. The core idea behind room placement is to prepare the youth for the transition from the protected life of institutionalized care where they were provided with everything to rooms where they have to manage life and its challenges on their own. BOSCO staffs regularly follow up with these youths by visiting them and arranging past pupils' gatherings. During the project year, BOSCO placed two new youths in independent accommodations and followed up with seven youths.

Mainstreaming youths, aged 18-25, by leading them back to society as economically independent young adults is our ultimate goal. BOSCO helps youngsters in hiring rooms or renting a place along with other boys. They are equipped to pay for the accommodation. The purpose of room placement is to prep the youth for the metamorphosis from a cocooned life of institutionalized care to rooms where they have to manage on their own, facing the stark realities of life. BOSCO staff does regular follow up visits and arranges Past-Pupils get together.

Home Placement

Home placement is one of the major activities of BOSCO. BOSCO Yuvodaya acts as a transit home for around 15-20 children who are rescued on a daily basis from the railway stations, bus stands, and the various contact points on the streets of Bengaluru. The children who are brought to the centre are counselled and encouraged to return to their homes. BOSCO's main aim is to reunite the children with their parents as it firmly believes that family is the most suitable place for a child to grow up in. A lot of motivation and awareness is given to the children as well as the parents before BOSCO decides to home place a child. In most cases, home placement involves calling the parents or close relatives and handing over the children to them and sometimes the children are accompanied back home by BOSCO staff. In the previous year a total of 3653 children were home placed by BOSCO.



BEYOND RAGE: VARUN'S STORY OF LOSS AND REUNION

"Anger doesn't solve anything. It builds nothing, but it can destroy everything." a 15-year-old boy named Varun (Name Changed), too, had lost his family (father, Mr. Ramesh, mother, Mrs. Rita, and a younger brother) only because he didn't want to take a bath on May 10, 2022. So he left his home and went to Mumbai and then Vijaywada. He was learning car painting and was only a few months away from completing the course. Like any young boy, he also had big dreams. He aspired to go to Hong Kong when he turned 18 years old. He planned to return and open his own business in Goa.

Various counseling sessions were held to ask Varun about his family and background, but each time, he lied about it and shared false information. The truth about Varun's family came to light when another boy at the center revealed information about him. Varun and his family were from Ullasanagar. BOSCO traced the parents with the help of the SSP office and Allahabad control room.

After a brutal year and a half, the father finally arrived at BOSCO Yuvodaya, where he was reunited with his son. The father revealed that he had filed a FIR with the police on the day his son had disappeared. The boy was finally released on August 28, 2023, by the CWC team.

BOSCO'S presence in the community

As a rights-based organization, BOSCO concentrates its effort on the holistic development of the under privileged in communities to promote child protection. BOSCO team works closely with slum communities, especially women and children, on various issues such as health, shelter, food, education and women empowerment. Vocational training opportunities are offered to the vulnerable young in the communities through training programmes conducted in the BOSCO centres. Child Rights Clubs established in the communities empower children to take up education, and prevent child labour, child marriage, and various other forms of child abuse

In 2023–24, BOSCO team worked closely with various communities surrounding KR Market, Shivajinagar, Magadi Road, Sumanahalli, Bengaluru South and West and Bengaluru Rural and ensured the following:

- Various campaigns were organized by the teams present on the streets in 22 different locations of the city through door-to-door and shop-to-shop campaign and during which 72 children and 1400 people in need were identified and required help was given to them. 28 youths were referred to BOSCO Vocational Skill Training.
- Staff of Morgan Stanley and Nilaya and the children of the locality actively participated in Varnostsava programme.
- With the benevolence of some donors a day of the poor was organized and 700 people were befitted.
 Food kits and blankets were distributed to each of them.
- CROSSCOVER Mission, USA trained 50 children from the communities in Basketball
- ▲ All festivals were celebrated with the communities.
- ▲ 464 parents were counselled on various issues related to children. Parents were guided on importance of education
- ▲ 660 children were counselled and motivated about the importance of education
- ▲ There were talent enhancement programmes through which 310 children were benefitted.
- Motivational, Cultural, Recreational programmes, Career Guidance and sessions were given to 225 children and youths
- Digital Classes and follow up for making effective use of technology benefitted 180 participants.
- 7 children were admitted in BOSCO Mane and Jeevarathni Foundation
- BOSCO was a part of SDMC meetings conducted in schools advocating for the children's rights and dignity
- 6 Focus Group Discussions were conducted in Schools, Caring Community Groups, neighbours

of the centres regarding BOSCO and its activities, Government Schemes, Social Entitlements, etc.

- Health camps and health awareness programmes were organized where 700 participants were imparted knowledge on cleanliness, personal hygiene, first aid, cancer, HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, etc.
- Participants 15 received information on Aadhaar, Pan Card and schemes like Gruha Lakshmi, Shakthi and Gruha Jyothi
- ▲ 5 Children who have completed Computer Training course are working in various fields.
- ▲ 15 students of the first batch of Computer Course successfully completed at Yuva Spandana.
- 20 students successfully completed tailoring course.
 A batch of 23 students started recently.
- ★ Karate classes were conducted at Nilaya, and Yuvaspandana. 140 children and youth made use of these classes.
- ★ 528 girls participated in 12 Adolescent Girls' Meetings. They were guided about safe and unsafe touch, personal hygiene, and the importance of education.

School and Tuition Centres

During the academic year, there were 80 new enrollments and re-enrollments from slum communities. 810 children from the areas where BOSCO works were given tuitions through 27 tuition centres. Youth meetings, health awareness programmes, and CRC follow-up for tuition children, were conducted through digital classes.

Shaale Kade Nanna Nade campaign was taken up in the intervention areas of BOSCO during the last week of May to first week of June 2024. Various stakeholders including the Government officials, Education Department, SDMC members, police officials and community leaders joined hands with BOSCO in this endeavour. The campaign aimed at enrolling and re-enrolling children across Bengaluru in schools in the upcoming academic year and thus ensures that the number of school dropouts is brought down to zero. More than one thousand people were reached out to who pledged their support in enrolling and re-enrolling the children in their communities in schools.

A LIGHT AT THE END OF A TUNNEL...

Shourya (Name Changed) was found in KR market by the outreach team of BOSCO while the staffs were patrolling the streets. The child was selling vegetables in the market. The staff enquired about the child. It was learnt that the boy was staying with his mother who was also a vegetable vendor. His father had deserted the family some 11 years back. Since the mother was unable to meet the expenses of his education, he had to drop out of school in his 3rd standard and support his mother to make both ends meet.

The BOSCO team met his mother, counselled her about the importance of education and also informed her about the services provided by BOSCO to uphold the rights of the children. The mother and the child were brought to BOSCO Mane and produced before CWC. Upon CWC's recommendation the child was placed in BOSCO Mane and enrolled in 7th Standard.

CRISP

With the closure of the Child Rights Education and Action Movement (CREAM), Project which was implemented for nearly 10 years with the support of BREADS, Bengaluru, to establish child participation as the key face of child development, BOSCO has initiated its successor, the Child Rights and Integrated Services Programme (CRISP) in the districts of Bengaluru Urban and Bengaluru Rural.

Major activities included training, formation and follow up of CRCs, CPCs; stakeholders meetings, teachers-students

training programmes, adolescent girls' meetings, parents meetings. organizing Taluk advisory board meetings, networking with various departments, re-enrollment of school dropouts, campaigns like Shaale Kade Nanna Nade, observing days of national and international significance like World Day Against Child Labour, Child Rights Week, Children's Day, the effective conduct of Makkala Grama Sabhas etc.



Advocacy and Networking

BOSCO is directly involved with the under privileged communities, to ensure that their basic rights are protected. It conducts various field visits to study the communities in crisis and advocate for their essential needs. BOSCO's strategy of conducting awareness programmes for the well-being of the community involves spreading awareness about child rights, health care, women empowerment, etc. and ground level



work. BOSCO is directly involved with the communities, especially slums, to ensure that their basic rights are protected. It conducts various field visits to study the communities in crisis and advocate for their essential needs. BOSCO's strategy of conducting awareness programmes for the well-being of the slum community involves spreading awareness about child rights, health care, women empowerment, etc., and ground level work. BOSCO's four-decade long experience both at the grassroots and policy making levels has benefited scores of children on the streets.

BOSCO in collaboration runs Open Shelters. BOSCO was a pioneer in setting up SJPU in Karnataka, collaborating with the City Police to assist children in conflict with law.

Women's Empowerment

Women have a major role to play in any society. Very often it is the women who run the family with their meagre income, shouldering the burden of sick parents and young children since the men are alcoholics, have deserted the families or are no more. Against this socio-economic background, BOSCO started intervention among women in underprivileged communities. The major objective of BOSCO is to empower women to educate their children and through them bring about transformation which will enable them to lead respectful lives in society. BOSCO has strengthened Mother's groups across 20 districts of Karnataka through Foster Care Programme.

BOSCO conducted programmes for women on International Women's Day. They were given information

about child rights, child rights violations, and the importance of education. They were motivated to lead the community through strengthening SHG Groups, and to bring about a positive change in society for children. 107 women from the communities were referred for the tailoring course and 60 for the Beautician Course in order to give them a chance at becoming self-reliant.

Ms. B S Savitha, Team Member, Child Safety Net (CSN) Project, BOSCO Bengaluru was honored with the 'Sanmanitha Sadhaki' Award by the Labour Department, Government of Karnataka on March 12, 2024 on account of the International Women's Day Celebration. The award was conferred in recognition of her contribution towards curbing the menace of child labour in Bengaluru.



PROGRAMMES FOR THE YOUNG AT RISK

CHILDLINE

In 1996, CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) launched CHILDLINE, the country's first toll-free tele-helpline for street children in distress. CHILDLINE is a platform bringing together the Ministry of Women & Child Development, the Government of India, the Department of Telecommunications, street and community youth, non-profit organizations, academic institutions, the corporate sector, and concerned individuals. The organization works for the protection of the rights of

all children in general with a special focus on children in need of care and protection.

On May 16, 2002, BOSCO Bengaluru began to function as the collaborative organization of CHILDLINE. The programme was taken over by the District Child Protection Unit from August 2023 onwards. The team was involved in the rescue of 5 boys and 1 girl and also in the closure and submission of the project related documents.



FROM ADVERSITY TO ACHIEVEMENT

Arman (Name Changed), who has been under the care and protection of an organization for the past two years and four months, hails from Bengaluru. His father is a labourer, and his mother works as a house cleaner. Due to family disputes, his parents separated, and his father remarried, living separately. Arman and his younger sister Husna initially stayed with their maternal grandmother after being sent away from their paternal grandmother's house due to further disputes. Subsequently, his mother moved them to a rented house in Siddapura, where she worked hard as a cleaner to support them.

Arman faced challenges during this time, often roaming the streets while his mother worked. Concerned about his well-being and the influence of his environment, his mother reached out to CHILDLINE for assistance. Following a home visit and assessment by BOSCO CHILDLINE, it was determined that Arman needed care and protection. He was referred to BOSCO Mane and admitted with the approval of the Child Welfare Committee.

Initially, Arman struggled to adjust to the organization as he only knew his mother tongue and struggled to communicate with others. He lacked interest in studying and participating in activities. He underwent an eight-month bridge course.

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Efforts to contact his mother were unsuccessful, but eventually, contact was made with his grandmother through the phone number on his Aadhaar Card. His grandmother was grateful to learn about Arman's situation and began visiting him regularly at the organization, providing him with support and encouragement. She monitored his progress, ensuring he received new clothes, stationery, and treats.

Initially struggling with personal hygiene and telling lies, Arman underwent individual and group counselling, value education, and motivational sessions. Despite improvements, concerns about his lying prompted a referral to the Psychology Department at Victoria Hospital for professional counselling. Following sessions, it was determined his behaviour was improving.

During lockdown, he attended computer classes for two months. Subsequently, he enrolled in the Government Kannada Model Higher Primary School in Chamarajpet for 3rd standard, later transferring to St. Joseph's Higher Primary School in Cottonpete for on-going academic improvement. Currently in fifth standard, Arman diligently attends school, actively participates in organizational activities, and aims to become a football player. He serves as vice-captain of the Red House, developing leadership skills and managing the Red team, finding happiness in his current environment.

Railway CHILDLINE

Right from the time of the inception of BOSCO, railway stations have been at the core of the rescue operations of the organization. Krantiveera Sangolli Rayanna Railway Station is a large space with 10 platforms, where around 127 trains arrive and depart every day carrying passengers from all over India, and the child inflow at the station is equally large. It sees children from different states of India, and also neighbouring countries like Nepal, Bhutan and Bangladesh, alighting at the station to come to the city of Bengaluru. Since the April of 2018, Bengaluru Railway CHILDLINE has been working in collaboration with the Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives.

The programme ensured round the clock presence of BOSCO staff in the railway station enabling the rescue of children at risk. The team works in 3 shifts to this effect. Services were given either by reuniting children at risk with their families or rehabilitating them through BOSCO. Apart from rescue activities, the team was also involved in awareness activities among the general public and stakeholders, disseminating information on BOSCO, CHILDLINE, Child Rights, and the roles and responsibilities of each stakeholder in the rescue and rehabilitation of children at risk. The team was able to



rescue and rehabilitate 579 children at risk including 509 boys and 70 girls. The Programme was taken over by the District Child Protection Unit, Bengaluru in September 2023. The DCPO staff present at KSR Railway Station rescued and referred 156 (143 boys and 13 girls) children to BOSCO Yuvodaya during the year.

Learning to Let Go of a Painful Past!

I don't want to beg; I want to study; that was the plea of 11-year-old Seema (Name Changed) who was found begging at the KSR railway station in Majestic. A native of Kurnool district in Andhra Pradesh, Seema was born to an alcoholic father and a mother. Seema's father used to work as a bus driver, but slowly the alcohol he was addicted to take over his job, his marriage, and his family. Tired of fighting a losing battle, Seema's mother decided to end the problem once and for all and left the house.

Seema's mother remarried and her new husband resorted to begging for a living. Seema's stepfather did not go for any other work. His whole livelihood and income were based on begging. Seema's mother who previously used to work as a domestic worker decided to give it up after her second marriage. Soon, Seema too was forced to beg along with her parents. All three of them would beg during the day and spend the night in the market on the street.

Once while begging, Seema was spotted by a traffic policeman and taken to the CWC from where she was sent to the Peddapadu Girls Home in the district of Kurnool. Seema studied there till the 3rd standard after which her parents stopped her education, took her out of the hostel, and brought her to Bengaluru with them.

Seema had vivid accounts to recount of long days spent among the changing faces at crowded signals and public places carrying the chewing tobacco her father would give her to sell.

One day while selling her merchandise in the Majestic railway station she was spotted and rescued by BOSCO. Seema's parents were not with her when she was rescued, and weeks after bringing her to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan on the January 27, 2023, for shelter, they were still not with her. While efforts were being made to find Seema's parents on the one hand, all that Seema was able to say was a few place names in Andhra Pradesh that seemed to have had some significance in her life. Many days later, Seema happened to mention Kurnool district and Peddapadu hostel in one of her conversations with the counsellor. BVB staff contacted the Kurnool CWC and the child was identified as one of the previous residents of the Girls' Home in Peddapadu.

She was taken to Kurnool by a BVB staff member, and handed over to the committee for further procedures. Though her parents are still missing, Seema has found a home in the hearts of the many people she has met along the way. The staffs of BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan testify that with guidance and counselling, she had begun to let go of the residual guilt and shame that was left over from her time on the streets. She had left the centre with a new determination to not let anyone or anything drag her back into the same helplessness she had spent an entire childhood fighting.

Foster Care

BOSCO has been playing a lead role in the implementation of the Foster Care programme in Karnataka since its inception in 2012. BOSCO has been constantly engaging with the Government and other non-governmental organizations to widely initiate this alternate familybased care programme, as there is a substantial increase in the number of abandoned and destitute children in the society every year. Under foster care, the child is placed in another family for a short or extended period of time depending on the circumstances, with regular visits from the child's biological parent/parents, after which the child may return to his/her own home at the end of the stipulated time period. In the Indian context, where close-knit family structures are a prevalent part of the social fabric, foster care has taken the form of kinship care, where a relative or a family member with the aid of financial assistance is motivated to care for a child in need of care and protection.

In Karnataka, BOSCO has been at the forefront of the advocacy actions for legalizing the Foster Care programme. In the second phase of the project, the focus has shifted to grassroots level advocacy actions through strengthening and supporting the existing governmental and non-governmental infrastructure in favour of children.

Working with suitable partners in the 10 districts of the state, BOSCO Foster Care project, has been involved in creating awareness, identifying prospective foster parents and potential children, and placing them in foster families. During the operational phase of the project, a total of 100445 members of the general public and various stakeholders were given awareness about the concept of foster care and how it can contribute to the holistic development of a child deprived of parental care. A total of 2048 members benefited from the advocacy actions initiated during the project period. 61 potential children and 98 prospective parents were identified as a result of the various awareness programmes and training activities conducted in the 10 districts. 19 parents have submitted applications to the DCPO to initiate the process for foster care placement. The team placed 11 children in 5 districts and followed-up 23 children during the year.



A New Dawn: Suparna's Path to a Loving Home

Suparna's (Name Changed) journey began with significant loss at an early age, as she lost her mother when she was just one year old and became an orphan at the age of four after her father's death. During these difficult times, her loving grandmother stepped in as her primary caregiver, providing comfort and support in the absence of her parents.

Her life took a hopeful turn when her childless aunt and uncle, Rajeshwari and Shekar, saw an opportunity to give Suparna the loving home she needed. They learned about alternative care options through an awareness program organized by BOSCO. With a deep desire to nurture Suparna, they began the fostering process by working with BOSCO and starting the application.

On May 18, 2023, a team from BOSCO and the Protection Officer Non-Institutional Care (PONIC) visited their home to ensure it was a safe and supportive environment for Suparna's growth and well-being. On September 21, 2023, Suparna was officially placed into their care, marking a significant change in her life.

Now, Suparna is a happy child who is thriving in her second grade, both academically and personally, in her new family environment. Her new parents are deeply grateful to BOSCO, the District Child Protection Officer (DCPO), and the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) for their essential support in making this placement possible.

After-Care for Children leaving Institutional Care

BOSCO is closely working with the Government for coming up with the After-Care Programme. It aims at the social integration of youth through higher education, skill training, job placement, room placement, and through the establishment of a past pupils' association. Children will receive life skills, livelihood skills, and independent living skills, through this programme. The programme encourages them to pursue education in high schools, ITI, polytechnic institutes and colleges, helps them to secure jobs, and brings them to the mainstream of society by ensuring financial stability and a sustainable way of life. During the year 10 youths were supported with after-care education and a total of 35 after-care youths were under regular follow-up.



Fully Charged!

High-spirited, enthusiastic, and energetic, with an infectious smile that captivated hearts, was Ramkumar (Name Changed), the young boy who came to BOSCO Sumanahalli to join the vocational training in Electricals. Ramkumar had not begun his life in the midst of abundance of hope but from the daily disappointments of a small village in Bihar. Soon, the problems that surrounded his life in the village drove him from its disturbing confines to the infinite possibilities of Delhi. Once in Delhi, he was rescued and referred to Salaam Baalak, a Child Care Institution in the city, and from there to WeLive Foundation.

Ramkumar had always been interested in learning electrical work, and it was that interest that finally led him to BOSCO Sumanahalli and the course in Electrical work offered there. He underwent training at the centre for six months, a period that he used to not only learn the skill of his choice but also to acquire knowledge in different areas that would help him in the future, work on various personal skills, and make the most of every opportunity that he was presented with. Committed to growing, Ramkumar picked up Kannada during his time at the centre, and became proficient in speaking, reading and writing the language. He also discovered his aptitude for Karate during this period and obtained a Yellow Belt with gold medal. The additional courses and sessions of counselling, life skills, value education, and language, offered at the centre helped him develop the confidence, character traits, and competencies required to position him for the future. He was also encouraged to develop and define the leadership attributes that were inherently present in his disposition.

Ramkumar's commitment and consistency over his training period helped him secure a job as an electrician in DivyaSree Apartments in Koramangala with a salary of ₹16,000/- per month. But his dreams do not end there. He wants to complete his education along with his job and is now preparing to appear for the 10th standard board exams through the WeLive Foundation. But even as Ramkumar resolutely moves ahead and steadily gains new ground, he never forgets to look back with gratitude to the organization that gave expression to his dream to excel.

Open Shelter

BOSCO Yuvodaya serves as a day and night open shelter. BOSCO Yuvodaya also acts as a transit home to around 15 children on a daily basis – those rescued and brought from the railway stations, bus stands, the different contact points around the city, through the police, public etc. The children, who are brought to the shelters from all over the city are counselled and taken care of while their problems are addressed and resolved. Families are traced through the police or with the help of the MCB, anganwadis, the Panchayat etc., and the children are encouraged to return to their homes. Four rounds of follow-up are done over the phone after home placement.

The Open Shelter at BOSCO Yuvodaya caters to children in need of care and protection like beggars, street and working children, rag pickers, orphaned, deserted and trafficked children, children of sex workers and pavement dwellers, and particularly those without a home and family ties, since they are more vulnerable to abuse and exploitation. The project provides shelter, nutrition, healthcare, sanitation and hygiene, safe drinking water, education and recreational facilities, protection against abuse and exploitation, enrollment in schools, vocational training and placement, health services, and reduction of drug, substance abuse and HIV/AIDS among street children. BOSCO was able to rescue 1606 children from the Railway station and 540 children from the Bus station. 800 children were rescued by the ARSP team, 106 children by the CSN team, 09 children by the BOSCO CHILDLINE team and 25 children by BOSCO Nilaya from different



parts of Bengaluru and these 3303 children were brought to BOSCO Yuvodaya for rehabilitation during the period of June 2023 to May 2024.

In addition, shelter was provided to 20 children referred by the police, 3 children referred by the public, 3 children who directly came to the centre, 1 referred by SAATHI organization, and 5 children from the Gandhinagar area.

Child Safety Net (CSN)

BOSCO's Child Safety Net for vulnerable children in the streets of Bengaluru, aims to give round the clock (24/7)care and protection to children from any kind of danger through the physical presence of staff in the vulnerable areas of the city and through vehicle patrolling. The patrolling vehicles cover the Satellite bus station, metro stations, markets, underprivileged communities adjacent to the city, main streets, crowded areas, cinemas, parking lots, prominent signals, and different assigned areas, for reaching out to children in need of care and support. The geographical areas mainly focused on are the South and West divisions of Bengaluru. The CSN team also works in collaboration with the city police and attends to children who come into conflict with the law and are under the custody of the police. The team also creates awareness, does advocacy with the various government departments, and is involved in the formation of caring communities.

During the last year, the team rescued 236 children who were child labourers, children found begging, rag pickers, street children, runaway children, etc. Through mass rescues and individual rescues, 31 child labour cases were booked against employers. The CSN team is also overseeing the working of the 2 tuition centres established in Veerabhadra Gudda, and Chikka Basti and Dodda Basti. 135 children attending the tuition classes were followed up during the year.

IMPRESSIONS

I am Deekshitha from K B Nagar, Bengaluru. I am currently in my second year of studies at BMS College in Basavanagudi, Bengaluru. I have obtained a certificate in Basics in Computer and Tally. This has helped me gain more knowledge about computers. The instructor gave me personal attention and provided training with patience and kindness. The computer training, life skills training, and spoken English classes have enhanced my ability to communicate and improved my decision-making skills.

My name is Kethan, and I am currently pursuing a B. Com degree at National College, Basvanagudi in Bengaluru. I was introduced to the Computer Training course at BOSCO Mane by my friend, Chethan. I successfully obtained a certificate in Computer Basics and Tally. Due to my academic commitments, I encountered challenges in attending the computer training sessions regularly. However, I am grateful for the accommodating approach of the instructor, who arranged flexible schedules, enabling me to complete the course. I extend my sincere appreciation to the BOSCO organization for providing affordable opportunities in a conducive learning environment.



Child MISS

Child MISS is a software cum web portal tool to assist documentation of both quantitative and qualitative data to create a database for the organization. It is networked with Home link, and the team focuses on documenting the information of vulnerable children of its networking partners. The Child MISS Programme supports its partners to collect the data in systematic formats based on the JJ Act. BOSCO has been placed as the nodal agency to build relationships among Nodes in Karnataka and Kerala.

A new tool, Homelink Data Intelligence for Global Interface (DIGI) a Digital Platform for Scientific Data Collection is being developed which will replace Child MISS in order to make our work more effective for the young at risk.

Special Juvenile Police Unit

BOSCO through the Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) has been assisting the police in handling child related cases. BOSCO SJPU is present in the South and West divisions of Bengaluru covering 39 police stations. The primary objective of the SJPU is to create a child friendly environment and to promote a friendly approach while dealing with children involved in criminal offences. The social worker visits the police stations and interacts with the children in conflict with the law and also those



in need of care and protection. BOSCO SJPU conducts various public awareness programmes, special training for police officials, and counselling sessions for both children charged with criminal offences and their parents. All serious cases are referred to Observation Home for further intervention by the Juvenile Justice Board. BOSCO SJPU also networks with various government departments, ACP, JJ Board and Magistrates, CWPOs, L/O, DCPOs of all divisions, and other NGOs.

In this year BOSCO SJPU made 534 day visits and 186 night visits to police stations, children were followed up through phone calls, conducted a review meeting with the DCPO and NGOs working in this project, and networked with various Government departments. 7 police training programmes, 7 school and college trainings, and 6 community awareness programmes were also conducted during the year. 230 people and police officials were reached through the awareness campaigns. The team attended to 296 cases and all the children received counselling. 696 parents were given counselling.

From Streets to Studies

Our childhoods are supposed to be filled with games and happy memories. Unfortunately for Harish (Name Changed), his childhood was filled with witnessing deaths in his family. Harish, at the tender age of 17, had experienced the death of his parents and 2 of his step-fathers. The child's mother had encountered significant hardships, having been married three times throughout her life. Tragically, each occasion that led her to remarry was a result of the untimely death of her previous husband. In his little bubble, Harish also had two older brothers, but they refused to take care of him after the death of their parents.


The lack of emotional support and motivation led to Harish struggling academically and dropping out of school (7th grade). Without proper guidance, Harish resorted to crime. He had been arrested seven times for theft at different police stations and one time for robbery. Among these incidents, he attempted to steal a bike, and on another occasion, he broke into a house and stole cash and gold. Despite each arrest, the child expressed guilt and promised not to repeat such actions but continued to engage in crime.

Due to the repeated nature of these offenses, the police referred the case to the Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU) for further action. Through multiple sessions of counseling, SJPU determined that the best interest of the child would lie in sending him to an observation home. Furthermore, they also suggested that JJB may direct the child to a unique home for skill development and rehabilitation. At last, Harish decided to give up his previous life of crime and theft and embrace a new life with learning and a better future.

Youth Parliament and Child Rights Clubs

Youth parliament is a meeting of all the residents of the centres where leadership is taken by the youth themselves. In the meeting the office bearers are elected. The meeting usually takes place once a month and all the members attempt to address the matters concerning the centre and their life there. It inculcates in them a sense of ownership and a sense of belonging. During the year, 12 meetings were conducted in Yuvakendra, Vikas, Mane, Sumanahalli, Vatsalya Bhavan, and Rainbow Home centres each. BOSCO has formed 30 Child Rights Clubs (CRCs) in the schools and communities in Bengaluru Urban and Bengaluru Rural that it is working in. Around 600 children are active members of these clubs. Club members meet monthly with their animator and discuss current childrelated issues, particularly those pertaining to their studies and respective schools.

272 children were given training in Bengaluru Urban and 250 children in Bengaluru Rural during the CRC formation. 7 Child Protection Committees were formed in both Urban and Rural Districts and 102 members



have been given training. 2 Teacher-Student workshops were organized covering 61 teachers and students.

1 stakeholders' meeting was conducted involving 23 stakeholders.

Adolescent Girls' Collectives

1784 girls were empowered during the year through the Adolescent Girls' Collectives established in the Shivajinagar, KR Market and Bengaluru Rural areas. Through various strategies, the girls were empowered and educated on various topics such as drug abuse, prevention of suicide, importance of life, changes in adolescence, being alert, decision making, education, child abuse, child rights violations, managing emotions, safety measures, personal hygiene, menstrual hygiene, responsibilities of being a girl, POCSO Act, right to education, women achievers etc.

Karate Clubs

Started in December 2017, karate classes are held in BOSCO Nilaya, Shivajinagar area, Sumanahalli, Rainbow Home and Ramanna Garden, every Saturday afternoon. 290 children from these areas are regularly getting the benefits of karate coaching. Self-defence sessions were also conducted during Summer and Dasara camps at BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Nilaya. Karate classes have helped children learn self-discipline, teamwork, and has also acted as an effective stress reliever. It has also improved flexibility and concentration in the children.





IMPRESSIONS

My name is Rashmitha, and I hail from Chikkamagalore. I have served as a Reception Unit Coordinator at BOSCO for 1 year and 10 months, building upon my 9 years of experience in the field of Social Work. My tenure at BOSCO was truly enriching, allowing me to address various issues concerning children and develop effective strategies to ensure they receive the environment they rightfully deserve. During this time, I engaged with children from diverse backgrounds, provided counseling, and even acquired proficiency in multiple languages. Additionally, I gained invaluable exposure to esteemed government agencies such as the DCPU, CWC, and Government Homes for the Children. BOSCO has undoubtedly equipped me with a wealth of knowledge, practical experience, and a platform for continuous learning. I thank BOSCO for what I am today!

BOSCO Alumni Association

The people who have been a part of BOSCO's interventions and training programmes and have had a fresh start in life as a result, come back as volunteers, by choice, and help out in various areas like accompanying the fresh children in home visits, taking care of the centre at night, organizing Life Skill sessions, and motivating the youths to continue education by presenting their own

examples. Every year, BOSCO celebrates Republic Day as Past Pupils' Day on January 26. All the youth associated with BOSCO get together on that day, some along with their families, and share their present lives and thank their mentors for what they are today. During the year, they have registered a 'Past Pupils' Sangha' and want to take up social activities through the association. BOSCO has



initiated the process of maintaining a central database of past pupils which will stand in good stead for the organization in the long run. In the coming years, BOSCO

Bus Stand Rescue Booths

For the past 44 years, BOSCO has been tirelessly reaching out to the many children who come to the Majestic Bus stand area from different parts of the state and country. This area is a favourite spot for anti-social elements and criminals who entice the runaway and street children into various anti-social activities like drug trafficking, beggary, prostitution, theft, etc.

There are two child rescue booths for attending to children in need of care and protection, one in the KSRTC bus stand, and the other in the BMTC bus stand. This has helped the team work 24/7 in the bus stands, tracking children, providing counselling services and non-formal education, doing advocacy and awareness campaigns, creating recreational activities, etc.

During the year, a total of 901 children found on the platforms of the bus stands were identified and rescued. 102 children were rendered services. is planning to celebrate Past Pupils' Day in a bigger way by bringing together the past pupils of all the centres on a single platform.



60 public awareness programmes were conducted in and around the bus stand area during the year. More than 4035 people were given awareness about BOSCO and CHILDLINE services. The outreach team conducted 13 programmes for the stakeholders and reached out to 657 members.

FROM ADVERSITY TO ACHIEVEMENT

Robin (Name Changed) is a 16-year-old boy from Kollam, Kerala. He studies at Government H.S.S Valathungal. Following the passing of his father Vinod, his mother Ruby remarried and now has a 6-month-old baby. As a result, Robin was residing with his grandparents.

Robin was rescued by the staff at BOSCO Bus Stand from KSRTC Terminal-01. Initially, he stated that he had come to roam around Bengaluru city with one thousand rupees. After interacting with him and making him feel at ease, he revealed more about himself. He provided his school ID card, which allowed the staff to contact his grandparents, who, in turn, provided his parents' contact number. Upon contacting his mother, it was revealed that Robin often had conflicts with his younger sister, stepfather, and mother, occasionally resulting in uncontrollable behavior. Consequently, his mother advised the staff to keep him there.

Subsequently, the staff informed CWC-01 member, who then instructed them to present the boy before CWC-01. Following this, the CWC-01 member recommended further counseling at BOSCO Yuvodaya. Robin underwent counseling and further details were traced for 12 days at BOSCO Yuvodaya.

On December 19, 2023, in accordance with the CWC-01 order, a police officer from Kollam arrived to take Robin back to Kerala due to an existing F.I.R complaint. Consequently, they brought the boy to the Kerala Child Care Institution (CCI). Presently, Robin is in the Kerala CCI.

Adjacent Railway Street Presence (ARSP)

The Adjacent Railway Street Presence (ARSP) covering Cantonment, East and K.R.Puram, commenced on 1st October 2015. The purpose of the project is to rescue and rehabilitate marginalized children from vulnerable conditions, propagate awareness among children as well as the public about child rights, child protection and the helpline number 1098, network with various government officials and stakeholders in neighbouring platforms to facilitate the rescue and rehabilitation process, and to do advocacy with railway officials concerning children's issues.

The BOSCO team is now present in the Cantonment, East, Kengeri, Bidadi, Yelahanka and SMVT railway stations, and the Satellite and Yelahanka bus stands of Bengaluru, identifying children at risk and in need of care and protection. The team carries out awareness programmes in the adjacent areas of the railway stations and bus stands in Satellite and Yelahanka, in the railway and bus station platforms, nearby schools, and moving trains, educating the stakeholders, public, and children about child rights, child protection mechanisms, Child Helpline -1098, and CHILDLINE.

IMPRESSIONS

My name is Mallikarjuna working in BOSCO Vikas since July 2022. BOSCO is an exceptional non-governmental organization (NGO) dedicated to providing shelter, education, and vocational training to underprivileged children. They offer these services free of charge, creating a warm family-like environment where children feel safe and supported. BOSCO is committed to giving children a brighter future by helping with job placements, reuniting rescued children with their families, and providing opportunities for them to showcase their talents. The organization places equal importance on both girls and boys, and many of the children they support come from challenging backgrounds such as child labour, orphanage, abuse, and trafficking. Through a holistic approach that includes child and parental counseling, as well as education, BOSCO has successfully helped these children transition to happy and secure lives. They also ensure regular follow-ups and ongoing support for the children. My experience with BOSCO has been invaluable in expanding my knowledge and skills, and I am grateful for the opportunity to work alongside my Director and my teammates. Thank you!

During the year, the ARSP team rescued and rehabilitated 1051 children (964 boys and 86 girls). 36 awareness programmes were conducted for the public in Cantonment, Yelahanka and Kengeri stations, and around 4,203 people benefited from it. 36 awareness programmes in moving trains were conducted for the public in Cantonment, Yelahanka and Kengeri stations with around 3,772 people benefiting from it. 13 awareness programmes were conducted for different stakeholders reaching 79 shopkeepers, 15 coolie porters, 25 railway staff, 15 taxi drivers, and 25 cleaning staff.

Two tuition centres were opened in the Satellite bus stand areas to provide supplementary education for the children from the area with fifty children attending the tuition classes.



IMPRESSIONS

I am Prabhavathi residing in BOSCO Rainbow Home. I hail from Mantralaya, Andhra Pradesh, and comes from a single-parent household with a low economic status.My father passed away when I was twelve. I was left under the care of my maternal aunt in Bengaluru.With my aunt occupied with work, I found myself in need of care. On July 9, 2021, I was fortunate to secure a spot at BOSCO Rainbow Home and was enrolled in Nethaji Subhaschandra Bose High School in the eighth standard.

Despite facing challenges due to my Andra Pradesh background and struggling to learn Kannada, I put in a great deal of effort and quickly mastered the language. Throughout the year, I excelled in every subject and achieved an impressive SSLC score of 419/69%. Additionally, I am also a talented artist with a knack for painting and sketching. I want to become a bank manager in the future. I am happy to share that my hard work and dedication were recognized and I was named the school's best student in 2023, earning a cash appreciation award. All thanks to my mentors at BOSCO Rainbow Home!

In Safe Hands...

A young girl hailing from a middle-class family background had been secretly involved with a 22-year-old man while she was studying in 10th standard. Despite her family's strict and traditional values, she decided to elope with her boyfriend to Bengaluru.

On 19.02.2024, she was found at the SMVT Railway Station sitting with her boyfriend on platform no 01. Upon closer observation, it was suspected to be a potential elopement case. When approached, the girl initially claimed to have come to Bengaluru for job purposes with her boyfriend. However, she was unable to provide any identity proof and eventually admitted that she had run away from home to be with her boyfriend, with plans to marry him secretly.

The authorities were contacted, and her parents confirmed that they had filed an FIR complaint at the Rajpur police station. The girl was taken to the GRP police station for further inquiry and then referred to the child Welfare Committee. She was admitted to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan until the matter could be resolved. After contacting her parents and arranging counseling with the Child Welfare Committee, the girl was eventually reunited with her family. Meanwhile, her boyfriend faced consequences under the POSCO act.

CELEBRATIONS

Grow Trees, Save Earth

I joined Vatsalya Bhavan as a teacher a month ago. For me, this is homecoming. From the moment I came to BOSCO, I experienced much love and care. It is here that I was introduced to Don Bosco's preventive system, a unique approach that focuses on creating a supportive and nurturing environment to prevent social issues. When I heard about Don Bosco's dream for the first time, it fascinated me. I like accompanying young people with loving kindness because love transformed me. As a teacher here, I work with girl children in difficult situations to help them cope with their lives, overcome difficulties, and realize their dreams. Whether it's providing emotional support during tough times, helping them with their studies, or guiding them in making important life decisions, I strive to be a pillar of support. I, too, have a chance to help other people dream like Don Bosco and become agents of change in society.

Social Justice for All: End Child Labour

I, Amrutha, working as Social Worker in BOSCO Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU), am happy to share that we have garnered favorable feedback from the general public, parents, and children. Stakeholders have provided positive reports and responses, and have actively engaged in discussions regarding our organization's challenges. Our presence during the investigation of children's cases has been well-received, with many children seeking our guidance for education upon their return from observation homes. The public has been proactive in directly informing BOSCO of any cases they encounter, and both parents and children have expressed gratitude towards our organization. We have received direct calls from several parents seeking our assistance in CACL, and principle diversion cases and have sought our input before filing FIRs, particularly in relation to IPC and JJ Act concerning juvenile cases. Furthermore, police officials have sought our services for guidance and assistance, and counseling services for such children and their families. We have consistently received strong support from the community, and many children have followed up with us to implement the guidance provided in their lives.



Child Rights Week Organized

BOSCO Essay Writing Competition 2023-24



The department also has well maintained information on child data of the last four decades.

BNRD manages the BOSCO website, updates and uploads reports on social media, coordinates the publication of quarterly newsletter 'Street Voice', monthly newsletter 'E- Street Voice', and the Annual Report, which brings visibility to the organization, and highlights BOSCO's expertise in Young at Risk activities. The activities undertaken in BNRD include systematic documentation of the Child Care Process which is done on daily basis, training programmes for Child MISS, and compiling the activity reports, monthly and other

BOSCO and National YaR Network

Don Bosco National Forum for the Young at Risk, also known as DB YaR Forum, situated in New Delhi, is the all-India network of Don Bosco institutions and organizations committed to the safety, growth, development and rights of at-risk, vulnerable, marginalized children and young adults. It works to energize Salesian Young at Risk ministry, and motivate individuals, communities and like-minded groups, to involve in settings where young persons are at risk, to advocate for appropriate social and legal systems and to work towards effective safeguards to prevent neglect, exploitation and denial of rights of children and

Volunteering

Through its department of Human Resource, BOSCO, Bengaluru has taken up a 'Volunteer Management' programme where it receives volunteers from corporates, educational institutions, religious institutions and foreign countries. During the reporting period BOSCO's Human Resource department provided opportunities to around 200 volunteers to get involved in BOSCO's activities. These volunteers were involved in early intervention surveys, street presence programmes, public awareness programmes, fund-raising, and other support programmes. periodic reports of the different areas and centres of BOSCO. Child Rescue Report Tracking is circulated daily to in-house and Government email IDs, along with the daily rescue reports which are updated in the website, giving information to the stakeholders about the rescued children and missing children complaints. During the year, BOSCO published four quarterly Newsletters – Street Voice, twelve monthly E Newsletters- E Street Voice, the second edition of the English version and the Kannada version of 40 Diamonds – A Candid Portrayal of the lives of the Risk Takers of Our Times', Revised version of 'Glow in the Horizon', BOSCO at a Glance – June 2023 to May 2024 Poster, Year Planner-2024 and organized the National Level Essay Writing Competition.


