Remembering the Saint...

St. John Bosco, also known as Don Bosco, was a compassionate young priest who devoted his life to helping orphaned and homeless child laborers in Turin, Italy. In 1859, inspired by the example of St. Francis de Sales, Don Bosco founded the Salesians, an organization dedicated befriending, educating, assisting impoverished boys. Don Bosco believed that the purpose of education was to help young people become virtuous citizens through the foundational pillars of reason, religion, and friendship. He emphasized the importance of viewing students as individuals created by God, capable of distinguishing right from wrong. For Don Bosco, education was a matter of the heart, and he believed that no one understands a child's heart better than God, the Creator of the Universe. As a result, he practiced the Preventive System of Education, which addresses the mistakes of young people-who are often changeable and forgetfulby not merely condoning these errors, but using them as opportunities to build solid character.

Don Bosco left behind a lasting legacy. Let his ideals, spirit, and tireless efforts continue to inspire us as we strive to uphold and perpetuate his work on Earth for the poor, downtrodden, and underprivileged children and youth.

Awareness for Stakeholders

Teams working in Gandhi Nagar, Bus Stand, Child Safety Net Project, CRISP Project, and Nivas, conducted awareness for the BBMP Pourakarmikas, Anganwadi teachers and helpers, bus drivers and conductors and auto drivers during January to March 2025. Around thousand and five hundred stakeholders were reached out to through these programmes.













Community Awareness

wareness sessions on child rights, child laws, child protection and children in conflict with the law were held at Vijinapura near KR Puram and Ambedkar Nagar by ARSP team; KG Nagar, Flower Garden and Bhangi Colony by Juvenile Advocacy programme and Vyamam Shaala by Nilaya team. 230 households were given information about BOSCO, child rights, laws and acts.







Awareness Programme for School Children

The BOSCO ARSP, CSN and the team working in Magadi Road conducted school awareness during the quarter. Mr. Harish, ASI/BNC explained the activities of police station and showed some equipment like handcuffs, pistol and police badge. He also





gave some safety tips for children. A total of two hundred and seventy-nine children, five teachers, three police officials and BOSCO Staffs were part of the sessions.

Health Awareness

ealth Awareness sessions were organized for the youths of BOSCO Sumanahalli, Yuvakendra, children of BOSCO Nivas and BOSCO Rainbow Home by the BOSCO Health Care Department at the respective centres during January, February and March 2025. Ms. Uma and the team, St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru gave information on personal hygiene and menstrual hygiene. All the centre children were part of the awareness.







Foster Care Awareness

BOSCO Foster Care Programme organized awareness sessions on the concept of foster care for the SHG Members, Anganwadi Teachers, Mothers, PRI Members, and Primary School Teachers of Bengaluru Urban and Rural during the quarter. Obalesh and Hanumantha, Social Mobilizers, BOSCO Foster Care Programme introduced Foster Care to the participants and highlighted the importance of alternative family care for those children deprived of a family. Over a two hundred stakeholders benefited from the programme.







Awareness for the Parents

OSCO Yuvodaya organized awareness sessions for the parents who visited the centre during the CWC sittings in the quarter. Fr. Johnson, Director, BOSCO Yuvodaya, and Ms. Vinnarasi, Team Member addressed the parents and stressed the importance of





creating a supportive environment for the development of children at home. They urged parents to ensure their children get an education as it is their right. Group counselling was also done for the parents during the programmes. More than a hundred parents were reached out to through these programmes.

MEETINGS

Meeting with Government Officials

DOSCO Foster Care Programme organized a meeting with the Government Officials at Government School, Geddalahalli, Nelamanagala, Bengaluru Rural on January 11, 2025 to make the Govt Officials know the concept of foster care, adoption, eligibility of children and parents, follow up procedures, documents required, role of Child Welfare Committee and District Child Protection Officer. Obalesh, Social Mobilizer, BOSCO Foster Care Programme, requested the Govt Officials to spread the message of foster care, so that more and more prospective foster parents and prospective foster children are identified. He also briefed about BOSCO activities and its services. Seven Officials were present in the meeting.



Caring Community Group Meeting

he outreach team working in the I Gandhi Nagar area organized a meeting of the Caring Community Group (CCG) at BOSCO Yuvodaya on February 15, 2025. Key speakers included Mr. Basavaraju K. M., Coordinator of the Gandhi Nagar Area; Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director of BOSCO Bengaluru; and Fr. Johnson, Project Director. They provided information BOSCO's about activities, protection mechanisms, and practical guidance on safeguarding children from harm. They also appreciated the support and collaboration of the CCG members in creating a 'Child-Safe Environment' in the area. CCG members shared their personal challenges and experiences related to protecting child rights. The meeting resolved to form a Child Safety Community Force, comprising individuals



from various sectors, to establish a child-friendly setting in the Gandhi Nagar area. Participants agreed to create a WhatsApp group for easier communication regarding any issues concerning the vulnerability of children. A total of twenty-one participants including Mr. Hemanth, CWC Member; Mr. Mallikarjun, Social Worker; Mr. Dillibabu, Editor; BBMP Supervisor and staff; the Head Nurse of the PHC in Gandhi Nagar; social workers; shop owners; ASHA workers; and other community members were a part of the meeting.

Planning and Monitoring Meeting for Districts Project Staff

oster Care, BOSCO Bengaluru, organized one day Planning and Monitoring Meeting for Districts Project Staff at BOSCO Yuvodaya, Bengaluru, on February 22, 2025. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru, began his remarks by announcing that BOSCO has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with various government officials, including those from the Foster Care system, Labour Department, and Police Officers.

Asha HK, District Child Protection Officer (DCPO), West Division, exhorted that social mobilizers understand their roles and responsibilities and play a crucial part in fostering a connection between BOSCO and Government officials. Fr. P S George, Executive Director, BREADS, addressed several challenges posed by funding agencies. The first session on the criteria to be adhered to during monitoring visits, as well



as the responsibilities of District Directors, DCPO/PO NIC, and Social Mobilizers was facilitated by Fr. Varghese Pallipuram. The second session conducted by Mr. Kantharaju, PO NIC, Hassan, covered the procedures outlined in the JJ Act regarding placements. Around twenty-six members from twenty districts participated in the meeting.

Parents' Meetings

OSCO CRISP, Nivas, Nilaya and the team working in Gandhi Nagar held meetings with the parents of the children of the tuition centres and explained in detail about BOSCO, child rights and issues related to children. They also shed light on parenting skills, being observant of their children, identifying the problems of the children, being responsive, interactive, encouraging, motivating, and respecting the children's views. Around hundred parents participated in the meetings.

BOSCO Rainbow Home, Mane and Vikas organized parents' meeting at their respective centres during the quarter. The objective of the meetings was to create a common platform where staff and parents come together to discuss the children's performance and devise

ways to enrich the learning experience. Speaking on the occasion, the Directors briefed the gathering about the summer vacation. Hundred and fifty parents and guardians attended the meetings.









Adolescent Girls' Meetings

OSCO Nilaya, Nivas and team working in Magadi Road Area conducted meetings with the adolescent girls in their intervention areas during the quarter. During the interaction with the girls, the teams focused on health and hygiene, menstrual

hygiene, drinking water frequently to avoid dehydration, personal safety, child helpline and care to be taken while choosing friends. Around hundred and sixty girls participated in the meetings.

MEDICAL CAMPS



Health Camp at BOSCO Centres

aharshi Ayurveda and Asha Kirana Trust conducted a health camp for the youths of BOSCO Sumanahalli on January 9, 2025. Dr. Swathi suggested further follow up and treatment for a better oral health. Twenty-six attended the camp.

Department of Health Care, BOSCO Bengaluru organized health camps for the open shelter boys, centre children and youths at BOSCO Yuvodaya, Yuvakendra, Rainbow Home, Vatsalya Bhavan, Mane and Vikas in the quarter. Dr. Abraham, St. Martha's Hospital, Bengaluru conducted the camps. The doctor exhorted the children to improve their oral hygiene. The doctor suggested that the children be given protein-rich food. They were prescribed medicines for

colds, coughs, and skin problems. Ninety-seven children benefited from the camps.















Eye Screening Camps

BOSCO Health Care Department in coordination with Shraddha Eye Clinic and The Eye Foundation organized Eye Screening camps for the children and the community people at Rajiv Gandhi Colony, Shivajinagar and Yuvaspandana, JC Road January 12, 2025 respectively. Four people were referred for cataract surgery which would be done free of cost, seven were asked to use spectacles from Rajiv Gandhi Colony, eleven adults were referred for cataract follow up and ten children for further treatment from J C Road. A

total of forty-seven adults from Rajiv Gandhi Colony and eighty adults and children from JC Road attended the camps.

An eye checkup camp was organized for the children of BOSCO Rainbow Home by the Optical Eye Foundation on January 14, 2025. One girl was diagnosed with cataract problem and eight girls were referred for further eye checkup. Fifty-one girls and six staff benefited from the camp.







TRAININGS AND WORKSHOPS

Training for Government School Teachers

OSCO Foster Care Programme conducted a training session for the teachers of Government Primary School, Thyamagondlu Cluster, Nelamangala Bengaluru Rural on January 11, 2025. Obalesh, Social Mobilizer, BOSCO Foster Care Programme introduced the teachers to BOSCO and its activities, Foster Care concept and Adoption. He explained in detail regarding the foster care procedures, eligibility of children and parents for this programme, legal procedures, duration of foster care, roles and responsibilities of the government agencies like CWC and DCPU. He also made them aware of the support expected by them in disseminating the information and identifying the prospective parents and children for foster care. Forty-two teachers were involved in the training.



Teachers Training Programmes

Dosco CRISP Project conducted two training programmes on the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) for the teachers of Chikkanahalli, Nelamangala and Hosahalli, Vijayanagar during January 2025 to enhance teachers' knowledge and understanding of the CRC and its implications for education; to promote child-centered education and encourage teachers to adopt a child-rights-based approach in their teaching practices. Joseph Raj, Coordinator, Nagaraj and Anand, Social Activists, BOSCO CRISP Project explained in detail about UNCRC and its principles, child's right to education: Article 28 and 29 of the UNCRC, creating a child-friendly and inclusive learning environment and promoting child participation and involvement in decision-making processes, addressing child protection concerns, building partnerships with parents and



communities and enhancing Teacher-Child relationships. PDOs, DDPIs and fifty-five teachers were part of the training.

Staff Induction Training

uman Resource Department, BOSCO Bengaluru organized an Induction Training for the newly recruited staff on January 17, 2025. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru welcomed the staff with introductory words. He took a session on the Programmes and Services at BOSCO including the Nelamangala project and Migrant Help



Desk programme. This session gave staff a clear understanding on the overall work taking place and the programmes and projects carried out at BOSCO. Mr. Shivamallu and Mr. Ramaswamy took a session on Child Laws and Child Rights. Staff was made aware of importance of child laws and child rights

Fr. Jude Anand, Director, BOSCO Sumanahalli engaged the staff in the session on Don Bosco's Preventive System of Education. Staff was involved in group activities and discussion. Activity based learning and video clips related to personality development made staff reflect themselves on their role in BOSCO. Mr. Prashanth Murthy, HR Manager explained about HR Policy of BOSCO. Induction session came to an end with the concluding remarks by Fr. Varghese Pallipuram. Twenty-eight new staff participated in the training.

Training on Emotional Freedom Techniques

nhance Emotions - Empower Lives, an Emotional Freedom Techniques (EFT) Training was held on January 24 and March 4, 2025 at BOSCO Yuvodaya for the Child Care Givers of BOSCO. The training aimed to equip caregivers with a practical knowledge for managing stress, to improve their emotional well-being and at creating a more positive and supportive environment for the children under their care. The training was conducted by EFT and Matrix Reimprinting Academy, India. Mridula Nair, Resource Person, explained the emotional freedom techniques in detail through group discussions, practical exercises and demonstrations.

The training covered the basics of EFT, including how it works, the different tapping points and how to use positive affirmations to escape from stress and thereby enhance emotional well-being. Participants practiced applying EFT to different emotional scenarios and discussed how EFT can help them navigate challenging situations with children. The training emphasized the importance of self-acceptance and creating a supportive environment for both the children and themselves. Seventy -four staff including Fr. Johnson, Director BOSCO Yuvodaya participated in the training.





Empowering Migrant Construction Workers- Workshop on Substance Abuse

The Labour Migration Unit of the Indian Social Institute (ISI), Bengaluru, in collaboration with MAX Organization and BOSCO Bengaluru conducted a workshop for migrant construction workers at the Shriram Property building site in Bengaluru on February 6, 2025.

Fr. Samir Minj, Head, Labour Migration Unit, Bengaluru, led the session on substance abuse, shedding light on its harmful effects on life, work, health, mind, body, finances, and relationships. He emphasized how addiction can become a destructive force in one's life, affecting both personal and professional well-being. Fr. Samir also provided practical guidance on overcoming bad habits, encouraging workers to take control of their lives. He assured them that with determination and effort, they could break free from addiction, leading to a happier family life and a brighter future.




The session was interactive, with workers actively engaging in discussions and sharing their experiences. More than 100 migrant workers from Bihar, West Bengal, Jharkhand, and Uttar Pradesh participated in this insightful session.

Child Rights Club Leadership Trainings

hild Rights Integrated Services Project (CRISP), BOSCO Bengaluru conducted Child Rights Club (CRC) Leadership Trainings at Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Boys' Hostel, Vijayanagar, Bengaluru Urban, Thyamagondalu and Bairanayakanahalli Boys Government Hostels Nelamangala, Bengaluru Rural on Feb 20 and 22, 2025 respectively. With more that hundred and fifty enthusiastic children from different schools and CRC members, the sessions focused on

leadership, child rights, and empowerment. The sessions were filled with learning, interaction, and skill-building to help young minds become future leaders.

Impressed by the impact, the hostel warden of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Boys' Hostel requested CRISP team to conduct these training sessions every month for the hostel children.



Orientation Programme



An orientation programme was held for Social Work students from Norway, who visited through Christ College, Bengaluru, at BOSCO Yuvodaya on March 5, 2025. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, the Executive Director of BOSCO Bengaluru, provided an overview of the organization's history, vision, mission, programmes, projects, activities, challenges, structure, and systems through a PowerPoint presentation and related videos. The students expressed their interest in collaborating with BOSCO for a research programme. They inquired about the Foster Care project and raised questions regarding the challenges faced by staff, particularly concerning language barriers. Additionally, the students interacted with the children and staff at Yuvodaya. A total of eighteen students attended the session.

KSRTC Officials Training Programme

OSCO organized a training programme for KSRTC officials at the KSRTC DC Office, Majestic Bus Stand, on March 6, 2025. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director of BOSCO Bengaluru, briefed the officials on BOSCO's activities and their role in child protection. Mr. Shivamallu, Coordinator, Foster Care Programme, explained child laws, foster care and adoption. Mr. P.N. Basavaraju, Coordinator, CSN, spoke on CWC procedures and child rights. Mr. S.N. Arun, Senior Divisional Controller (DC), KSRTC, highlighted the challenges faced by children and the need for intervention. Mrs. Prabha Javali, Assistant Traffic Manager (ATM), KSRTC, participated in the session. BOSCO Bus Stand staff shared their experiences, stating that during the project year 362 children were rescued, 11 of whom were assisted by KSRTC officials. Mr. S.N. Arun appreciated BOSCO's efforts and officials assured continued support. The



session strengthened BOSCO's collaboration with KSRTC and BMTC for child protection. Sixty-eight KSRTC officials attended the programme.

Tuition Teachers Training Programme

OSCO Bengaluru organized a capacity building programme for the tuition teachers at BOSCO Yuvodaya on March 15, 2025. It aimed at capacitating the teachers on basic teaching skills. Fr. Varghese Pallipuram, Executive Director, BOSCO Bengaluru, provided an overview of BOSCO and discussed the impact of study

centers in the community. Following this, Fr. K.J. Joseph, Director of BOSCO Mane and Vikas, conducted a session on "How to Handle Mathematics Sessions Easily and Effectively." He introduced various tricks and techniques that can help teachers effectively teach mathematics. The second session was led by Mr. Ramaswamy,



Coordinator, Juvenile Advocacy and focused on "Child Rights Clubs (CRC)." He emphasized the importance of children's participation in these clubs,

which not only enhance their extracurricular activities and talents but also educate them about child rights, child abuse, and how to report violations, thereby helping them become responsible citizens. The third session, delivered by Mr. John Joshua, Coordinator, HLK Programme focused on "Documentation." He introduced a reporting format for collecting information about tuition students. He also demonstrated how to use the DIGI tool and encouraged teachers to enter student information themselves. The programme concluded with a general discussion, during which the teachers shared their plans for the next three months, discussed challenges they faced, and shared their experiences. A total of 26 tuition teachers benefited from this training programme.

Training on First Aid

Training programme on First Aid was organized by BOSCO Health Care Department for the staff of the organization, at St. Martha's Nursing College, Bengaluru, on March 19, 2025. The Faculty of the college facilitated the sessions. The session started with an explanation of the structure and functions of the human body. First aid was defined as an immediate treatment that is given to a person on an emergency basis. They explained the aim and the rules of first aid. They gave information about the various health problems like nasal bleeding, foreign bodies in the eyes, ears, mouth and nose, injuries, dog bite, snake bite, insect bite, fever, common cold, fire burns, etc., and the immediate treatment that could be given. The session also included first aid information on heart attacks, epilepsy, electric shocks, heat strokes,



coins or different objects swallowed by children, difficulty in breathing, and different types of fractures. Twenty-one staff from different centres, areas and projects of BOSCO attended the training.

New Year Celebration at BOSCO








Republic Day Celebration at BOSCO Mane and Vikas






BOSCO Annual Essay Writing Competition

very year, BOSCO Bengaluru hosts an essay writing competition for college and university students, running from October to January. Approximately 150 colleges and universities from across India were contacted, inviting undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate students from various disciplines-including management, social work, sociology, journalism, economics, engineering, law, commerce, psychology, and life sciences-to participate. The purpose of this competition is to raise awareness among students about social issues relevant to contemporary society and provide them with a platform highlighting some important yet seldom-discussed issues that need more attention in today's educational, social, and cultural environments. The theme for this year was "Family is Where I Belong." Four significant social issues related to family were at the forefront of the competition: The right of a child to be with his/her family; Children in at-risk families; Children's rights in alternative care settings: Ensuring quality care and The role of the family in promoting the rights of the child.

The essays were judged by a panel of three external judges based on the criteria of originality of content, creativity, clarity of expression, adherence to the theme, and writing style. The first



prize was awarded to Ms. Keerthana Deepak from Rajagiri College of Social Sciences, Kochi, Kerala. The second place went to Ms. Neysa Gayleen Pinto from St. Aloysius Deemed to be University, Mangalore, while the third prize was secured by Ms. Alka Maria Varkey of Christ University, Bengaluru.

"I participated in the essay competition conducted by BOSCO to

challenge myself to think critically about social issues and express my thoughts clearly. Effective measures for dealing with children involved in non-serious cases without resorting to judicial proceedings were looked into. Attitudes, perceptions, motivations, concerns and opinions of the participants were taken into consideration. The resource person asked the parents to immediately contact BOSCO whenever they required assistance. She asked the children to make use of the services of BOSCO for counseling and vocational



training. One parent requested for the educational support of their child. Six parents and their children participated in the discussion.



SUCCESS STORY

Purvi's Journey from Adversity to Aspiration

Durvi (Name Changed), a 17-year-old girl from Bengaluru, comes from a financially struggling family. Her mother, the primary breadwinner, works in a hospital, while her father is a daily wage labourer struggling with alcoholism. Her elder brother works at a printing shop to support the family. They live in a rented house,

facing financial hardships. Purvi was not keen on her studies during childhood. She often skipped school to watch television, cartoons, or accompany her mother to temples and social functions. This absenteeism resulted in her falling behind academically, ultimately

leading to her dropping out in 10th grade. In her 10th standard, she believed that her frequent illnesses were due to black magic cast by a neighbour, which further affected her ability to continue attending school. Purvi formed friendships that led her into unsafe situations. Along with a friend, she planned to explore Bengaluru city with their boyfriends.

However, the trip took a distressing turn when she encountered painful incidents, including misbehaviour by the boy she trusted. While roaming in the city, Purvi was found by the BOSCO Rescue team who after the necessary procedures, transferred her to BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan. At BOSCO, Purvi found a safe and nurturing environment where she could rebuild her life. The organization provided her with counselling, guidance, and skill development opportunities. She enrolled in tailoring training programme and

successfully completed it. Encouraged by her newfound skills, she further pursued learning Aari work design. Today, Purvi is a skilled artisan with aspirations of becoming a fashion designer. She wants to open her own tailoring shop thereby contributing to her family's financial stability. She is determined to make her parents proud by building a successful career in fashion and design. Purvi's journey exemplifies the transformative impact of BOSCO in empowering vulnerable youth. The intervention not only rescued her from potential dangers but also guided her toward a promising future. She is now confident, and grateful to BOSCO for helping her turn her life around. Purvi's story is a testament to resilience and the power of second chances. Her journey from adversity to ambition highlights the importance of organizations like BOSCO in shaping the lives of at-risk youth and helping them build a brighter future.
